
Fall Festival

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Greetings,

We have visitors joining with us in most all of our services and activities. Some are what we call "church shoppers" or those searching for a new church home, some are new to the area, others are concerned about what's being taught in their current church that they are opposed to, others are family members or friends of our current members, oftentimes visitors of some of our regular attenders, others who are seeking something they're missing in their lives and have tried everything else and are discouraged and are visiting the church as a last resort, and many are coming because they're not sure what to believe because of so many false promises being proclaimed in churches of today. In many situations, people are being taught what we would call "half-truths." Many are accepting these half-truths but eventually realize that they are receiving only false messages and these messages are now becoming very confusing to them as they are not seeing that the messages they are hearing are making any differences in their lives. These false messages seem to be flooding the churches of today and it's having a negative impact on the Christian faith. Here are just a few that are confusing many new Christians as well as those who have been a believer for a long time. Four of these really stand out and they are simply messages to make you feel good and not realize that there are responsibilities and accountability in being a believer. Here are some views of what's being taught in many churches: (1) Faith is just a feeling. It kind of comes and goes so don't be alarmed or too worried about not having enough faith. (2) The next statement simply follows the first statement. Faith doesn't need nurturing. We either have it or we don't. This is a failure of seeking the truth of God's Word to grow as a believer, which would increase your faith in the Lord. (3) Faith can survive without roots. These roots, they say, will not enable you to grow in your faith. That's one of the biggest issues of why people say they don't attend church. They will often say, "I can be a Christian without going to church." To me, that's a half-truth. My response to that is to say, "Yes you can but why would you want to?" And, "what are you doing for the Lord now?" If you love the Lord it stands to reason, at least to me, that you would want to worship in the church that He established. (4) Faith doesn't require pruning. In creation, itself, pruning occurs for future growth. It's no different in our relationship with our Lord. This thought, though, produces many "baby Christians" like the Apostle Paul refers to in his writings in 1 Corinthians 3:1-2, "Brothers, I could not address you as spiritual but as worldly - mere infants in Christ. I gave you milk, not solid food, for you were not yet ready for it. Indeed you are still not ready." And with these half-truths listed, as well as many others that are being proclaimed, it's no wonder believers are struggling to grow in their relationship with Jesus. In a world, in churches, filled with half-truths you need to be rooted in the full truth in God's Word so that your faith can grow. Our plea is to get rooted right now. Invite others to do so as well.

Letter from the Deacons

At this time of year, I have always found President George Washington's Thanksgiving Proclamation in 1789 to be one of the finest articulations of thankfulness I have read, to which nothing needs be added:

By the President of the United States of America, a Proclamation.

Whereas it is the duty of all Nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey his will, to be grateful for his benefits, and humbly to implore his protection and favor-- and whereas both Houses of Congress have by their joint Committee requested me to recommend to the People of the United States a day of public thanksgiving and prayer to be observed by acknowledging with grateful hearts the many signal favors of Almighty God especially by affording them an opportunity peaceably to establish a form of government for their safety and happiness. Now therefore I do recommend and assign Thursday the 26th day of November next to be devoted by the People of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being, who is the beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be-- That we may then all unite in rendering unto him our sincere and humble thanks--for his kind care and protection of the People of this Country previous to their becoming a Nation--for the signal and manifold mercies, and the favorable interpositions of his Providence which we experienced in the course and conclusion of the late war--for the great degree of tranquility, union, and plenty, which we have since enjoyed--for the peaceable and rational manner, in which we have been enabled to establish constitutions of government for our safety and happiness, and particularly the national One now lately instituted-for the civil and religious liberty with which we are blessed; and the means we have of acquiring and diffusing useful knowledge; and in general for all the great and various favors which he hath been pleased to confer upon us.

and also that we may then unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of Nations and beseech him to pardon our national and other transgressions-- to enable us all, whether in public or private stations, to perform our several and relative duties properly and punctually--to render our national government a blessing to all the people, by constantly being a Government of wise, just, and constitutional laws, discreetly and faithfully executed and obeyed--to protect and guide all Sovereigns and Nations (especially such as have shewn kindness unto us) and to bless them with good government, peace, and concord--To promote the knowledge and practice of true religion and virtue, and the encrease of science among them and us--and generally to grant unto all Mankind such a degree of temporal prosperity as he alone knows to be best.

Is God Calling You to A New Direction?

In Revelation 1:12, the Apostle John writes, "Then I turned to see the voice that was speaking to me, and on turning I saw seven golden lampstands." This moment is not just a detail in John's vision; it is a powerful picture of how God often calls His people to turn, to change direction, and to see what He is doing in a new way.

God's call to a different direction is rooted in His desire for us to experience His presence and purpose. John was already in the Spirit, worshiping on the Lord's Day, but he still needed to turn to see what God wanted to show him. This turning is symbolic of repentance and openness to God's leading. Throughout Scripture, God calls people to turn from their own ways and follow Him (Isaiah 55:7; Acts 3:19). The act of turning is a response to God's voice and a willingness to leave behind what is familiar and step into where God is working and seeing things from His perspective. Has God ever called you to a new direction? Has He pulled you from one profession to another? God seldom speaks to affirm what we are already doing, but instead, calls us to join Him in a new work. Is God calling you to a new work right now?

In John's vision, turning led him to see the seven golden lampstands, which represent the seven churches (Revelation 1:20). God wanted John to see the reality of the church from His perspective. Sometimes, God calls us to a different direction so we can see things as He sees them. Our own plans and perspectives are limited, but God's vision is perfect. When we respond to His call, we gain insight, purpose, and a deeper understanding of His will.

The problem we have is that we too often desire to continue with our limited view and resist following God in something new. We create excuses that seem reasonable to us, but without God's perspective, we are simply being disobedient. When God calls, we are to turn and follow in His direction, even if it seems impossible.

God's call to a new direction is also an invitation to participate in His mission. John's turning was the beginning of a revelation that would encourage, correct, and strengthen the churches. In the same way, when God redirects our lives, it is often so we can be used for His glory and the good of His kingdom. He may call us away from comfort, routine, or even success, so that we can be part of something greater. He may call us to participate in His redemptive work in the world (Matthew 28:19-20).

Ultimately, God calls us to a different direction because He loves us and desires what is best for us. He knows the plans He has for us (Jeremiah 29:11), and His ways are higher than ours (Isaiah 55:8-9). Like John, we are called to listen, turn, and follow wherever He leads, trusting that His direction is always good. It may not be comfortable. It may not be easy. It may not be safe. We sing, "Where He leads me, I will follow." Do we mean what we sing? I encourage you to be willing to follow Him anywhere. What brings Him glory is for our good.

Blessings one and all. We pray that our Lord and Savior has kept you and is enabling you to make a difference in our world today. Whether you are doing so with a kind and compassionate word, make a difference. Or if you are intentionally doing the work of God's kingdom, make a difference. Whether you are making a difference in your home, at your job, within the community, or while at church, be a difference maker.

Why is it important for us to be difference makers? There are several reasons, which we will get to, but we are called as God's people to make a difference in the world. It is important for us to be this, because God has entrusted us to show the world all the different options there are to living life well. We have been given the task of showing what obedience, submission, and righteous living looks like to those who do not believe that such things lead to a good life.

Let us look at 1 Samuel 15:22 which declares, "And Samuel said, "Has the Lord as great delight in burnt offerings and sacrifices, as in obeying the voice of the Lord? Behold, to obey is better than sacrifice, and to listen than the fat of rams." It is clear that obedience to the Lord is what He wants from His people. In our obedience we demonstrate our ability to hear and understand what God wants from us and what desires us to do for His kingdom. Sometimes it is the simple things, like praying for others in their time of need. Other times, it is doing the difficult things, like extending forgiveness so that the church can be whole and effective. In either case, when we are obedient to the will of God, we are difference makers.

Let us next consider what it looks to submit. James 4:7-10 gives clear instructions on what submission entails. "Submit yourselves therefore to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you. Draw nigh to God, and he will draw nigh to you. Cleanse your hands, ye sinners; and purify your hearts, ye double minded. Be afflicted, and mourn, and weep: let your laughter be turned to mourning, and your joy to heaviness. Humble yourselves in the sight of the Lord, and He shall lift you up." We are to present ourselves in light of the goodness of God. That we are to forego the things that are inherently us and take on what God directs us. In doing so, we will surely be lifted up, because the letting go of our will is following the example of Jesus Christ and displays reverence to God.

Let us lastly ponder what it means to be righteous. In the following three passages of Scripture, we are told what it means to be righteous. Look for yourselves at what Hebrews 10:38, Romans 1:17 and Galatians 3:11 all have in common. They remind us that the righteous live by Faith. Not faith in ourselves or our limited abilities, but faith in God, His ultimate power and authority over all things. It is through faith in Him that things are possible. It is faith in Him that we have the strength to make it through each day. It is faith in Him that provides answers, makes a way, and gives hope. When we live a life that is righteous, no matter what happens we know that God is with us.

In each of the above situations, it is important for us to understand that this is how God would have all of His people to act, always. By acting in this way, we become difference makers. Not because we, ourselves are doing anything spectacular, but because we are willing to allow God to work through us. This is what the world needs to see as the only real option. A life that is clear in its purpose and definitive in its impact on others. When we act as God's people, we are difference makers and have the ability to change the world around us. And sometimes, we need difference makers in our personal lives, and that is why God called us to the Refuge Ministry Center. Updates from the Women's Ministry

Hello Ramoth Church Family,

As we near the end of the year and busyness seems to ramp up, let's remind each other to just breathe, slow down and soak in the little moments, because it's the little moments that tend to make us smile and that we treasure most. But how do we find balance in such busy times to enjoy the little moments, when the world is telling us to go, go, go, but our minds and sometimes even our bodies just can't keep up?

> First and foremost, we must spend time with our Heavenly Father daily, whether we are in His word, in prayer, worship or quiet time. When we align our thoughts and hearts with His, He will align our steps and straighten our

paths (Proverbs 3:5-6). God will guide, equip and strengthen us to do the things that He desires us to do (Isaiah 58:11) for His Kingdom and His glory. He will give us wisdom and discernment to know when to say yes, when to step out in faith even though we're afraid, and even when

to say no and slow down. (Psalm 32:8).

Second, we have to trust that Our Creator knows what is best, then actually listen and obey. That usually is the tricky part when we get stuck in the cycle of busyness, when we think that if we don't do it, no one else will or something will fall through the cracks. While sometimes that can be the case, we simply cannot carry or do it all on our own. I am reminded of the story of the man and the wheelbarrow. God gave this man a rock and asked him to carry it up the hill to a certain destination. The man was thrilled, honored and excited to take on the task, singing and worshiping God



along the way, but as he continued up the hill, he kept running into friends and neighbors, each asking if he could take their rocks up the hill because they were just too busy. As the man is trudging along, getting more tired, frustrated and eventually resentful towards God, he started to complain, saying, "Why am I stuck doing this all by myself?!" God met the man along the way and asked him, "Why is your wheelbarrow so full, where did all of the other rocks come from?." The man explained what happened, frustrated at His Lord for the task that He gave him and God responded so gently and lovingly saying, "But I didn't ask you to take the extra weight, I asked you to only take this one", handing the man the original rock He gave. I think some of us tend to do that in our own lives. We say yes and start piling it all on, but are we listening to God and what He is asking us to

do? Or have we even become the neighbor or friend, expecting those around us to carry the load, causing those that we say we care about, to become overwhelmed, tired, and burnt out?

Lastly, although this is something we should continually do first, is surrender to God; surrender our hearts, minds, thoughts and lives to Him (Matthew 22:36-38).

When we live in surrender connected to the Vine, which is Christ, then we will be willing to trust and obey immediately, not after



we've tried our way(s) first. We will learn to live in the abundance of love, joy and peace that only our Savior can give and accept only the tasks that He asks and equips us to take with continued excitement and joy (Ephesians 3). We will be able to work together in unity as children of the One True King, pulling our own wheelbarrows along the way and actually having the energy, time and mindset to slow down and enjoy the little moments, not letting them pass us by. For it is the little moments that matter, the ones we reflect on and smile about, the ones that become treasures in our hearts of past times that we cannot get back. So slow down, breathe, and know that God has a plan and purpose specifically for you, for you were wonderfully and fearfully made to be woven into His story for His glory (Psalms 139:14).

1. Taking care of your family (Part 5). Power outages.

Generators – these come as standalone plug in systems or pigtail connection into the home power fuse box. Gas powered generators require refuel.

Consider safe fuel storage. PL requires propane tanks either portable or a direct connect home tank.

Grills – use gas or charcoal grills for cooking outside only.

Kerosene heaters – can be used for indoor heating. Beware. Read all instructions. Safety concerns for elderly & kids. This has a distinct smell.

LP Heaters – Research & read before use. These need ventilation for many.

Camp stoves – Use these outside only.

Auto power outlets – You can plug appliances into Your truck or auto outlet.


May Flower Compact. IN THE NAME OF GOD, AMEN.

Having undertaken for the Glory of God, and Advancement of the Christian Faith, and the Honour of our King and Country, a Voyage to plant the first Colony in the northern Parts of Virginia; Do by these Presents, solemnly and mutually, in the Presence of God and one another, covenant and combine ourselves together into a civil Body Politick, for our better Ordering and Preservation, and Furtherance of the Ends aforesaid: And by Virtue hereof do enact, constitute, and frame, such just and equal Laws, Ordinances, Acts, Constitutions, and Offices, from time to time, as shall be thought most meet and convenient for the general Good of the Colony; unto which we promise all due Submission and Obedience. **IN WITNESS** whereof we have hereunto subscribed our names at Cape-Cod the eleventh of November, in the Reign of our Sovereign Lord King James, of England, France, and Ireland, the eighteenth, and of Scotland the fifty-fourth, Anno Domini; 1620

Governor John Winthrop's Vision for New England

Indeed, those who first came to the shores of our great nation knew that God had guided them and was leading them in every step of their journey. One such leader was Governor John Winthrop who came to New England aboard the Arabella in 1630. Pursuing his passion to honor God and serve Him faithfully, Winthrop worked to found the Massachusetts Bay Colony.

Settling in Boston, just to the north of the first settlement at Plymouth Colony, Winthrop and his fellow Puritans wanted to create the perfect society of people in fellowship with one another and with God. His vision is summed up in these words: For we must consider that we shall be as a City upon a Hill. The eyes of all people are upon us. So that if we shall deal falsely with our God in this



On Being Grateful

Thomas á Kempis, 16th century priest and writer: Be thankful for the smallest blessing, and you will deserve to receive greater. Value the least gifts no less than the greatest and simple graces as especial favors. If you remember the dignity of the Giver, no gift will seem small or mean, for nothing can be valueless that is given by the Most High God. --

William Law, 18th century pastor and theologian: Would you know who is the greatest saint in the world? It is not he who prays most or fasts most; it is not he who gives most alms, or is most eminent for temperance, chastity, or justice; but it is he who is always thankful to God, who wills everything that God willeth, who receives everything as an instance of God's goodness, and has a heart always ready to praise God for it.

R.T Kendall, 20th century pastor and writer: Gratitude is a feeling, but it is more than a feeling. Gratitude is also demonstrated by what we do; it may be a sacrifice in that we don't have an overwhelming feeling. Sometimes we feel grateful, sometimes we do not. But we must always be grateful, whether or not we feel it. We must do it, that is, demonstrate gratitude not only by words but also by deeds.

Candy Corn Season – Another story of Gratitude

Yup, it's that time of year again. But let's take a different look at how we might use Candy Corn to celebrate Thanksgiving with your family in a story that goes back to the Pilgrims first winters in Plymouth.

Honor the true meaning of Thanksgiving with this charming history & legend of the first Thanksgiving as your families gather in gratitude to celebrate and recognize God's Blessings -- The Legend of the 5 Kernels of Corn

In September 1620, approximately 100 English men and women, the Pilgrims, a group in search of religious freedom, set sail for the New World aboard the Mayflower. On November 11, 1620, the Mayflower landed on what we now know as the northern tip of Cape Cod, Massachusetts and anchored at Plymouth Rock. It was there that they would form the first permanent settlement in New England.

Settling in a new land proved to be immensely difficult, and the Pilgrims faced unimaginable hardships. As winter set in, they endured bitter cold and severe food shortages. More than half of the original settlers died during the first winter.

The harvest of 1621 was abundant thanks to the help of their friend, an Indian named Squanto, who had helped them plant crops and grow and store food. He also taught them how and where to fish. Were it not for his help, many, including Gov. Bradford, believed they would have starved to death. Governor William Bradford declared a Day of Thanksgiving and the Pilgrims celebrated with 90 Indians, enjoying a three-daylong feast.

Then came the harsh winter of 1621, their food supply dwindled to the point that sometimes only five kernels of corn were rationed per person. Yet, even in such scarcity, those five kernels symbolized gratitude. When something is seen as a blessing, however small, it can be immense in its significance.

Later on, the new colony's food supply was greatly depleted after 35 British travelers arrived on a ship. Many colonists died that winter from sickness and starvation. The winter of 1621-1622 they were reduced to daily rations of five kernels of corn per person. Just barely two years after their arrival, by the spring of 1622, the Pilgrims were starving.

Twelve weeks of drought dried up their crops in April 1623. Desperate and crying out to God they gathered as a group and fasted and prayed for eight hours straight. The next morning they reported that a gentle rain fell on their land and continued for 14 days. Their crops were saved, and what they thought was lost was now abundant. They even had a surplus of corn, which only a few months earlier had seemed unimaginable. By Thanksgiving 1623, the Pilgrims had an abundance of food to eat but began their celebration differently. Before their meal they placed five kernels of corn on their plates to remind them of how much God had provided for them, "lest anyone should forget."

At your Thanksgiving meal, place 5 kernels of corn on each plate. You can use Candy Corn, too. Sergio "Woody" Wooden would. The five kernels of corn help us to remember five things for which we are thankful. "Give thanks in all things, for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus." I Thessalonians 5:18

- · Kernel 1: I am thankful that God loves me.
- · Kernel 2: I am thankful that God provides for my needs.
- · Kernel 3: I am thankful for my friends.
- Kernel 4: I am thankful for my family.

Ps 100:4.

· Kernel 5: I am thankful that God hears and answers prayers.

Take turns going around the table each Thanksgiving, with everyone sharing five things they're grateful for. There will be stories remembered, family history, laughter, tears, acknowledgements and warm memories shared in gratitude. God's presence will be felt. Our gratitude will be a praise raised before the Throne.

Enter his gates with thanksgiving & his courts with praise; give thanks to him and praise his name.


