Small Group Discussion Guide

VOL 4: Part 27: Overcome Evil with Good

BIG Idea: Christ calls us not to curse, withdraw, or seek revenge, but to bless our enemies, trust God with justice, and overcome evil with good.

Application: When hostility rises against us, our response must reflect Christ: blessing instead of cursing, love instead of vengeance, and faith instead of fear.

Discussion Questions

Icebreaker: What's the worst piece of bad advice you've ever heard about dealing with difficult people?

- 1. Romans 12:14 tells us to "bless those who persecute you." What does blessing practically look like in real life?
- 2. Why is it often easier to withdraw and do nothing rather than respond to hostility with Christlike love?
- 3. Read Philippians 1:29 and 2 Timothy 3:12. How do these verses reshape our expectations about persecution?
- 4. Paul commands us not to repay evil for evil (Romans 12:17–18). What are some examples where Christians have failed—and succeeded—in doing this?
- 5. Proverbs 25:21–22 says feeding your enemy is like heaping burning coals on their head. How does this image challenge our instincts for revenge?
- 6. Jesus' words in Luke 23:34 and Stephen's prayer in Acts 7:60 model forgiveness. What do these examples teach us about entrusting vengeance to God?
- 7. Romans 12:21 says to "overcome evil with good." How is doing good to our enemies not weakness, but spiritual warfare?
- 8. What kinds of divisions (school, politics, social media, family) most tempt you to retaliate or curse? How can unity in the church counteract these?
- 9. Which of the three responses (anger, withdrawal, Christlike love) are you most tempted toward—and why?
- 10. How can we support one another in actually practicing these truths this week?

Prayer Prompt: Pray together that God would give your group courage to bless instead of curse, faith to entrust justice to Him, and unity to reflect Christ's love in a divided world.

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
