Join us for a powerful morning of learning and reflection as we screen **Pushout:** The **Criminalization of Black Girls in Schools**, a feature-length documentary that explores the educational, judicial, and societal disparities facing Black girls in the United States.

Inspired by the groundbreaking book by Dr. Monique W. Morris, this film sheds light on how deeply entrenched biases and misperceptions of Black girlhood often lead to excessive punitive discipline—disrupting their education and lives in lasting ways.

Following the screening, we will have a time to discuss the film at our tables and reflect on the film, examine local realities, and consider how we as individuals and a faith community can respond with justice, compassion, and action.



CENTRAL'S UWF INVITES YOU TO READ


The United Women in Faith's Reading Program is a long-standing tradition that continues to inform, inspire, and challenge us to grow in faith and action. Each year, the national UWFaith organization releases updated reading lists that reflect the current needs of our communities and the world.

Books in the program are selected for their spiritual depth, educational value, and social insight. Titles span genres such as Education for Mission, Leadership Development, Nurturing for Community, Social Action, and Spiritual Growth, with selections available for adults, youth, and children.

Here at Central, we're proud to maintain a rich and thoughtful selection of these books in our church library—carefully curated by Sue Luttrell, our UWFaith Reading Program Advisor. Sue ensures each genre is represented and that titles are age-appropriate and engaging. Books are regularly added through donations and purchases by Central's UWFaith unit.

You'll find the UWFaith reading section on the far wall to the right as you enter the library. Books are available for anyone to check out—whether you'd like to read on your own, with a Circle, in a Sunday School class, or a Journey Group. Look for the sign-out sheet on the top shelf, fill in your name and the book title, and you're ready to read!

Isaiah and the Worry Pack by Ruth Goring

This children's book tells the story of Isaiah, a little boy overwhelmed with worry who learns how to give his burdens to God. His mother helps him pack up each fear, and through that process, Isaiah experiences the peace that comes from trusting God.

Reading Buddies of C4C

The reading buddy program finished the year with 23 adult reading buddies matched with 23 charming children at Emma Elementary.

A huge thank you to these faithful volunteers that made the trek to Emma every week for some one-on-one reading time with their buddy! It was a joy and privilege to have this opportunity. Spending time with these children, listening to them, reading with them and encouraging them was a special time for all the volunteers.

The principal at Emma told me she really likes to see the children working with their buddies around the school. She and their homeroom teachers appreciate the efforts

of our volunteers. We may not every know what effect our time had on the children, but we know that they were listened to and encouraged by a caring adult, which is important in the lives of these children.

We hope that all of these fragile readers will continue to improve their reading and learning skills. The Reading Buddy program is a Title 1 program, led by the Title 1 teacher at Emma. That program, like all federal Dept. of Education programs, is in danger of being eliminated, and we will know more as the summer progresses. Our fingers are crossed for the children of Emma and all schools like Emma Elementary, that their Title 1 programs will still be in place next year. If that is the case, reading buddies will be there again.

Asheville High Graduates fully outfitted for their dorm room

Generous Central donors provided dorm room supplies for 25 deserving Asheville High graduates. For the 15th year, we provided towels and blankets, storage and dishes, and sheets and pillows. The students, selected by the Asheville High counselor, are all college bound and need financial help for all the expenses of freshman year. Many are first generation college students, all are hardworking & bright, but need help with the expense of dorm room supplies. With Central's generous support, these students were given all the necessities, a lot of the basics, and a few of the extras to outfit their dorm room. A letter from our chairperson...

When I became chairperson of the new **CCC** in 2021, I knew our focus needed to be integrating the care of our amazing care ministries that already had been providing care for over 10 years. Pastor Luke helped us hammer out our Playbook which is stated above, and month after month, we worked to learn about each other's ministries and how we could work together to support people going through a difficult time in their lives. We first moved our **Pastoral Care** ministry under the CCC umbrella. Next in 2021, the **Child & Family Care** ministry came into being. Then in 2022, through a miraculous set of circumstances, the Well-Being Community Resource Webpage was completed. In early 2024, **Recovery Care Resources (RCR)** became our newest care ministry bringing us to 8 care ministries! At each monthly meeting we talk about how difficult it is to ask for help and thus, how important it is to intentionally pay attention to people's needs and offer support in as many ways as possible. Each year we continue to look for deeper ways to "wrap our arms around someone in need."

In my own life, I did not foresee this ever happening to me...but over these past 6 months, I and my husband became a recipient of these care ministries when I experienced a serious health event that then pushed my husband's need for a foot surgery back 6 weeks. Through our long recovery together we experienced the persistent prayers, calls, and visits of our pastoral care ministry, the meals brought to us by members of the RCR, the prayers and cards from the Circle of Prayer members, a prayer shawl delivered to our home, and the support of my own Stephen Ministers encouraging us with their listening hearts and messages of love. I learned first-hand what our core values of intentionality, compassion, insightfulness, respect, connectivity, dedication, and unconditionality really looked like at Central. I was humbled and made proud, but mostly I felt cared for....

If you or someone you know is going through a difficult time, for whatever circumstance, one does NOT have to go through it alone...please reach out to our **Congregational Care Pastor, Lisa Rettew**, to get support. We, as a caring congregation, want to "wrap our arms around you with our supportive ministries until you are stable": and We WILL...

One year after Hurricane Helene, our community is still recovering from the storm's devastating impact—on homes, neighborhoods, and landscapes. The loss of trees and damage to our city's natural canopy was a visible reminder of how deeply connected we are to the environment around us.

Keith will share about his work with the city and offer insight into how Asheville is responding and rebuilding—particularly through the development of an **Urban Forest Master Plan**. This plan will serve as a roadmap for growing a healthier, more resilient urban forest that can withstand future challenges. Trees play a powerful role in healing and sustainability: they cool our neighborhoods, improve air and water quality, and restore a sense of beauty, stability, and life.
