

# Central.Giving. No Better Time Than Now

With the New Year behind us and spring approaching, there is no better time for fresh starts, so why not take a moment to begin something new? Just as plants produce new growth, there is something simple we can do to bring newness to our lives by creating or updating our will. Many people are reluctant to write a will, or even discuss one. Contrary to what some believe, a well-written plan is not about life without us, rather, it affirms the life within us. When we write a will, we tell the world what is important to us. It affirms our hopes, our dreams, our values, and protects our loved ones and cherished causes. Take a moment to enjoy all that this wintery season has to offer. But also let it serve as a reminder to call your attorney about writing your will, or to ask if it needs updating.

*Planned giving offers an opportunity to care for loved ones while leaving a legacy for future generations.*

The Lenten season begins on February 18, this year. This is the perfect time to think about your values, your beliefs, your family members, and also, your church. Preparing a will is about as simple as writing a letter. A well-written will is nothing more and nothing less than a statement of what is important to you. The most difficult part of preparing a will is simply taking the first step. This year, decide to do it!

Whether you are creating a will for the first time or revising it for the fifth time, you should use an attorney. Most attorneys charge relatively little for this service. They are accustomed to writing wills and many of them utilize a questionnaire that will help you through the process. If you do not have an attorney, ask friends and neighbors who they have used to write their wills. Once completed, your will can protect your family and friends and benefit your church and those ministries that have been most important to you. And best of all, you will receive far more peace of mind than you thought possible.

In addition to creating a will, there are many planned giving vehicles which allow you to take care of both loved ones as well as your church or the programs and ministries that have had great meaning in your life. There are numerous planned giving vehicles that provide excellent opportunities to leave a legacy to fund ministries for future generations. If you are thinking about leaving a legacy to Central UMC and would like to speak with someone about your plans, our church leadership can be a great resource. Whether you are creating a will, updating your will or establishing a planned gift, it is a wonderful way to celebrate a fresh new start and affirm the life within you.

# The Ministry of Welcome

## Welcoming Turf: Living the Gospel from Our Seats

My name is Mike Bailey. I am a United Methodist pastor and retired from parish ministry a little over two years ago. My wife and I came to visit Central UMC after my retirement. I was spiritually enriched by the worship, music and preaching here and my wife immediately became involved in the choir. We both fell in love with Central UMC and decided to move our membership here. After 45 years serving in ministry, I found myself, for the first time, sitting in the pew as a worshiper, "my" pew. Like most congregants I tended to gravitate to the same area in the sanctuary. My pew was always on the left-hand side, 2 or 3 rows from the altar rail. I considered a broad radius around my seat to be my "welcoming turf." In other words, I felt called to be an agent of "hospitality" to those around me, guests and "regulars" as well, no exceptions.

Following the aftermath of Hurricane Helene, I was overjoyed to be able to worship again in our beautiful sanctuary. One Sunday in February I was privileged to greet and welcome a wonderful guest, named Peter (a pseudonym). Peter was wearing a raincoat that first responders wear: bright yellow with a few stripes of reflective tape and trimmed in black. Peter was of a different background than me. I learned later he was originally from Oklahoma, perhaps his origin is from the "first people". During our first visit, he told me he had been living in a very inexpensive hotel for 5 months because of Helene. Peter had come to Asheville with very little in terms of material goods. He was living in his van that was parked at a body shop in the River Arts District. When the storm came, Peter was able to safely evacuate prior to the flooding, but he lost all he had.


After months of living in the hotel, Peter knew he needed to have his soul fed. He made his way to Central UMC by public transportation. He chose Central, he shared with me, because he was raised in the United Methodist Church and that his sister was a United Methodist minister serving in the Midwest. Peter was joyfully, lovingly and beautifully welcomed by the folks in the "welcoming turf" around him. The next week we sat together and he shared with me how much the welcoming spirit of this congregation and especially Mary Brown, had meant to him. We talked a great deal that Sunday. I remember him reflecting on his life and sharing, "The whole world sees me now as a displaced disaster victim. Central UMC sees and treats me as a child of God. Central helps me remember who I really am."

I was looking forward to sitting with Peter again, on my last Sunday at Central before leaving to serve a 3 month interim appointment at another United Methodist Church. On that final Sunday, my heart was touched beyond measure. On that day, Peter brought a friend from the FEMA hotel. I couldn't help but be reminded of a phrase by Soren Kierkegaard, a Danish theologian, who said, (and I paraphrase), "Invitation, welcome and evangelism, are like one hungry person sharing with another hungry person where to find an unlimited supply of free bread."

In my time at Central UMC observing this church from my "welcoming turf," I realized we are all called to be the hands and feet of Christ right from our very own pew. We can be welcoming, offering "holy hospitality" and inviting others to experience this Community in Christ which is, indeed, as Mary Brown says every Sunday, "... .Where everyone is welcome without exception."

My dear sisters and brothers in Christ, thank you for supporting this church's ministries of outreach and inclusiveness and this place of worship where the bread of life is found and lives are transformed.

# A Lenten Journey into the United Methodist Social Principles



Central UMC Family, I have a confession to make. Our baptismal vows call us to "resist evil, injustice, and oppression in whatever forms they present themselves." They are presenting themselves every day on the news... and I am struggling with how to "resist" those forces.

Have you ever wrestled with how to respond to current events? Ever wished that we had a document that addressed hot-button topics in a thoughtful way that might help us take action?

Turns out – we do!

Our United Methodist Church Book of Discipline has an entire section called the "Social Principles." Within it you can find a biblical and theological framework for careful reflection on all sorts of social issues. And when I say "all sorts," I mean just about anything! Topics include addiction, capital punishment, cloning, the death penalty, divorce, fossil fuels, health care, pornography, refugees, tobacco, the United Nations...

Does that mean we have to think the same on hot-button topics like these? No! To quote the preamble to the Social Principles, "...unanimity of beliefs, opinion, and practice have never been characteristic of the church from the beginning... the church needs to embrace conflicts with courage and perseverance as we seek together to discern God's will."

We will never think exactly alike, but (to quote John Wesley) "we can love alike." Join us this Lent as we study the Social Principles as a way to faithfully engage with contemporary issues and seek our own ways to "resist evil, injustice, and oppression."

# A Joyful Offering

## Daniel Pinkham's Christmas Cantata at Central UMC

On Sunday, December 14, 2025, the Central Chancel Choir presented Daniel Pinkham's *Christmas Cantata* during the 10:00 AM worship service.

Composed in 1960, Pinkham's *Christmas Cantata* is a beloved work that blends classical tradition with a distinctive flair of jazz. Featuring Latin text accompanied by organ and double brass choir, the piece has been celebrated around the world for more than seven decades. Its music carries both grandeur and intimacy, drawing listeners into the wonder of the Christmas story.

The English translation of the text proclaims the mystery and joy of Christ's birth—shepherds and animals bearing witness to the newborn child, the Magi rejoicing at the star, and angels and archangels singing, "Glory to God in the highest. Alleluia!" In this season of waiting and hope, the cantata offered a powerful reminder of the good news at the heart of Advent: today Christ is born; today the Savior has appeared.

Under the leadership of **Linda Haggard, Conductor**, the Central Chancel Choir has been preparing this challenging and beautiful work since September. Their dedication and commitment were evident in every phrase, offering the congregation a deeply moving musical expression of faith.

The choir was joined by **Corey Powell, Organist**, and a superb **Brass Quartet**—Brad Ulrich and Forsby Quick on trumpet, and Michael Hosford and Bill Reichenbach on trombone—whose artistry added brilliance and depth to the performance.

We are deeply grateful to the Chancel Choir, musicians, and all who contributed their time and talent to make this worship experience so meaningful. Thank you as well to the Central UMC congregation for your presence, support, and shared spirit of worship. Together, we celebrated the mystery and joy of Advent through music that lifted hearts and proclaimed hope.



## Native Plants Beauty & Blessing

On October 15, the Creation Care committee had a successful and fun-filled day planting 71 native plants in the church's pollinator garden and southeast end of the church property. Seventeen students (7th and 8th graders) from the Mountain City Public Montessori school, which is housed in our Educational Building, helped with the tasks. And seventeen adults worked with the students to plant: foam flowers, goats beard, lupines, green & gold, wild geraniums, coreopsis, coneflowers, asters, bluestems and blueberries—all native to our area. The plants were purchased with a \$500 grant from Blessed Tomorrow and the National Faith & Climate Focus, national groups that promote taking care of God's creation and being good stewards of God's gifts to us.

## A Bright Step Toward Energy Stewardship

In late 2025, Central's Property Committee began the big job of replacing all of the church's light bulbs with energy-efficient, environmentally friendly LED lights. This upgrade will reduce our building's energy use and is expected to lead to significant savings on our electric bill. Committee members **Bob Maynard** and **Jeff Seymore** are leading the project.

In **Round One**, committee members, volunteers, and professional electricians removed and replaced **400 fluorescent tubes** on the church's fourth floor. **Round Two** tackled **375 tubes** on the third floor (office level) and in the hallways. **Round Three** begins **January 19, 2026**, when work on the second floor will start.

## **Council of Bishops Response Letter Re: Creation Care and Creation Justice.**

As part of our ongoing commitment to caring for God's creation, Central's Creation Care Committee is sharing the following statement from the Council of Bishops of The United Methodist Church. This response addresses the UM Creation Justice Movement Open Letter and reminds us of our covenantal responsibility to "do no harm" to both humanity and the earth. Grounded in scripture, our Social Principles, and the urgent realities of climate change, this letter calls churches and individuals alike to faithful, concrete action in this critical moment. **COUNCIL OF BISHOPS RESPONSE TO**  
**UM Creation Justice Open Letter to UM Bishops**

**November 4, 2025**

Dear People called United Methodists,

In our scriptures, after the flood waters covered the earth and then dried up, God spoke to Noah and stated there was now a new covenant between God and humans and all of creation. God placed a bow in the sky saying,

*The bow will be in the clouds, and upon seeing it I will remember the enduring covenant between God and every living being of all the earth's creatures. (Genesis 9:16)*

The covenant promise was to do no harm to humans and to all of God's creation. This is the covenantal relationship we live within. God promises no harm, and as people who follow the ways of God, we too are committed to do no harm to any part of God's creation. For this reason, we must work as people of faith to keep God's creation in a state of health and goodness. We work to prevent all harm by our wrongful actions, our greed, or our inattention to the beauty and goodness of God's world. While the Council of Bishops has engaged in this discussion over time, including statements in 2009 and 2021, now is the time to once again address our care for God's world.

#### **Urgency of this moment**

In 2024, global temperatures rose to an average of 1.55°C, which is past the 1.5°C (2.7°F) lower limit that was agreed upon at the 2015 COP21 Paris Agreement. A science journal, *The Lancet*, noted a comprehensive report declaring, "Rising global heat is now killing one person a minute around the world." *The Lancet* also states "...the world's addiction to fossil fuels also causes toxic air pollution, wildfires and the spread of diseases such as dengue fever, and millions each year are dying owing to the failure to tackle global heating." [The Guardian, October 28, 2025](#). While the greatest responsibility for the damage to our ecosystem lies with developed countries, we lament that those who suffer the primary impact of harm are those who have contributed the least to the problem, developing countries, communities of color, communities with economic stress, children, and future generations. We can no longer afford to ignore our covenant with God to care for creation and humanity.

Our [Social Principles](#) have also stated the urgency of this moment:

*We acknowledge that unsustainable human activities have placed the entirety of God's creation in peril. (Para. 160, pg. 110)*

Specifically, the *Social Principles* address the destruction of ecosystems, global warming and climate change, and the dependence on fossil fuels. Further, we acknowledge the

harms of environmental racism, food injustice, and environmental toxins which calls us to create sustainable policies and practices in our communities. We understand that harmful actions are counter to our responsibility as stewards of creation.

## **2024 General Conference Decisions**

It is our time to implement the decisions made at our 2024 General Conference. We agreed to:

- Create Green Teams in churches, districts, and conferences
- Implement sustainable practices in managing church properties as a recognition of their sacredness
- Join UM agencies and bishops in the commitment to Net Zero Green House Gas Emissions
- Establish conference Caretakers of God's Creation Coordinators
- Implement sustainable practices at Annual Conferences

These are the first steps we committed to in our work at General Conference.

## **Simple steps to action**

In addition to the above commitments, the bishops of The United Methodist Church are inviting all United Methodist local churches and ministries to:

- Create Green Teams in each local church/ministry**
- Organize one church-wide action around creation care at least once a year**
- Study together for deeper understanding of the work of creation care and Justice**
- Engage with partners in the Ecumenical Decade for Climate Justice Action**

## **We will continue to support, advocate, give voice and lead**

The bishops of The United Methodist Church commit to giving continued support in this endeavor to do no harm to God's world, to continue to advocate for creation justice, and to give voice and leadership to our commitment to care for all of God's creation.

We invite you into this urgent work. Together, and across the globe, United Methodists can make a difference and bring about health, sustainability, and care for the garden that we were created into. Please share this letter with your churches as soon as you receive it. This is our urgent work together. This is the way we respond to our call to be good stewards of God's creation and to fulfill our commitment to do no harm. This is how we live into our vision to **love boldly, serve joyfully, and lead courageously**.




## Reconciling Ministry Group: Celebrating 2025 Achievements

# Staff Highlight

## Andie Simpson

If you've ever walked through Central United Methodist Church and felt that everything simply works—the building is ready, the space is welcoming, and events unfold smoothly—there's a good chance Andie Simpson had a hand in making that happen.

Andie began working at Central UMC in **1995**, but her connection to the church goes back even further. Central has long been woven into her family's story. Her parents, **Vivian ("Peggy") and Paul McDonald**, faithfully cleaned the nursery for years. After her father passed away in 2005, Andie's brother Mark stepped in to help their mother until Mark's death in 2009 at the age of 54. Andie's sister, **Amanda Edwards**, also served Central by cleaning for the Weekday School, and Amanda's husband, **Gary Edwards**, worked on contract doing various facilities repairs.



That family connection eventually led Andie herself to Central. In the early 1990s, **Alan Gibson**, our former long time Church Administrator, began working at Central and soon hired Gary as custodian. As the work grew, Alan and Gary realized they needed more help. At the same time, Andie had recently lost her job at Eaton Corporation when the facility closed. With her wide background in food service, catering, cleaning, and customer service, Andie was a natural fit. Gary asked if she would be interested—and the rest is history.

Over the years, Andie has worn many hats at Central, both paid and volunteer. She has done **cleaning, cooking, event coordination, newsletter work, office tasks, and correspondence**, often stepping in wherever help was needed. Her flexibility and willingness to serve have been hallmarks of her nearly three decades at the church.

One of Andie's favorite memories comes from a pivotal moment in Central's history: the pastoral transition from **Dr. Michael Brown** to **Dr. Rob Blackburn** in 1998. Alan called Andie into his office to talk about the change and asked if she could help. Andie was tasked with organizing *two large receptions*, each with well over **1,000 people in attendance**. When Dr. Blackburn and his family arrived, it was a scorching hot day, and the line seemed to stretch endlessly. Still, the event was a success—and from that point on, Andie became responsible for coordinating events at Central. With Gary, youth helpers, and the support of **Julie Bainbridge** (formerly Wilburn-Peeler), the team became something more than coworkers. "We were like a family," Andie says.

In earlier years, the maintenance staff handled **all the cooking and food ordering**, always coming in under budget. Andie helped prepare meals for funerals, Christmas Eve staff gatherings, Jesus' birthday celebration for the children, complete with cake, punch, and ice cream, and countless other occasions. She also took charge of **Wednesday lunches and dinners, Thursday Power Lunch**, that included the ladies at Givens, and assisted with weddings, funerals, and UMC Conference and District events.

Andie spoke with deep gratitude about the people she worked alongside. She credits **Alan Gibson** with being like a brother to her and **Hayes Brown**, Facilities Manager, as the best supervisor she's ever had.

Reflecting on her years at Central, Andie sums it up simply and beautifully:  
**"I love it so much. We are like family!"**
