Dear Church Family,

As we approach the New Year there is always the question, "How is the church doing?" And in that thought we look at many things that are happening but many churches are looking in the opposite direction. Thankfully we are not. But in doing so they miss where they are and where they need to be and where they need to go. So, I just recently read this article by Carey Nieuwhof that addresses an issue that many churches are facing today, which is declining, and in which they don't grasp why this is happening. He presented this article entitled, "11 Signs Your Church Is Going Extinct." I want to share this article with you so that we won't be caught unaware of where we're going. He writes:

"In all the conversation among church leaders about the future of the church and declining attendance, the question remains, how's your church doing? Sometimes that can be difficult to discern. Unless you're in a free fall right now, it can be hard to know whether your congregation will thrive, survive or take a dive in the next decade. But like most things in life, there are signs right now that will point to the direction in which you're headed. And if you can know now, why wait? I am a believer that The Church will survive and even thrive, but it will look different than it does now. But in the meantime, amidst a rapidly changing culture, many individual congregations are endangered species. They could easily become extinct. Change always brings dislocation, death, and renewal. Personally, I want as many churches as possible to be on the side of renewal. And that starts with an honest assessment of where you are as a church today. I believe there are quick gut checks that you can assess easily that will hopefully lead to deeper conversation and change:

11 Signs Your Church Is Going Extinct

If your church is showing one or two of these signs, some change is in order to optimally position your congregation for the future. If it's showing more than half of the signs, then in my view there's some serious work to be done. If it's showing most or all of the signs, it's time for some prayerful and radical repentance and reinvention before it's too late.

- 1. No sense of urgency. Growing churches have an exceptional sense of urgency. Stagnant and declining churches don't. If every Sunday is just another Sunday and you don't have a burning sense that lives and eternity hangs in the balance, then you've lost the edge that all great churches, preachers and movements share.
- 2. Urgency about the wrong things. It's not that dying churches don't have any sense of urgency. In fact, they will often feel urgency about two things: the budget and survival. If your motive for growth is financial, you should probably close your doors or open your heart. Unchurched people can smell it a mile away when you see them as simply a means to an end. Resources and people follow vision. If your only vision is to stay afloat, the end is near.
- 3. Decline has made you cautious. Growing churches take risks. Stagnant or declining churches don't. Churches that aren't growing often end up in preservation mode they try to conserve what little they already have rather than risk it to grow again. This is a critical mistake. Ask yourself, when was the last time you took a real risk? If you can't answer that, you're far too cautious.

- 4. Success has made you cautious. It's not just stagnation or decline that makes leaders cautious, success does it too. Sometimes you become so successful you become afraid to break the formula. So you become cautious. You stop innovating. You risk little. The greatest enemy of your future success is your current success.
- 5. Your affection for the past is greater than your excitement for the future. Stuck or declining churches are nostalgic churches. They remember when everything was amazing, which clearly isn't today. To figure this out, listen to the way people talk. Is there an excitement for what's next, or mostly a longing for what was? When your affection for the past is greater than your excitement for the future, you're in trouble.
- 6. You don't understand the changing culture. Stagnant and declining churches often see a gap develop between them and the culture. Because nothing has changed in a decade or several decades the world is seen at best as something they don't understand, or at worst, as an enemy. Outsiders who come in see a church like that as, at best, quaint, and more likely as irrelevant and misguided. Jesus loves the world enough to die for it. The church should love the world enough to reach it.
- 7. You haven't got any new leaders around the table. I'm not advocating for high turnover in staff and leaders, but in far too many churches there is no plan to renew leadership. Churches who position themselves for future impact intentionally integrate new voices and new leaders around the table. I try to keep a balance of established, trusted voices and new voices around our table. 8. You mostly listen to the voices of current members. (MY WORDS HERE I understand what he is saying here but want to give clarification as to where we are. He states that "too often, the voice of current church members drowns out the voice of the unchurched people you're trying to reach." Here, we listen to and seek to find the needs of our community and then attempt to put the ministries we're led by the Lord to offer. We go to Scripture, prayer, our members, and listen to our Lord's direction prior to starting any ministry. The unchurched are the ones we're trying to reach but we do not bring them to the table in decision making. To me church membership is extremely important and that gives you the opportunity to express your views to the body.)
- 9. Your conflict is about all the wrong things. There will always be some level of conflict whenever human beings gather, so what's your conflict about? Dying churches spend their energy fighting each other and fighting change. Growing churches spend their energy fighting for new opportunities to reach unchurched people and speaking up for the change that will impact their lives.
- 10. Any growth you have is transfer growth. That's awesome. But who are you reaching? If your growth is mostly transfer growth, you're pulling from an ever-smaller pool of people. If you're reaching unchurched people with little or no church background, the future is much brighter.

 11. The core team is not fundamentally healthy. How does your leadership get along? Do you like hanging out with each other? Do you resolve conflict directly, quickly and effectively? Are you growing in your faith and in your skill set? Are you living in a way today physically, spiritually, emotionally, and relationally, that will help you thrive tomorrow? Are you aligned around a common mission, vision, and strategy." (end of article)
- In looking at all of this, if you answer yes to most of these questions, you're healthy. If not, there's some work to do. What we know to be true in our convention and churches is that health at the top is health at the bottom. On the other hand, dysfunction at the top is dysfunction at the bottom. We



are striving to train up new leaders and we have seen many of those in the last several years now leading our ministries. We are continuing to train our children and youth as the future leaders of our church but realizing that, right now, each of us, as members, are the future of the church as we respond to God's calling on our lives. This is a great time to be a part of the ministries of Ramoth Baptist Church.

Just a quick update on our building program - we are moving along a little slower than anticipated but hope to pick up speed quickly. We have met in a preliminary site plan meeting with the county and are working on some additional things that we weren't expecting but the process is going well and we are still on budget even with the additional issues the county has stated that we need. We are still looking at breaking ground mid-spring 2026 but hopefully sooner and the completion date of the building in early 2027 (Jan -Feb). The giving to our stewardship campaign continues to be strong as well as the giving to our annual budget and I commend you for your faithfulness. Continue to pray for our church and our expanded ministries as we prepare to be able to accomplish much more in the work of our Lord.

Oh, I almost forgot to ask, "Are you ready for Christmas?"

Christmas Plans and God's Surprising Path: Finding Hope in Proverbs 16:9

The heart of man plans his way, but the Lord

establishes his steps

Proverbs 16:9 ESV

Every Christmas, we make plans. We schedule family gatherings, shop for gifts, decorate our homes, and look forward to special traditions. But sometimes, despite our best efforts, things don't go as we expect. Maybe a snowstorm changes travel plans, a loved one can't make it, economic challenges mean we can't do as much as in years past, maybe you can't be surrounded by family and friends, or

in my house, a loved one is unable to do the things she usually does at Christmas. In moments like these, Proverbs 16:9 speaks right into our Christmas experience:

"The heart of man plans his way, but the Lord establishes his steps." (ESV) The very first Christmas was full of surprises and changed plans. Mary and Joseph had their own ideas about what life would look like. They were engaged to be married, likely planning a quiet life in Nazareth, beginning with a very public wedding. But God had a different path for them. An angel appeared to Mary, telling her she would give birth to the Savior, Jesus (Luke 1:26–38). Joseph, too, had to change his plans when he learned of Mary's pregnancy, but God reassured him through a dream (Matthew 1:18–25).

Can you imagine looking to God and saying, "I trust you, Father," Instead of lashing out in anger because things didn't go our way? We all feel betrayed until we realize that God is absolutely in control of all things and the things that bring Him glory bring us good (Romans 8:28).

Then, just as Mary was about to give birth, a government order forced them to travel to Bethlehem (Luke 2:1-7). There was no room in the inn, so Jesus was born in a humble stable. None of this was in Mary and Joseph's original plans, but God was guiding every step. No one would ever imagine the Messiah would be born in such humble beginnings. Some could never see Him for who He really was. God the Son who stepped out of the universe and stepped into the body of a tiny baby. Proverbs 16:9 reminds us that while we make our plans, God is the one who directs our steps. The Christmas story shows us that God's ways are often different—and better—than our own. He uses unexpected circumstances to accomplish His good purposes. This is how it always is. We look back on all the moments of our lives to see how God has directed every step. He did this even before we knew Him.

He directed us to new relationships, families, new jobs, new places to live and worship, new friends,



and new callings. He directed our steps through dark valleys where we were not sure we could ever endure, and He has directed our steps into ways of serving Him that we would never have imagined ourselves doing. He still directs our steps. No matter our plans, God is directing our steps in a way we can bring Him incredible glory!

This Christmas, if your plans change or things feel uncertain, remember that God is still at work. Just as He guided Mary and Joseph, He is guiding you. The birth of Jesus was the fulfillment of God's promise to send a Savior, showing that even when life feels out of control, God's love and purpose remain steady.

How Can We Respond?

We can hold Plans Loosely. It's good to plan and prepare but be willing to trust God when things change. He may have something better in store.

Always look for God's Hand. In the middle of changed plans or disappointments, ask God to help you see how He is working. Sometimes, the most meaningful moments come in unexpected ways. Remember to Celebrate God's Faithfulness. Christmas is proof that God keeps His promises. Even when the path is different than we imagined, His love never fails.

As you celebrate Christmas this year, let Proverbs 16:9 remind you that God is lovingly directing your steps. The first Christmas was full of surprises, but it brought the greatest gift of all—Jesus, our Savior. No matter what your plans look like, you can trust that God's purpose will stand, and His love will guide you every step of the way.

Letter from the Refuge Ministry



In the resurrection of Jesus...death was defeated, sin was dealt with once and all, and shame was made an afterthought to those who no longer lived in it. The resurrection fulfilled the prophecies of Jesus' victory of death and showed once more the power and authority of Jesus Christ. Through the resurrection and our belief in Jesus, we are raised anew in Him to life. We are given the opportunity to live lives greater than we could have ever imagined. 1. Taking care of your family (Part 6). Prep for a Frigid

Winter (Dr. Harrell, snow is coming!) (No, it's not-Dr. H) Prevent winter catastrophes. Keep home & homies safe, warm, & healthy as temperatures dip. Consider these tips before deep winter arrives!

Survival supplies: many of these items you'll find listed in Beacons from July thru November. If you missed these, email a request to me.

Trees & Shrubs: Check for overhanging branches that need trimming. Wrap or protect shrubs needing it.

Outdoor Spigots: Avoid frozen pipes. Assure they are turned off inside. Disconnect & drain hoses.

Gutters: Make sure gutters are clear to help run off. **Exposed pipes:** Protect pipes from freezing & heat loss. Wrap insulation sleeves around pipes running thru unheated areas, i.e. attics & crawl spaces.

Seal the gaps: Caulk or weatherstripping of drafty windows & doors keeps cold out & heat in while saving 5 to 10% in energy costs.

Fireplace: Clean & inspect the Chimney. Keep damper closed when not in use. Stockpile firewood & starter.

2. The basics of the Christian Faith. During the last year, we reviewed the 10 Commandments as a way to lean into our obedience to God & help our children grow into a Christlike character. This coming year, we'll be looking into the Basics of Christian life. What are the basics? Well, consider how Vince Lombardi started one of his football practices after losing one game so badly. At the next practice, he told his team they were going to start with the basics. Then, he held up a ball and said, "Gentlemen, this is a football." This month, "Salvation" is one of the basics to the Christian faith we'll review. In coming months, we'll look at six more terms with supporting verses. Some you know already, but they will be good ones to memorize, share with our family, or use to witness as we speak Jesus to others.

How Is Your Salvation Linked to Christmas?

Christmas brings to mind a Holy night as a young virgin mother arrives at a stable about to give birth to a child who will bring Salvation to all who will look to Him. The angel had declared to Joseph, "She will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins" (Matt 1:21). Where did this term "Salvation" come from. It's one of those Christian speak words we so often use. To the secular world salvation means: preservation or deliverance from harm, ruin, or loss. But to the Christian, Salvation means: deliverance from sin and its consequence. Salvation is a rescue from sin. At its heart, the word Salvation comes from the Hebrew word **yshuwah** meaning: something saved. It is the same word used for Jesus. So, as we turn to Jesus, we are turning to our Salvation.

Why do we need Salvation? Because Adam's sin in the garden brought death and a separation from God. When Adam sinned, God promised a Savior that would redeem us and bridge the chasm between man and God. He would send a second Adam who was perfect. So also it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living soul." The last Adam became a life-giving spirit. I Cor 15:45 Our Savior, Jesus, fully God and fully man, was born to bring salvation as He would take on the punishment of sin to redeem us and span our separation from God to bring us salvation. Jesus Christ, "who, although He existed in the form of God, did not regard equality with God a thing to be grasped, but emptied Himself, taking the form of a bond-servant, and being made in the likeness of men. Being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross." Phil 2:5-8

At Christmas, God brings us a gift of incalculable worth. For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God; ⁹ not as a result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand so that we would walk in them. Eph 2:8-10
