



Sermon Title: "Kingdom Primer on Power and Impotence"


February 14th – 6th Sunday after the Epiphany/ Transfiguration

February 16th, the day before Ash Wednesday, is also known as Fat Tuesday / Shrove Tuesday and Mardi Gras.

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday and Christians practice the disciplines of penance, prayer and fasting throughout the 6-week season. when Pope St. Gregory prohibited Christians from eating all forms of meat and animal products during Lent around A.D. 600. So for centuries, on the night before Lent starts Christians prepared by using up valuable meat and supplies, such as eggs, fats and sweets they would be abstaining from in the days to come. While traditions of Fat Tuesday (most famously known as end of Mardi Gras/ French Tradition) have changed through the ages, many Lutherans have celebrated with the perfect menu of pancakes, bacon, eggs and the like.

The ASH WEDNESDAY key themes and tradition is recognizing our mortality and humbly receiving God. Or to recognize the utter truth – of who and whose we are and from where we come - realign ourselves with the God who made us.

Grace's Tradition includes an evening Ash Wednesday service of ashes and receiving Holy Communion. We intend to honor the tradition as best as possible during Covid time.

On February 17th we will observe ASH WEDNESDAY in 3 ways-

1) Come Drive through at 1 PM and get your Ashes-to-Go. Ashes will have instructions on them for you to self-impose anytime or during our evening service. You will also be able to pick up Holy Communion at that time.

2) A DRIVE-IN (Live) SERVICE begins at 7 PM – come get Ashes (Starting at 6:30 PM) and park in upper front lot for service, experiencing it on radio station 103.1 FM

3) A Recorded Service (with ashes and HC available for pick up prior either time above) that will be ready after 8PM.

The Drive thru service and the recorded service will offer ashes and communion as listed above (1 PM & 6:30-7PM). Those interested in one or both elements pull thru the front driveway from the east and they will be given out in a safe prepacked manner. People can stay, park their cars and worship from the safety of their vehicle tuning in to listen through their car radio, or head home and worship with us in a recorded Online Service. December 2020 marks the release of Pastor Arne Walker's 3rd book (former pastor at Grace Lutheran Church of Lily Lake). The title for this book is "SPIRIT PROMPTINGS". A highlight of this book is photography by nationally famous nature photographer Ken Jenkins of Gatlinburg, Tennessee. Ken shares several pictorial essays as well.

"SPIRIT PROMPTINGS" gets its title because each Public Pulpit (published in THE MOUNTAIN PRESS) grows out of his prayer walk.

He never sat down and pondered something to write. The book includes over 150 titles.

"SPIRIT PROMPTINGS" is dedicated to Mary Vance, the first Executive Director of Mountain Hope Good Shepherd Clinic. 100% of the proceeds from this book will go to support the healing ministry of MHGSC which serves the uninsured working poor of the Sevir County, Tennessee Area. Each patient contributes something towards their care. With a small grant from Thrivent Financial, Pastor Walker will assume all remaining costs in support of this project so that 100% goes to the clinic.

Pastor Walker has lived in Gatlinburg since 1986 and has served in ministry in 6 states since 1957. He has invested 59 years in an avocation of reaching out to teens removed from their home by the juvenile court. His main area has been the out of doors.

Our prayers support Medical Director Richard Dew and newly hired Executive Director Deborah Murph as this ministry moves forward.

Dr. Richard Dew has been a faithful volunteer and Medical Director at Mountain Hope Good Shepherd Clinic since 2003. He writes:

It is tough to be poor and sick in Tennessee.

We at Mtn Hope have ways to significantly improve not only our patients' survival, but also their quality of life. Too often, however, we are restricted by our patients' lack of insurance as many specialists will not give appointments to our uninsured patients. Medication cost are unaffordable.

For instance, good control of diabetes lessens the chance of heart attacks and kidney failure. Unfortunately, the costs of insulin and other newer diabetic medications run from \$300 to \$1000 a month. Fortunately, through our patient assistance program, we have been able to obtain from the pharmaceutical companies, these, and other medications at minimal cost to our patients. Last year the retail value of these medications was \$800,000.

We have another less well-known service that substantially improves the quality of their lives – an active office surgery program.

I recently received a price list for a local outpatient surgery group. This list was to show how much more economical their fees were compared with other similar clinics. The fee for removing a simple cyst started at \$500. A small skin cancer could easily pass \$1000. For our patients, being treated at that clinic would be a fantasy.

One such patient was a woman who came to Mountain Hope Clinic for a respiratory infection. She had bronchitis, but the most striking thing about her was a skin cancer the size of a large olive on her upper lip.



"You have a skin cancer on your lip," I told her.

"That's what they said when they biopsied it" she said.

"When was that?"

"About two years ago," she replied?

"Why haven't you done anything about it?"

"My doctor and the dermatologist told me they couldn't help. I had to see a plastic surgeon. We called four, they all said the same thing

- The first visit was \$500. After that they would tell me how much it would cost to remove."

She teared up. "We don't have \$500." She wiped her eyes. "Can't you do it?"

I reluctantly agreed to try. I explained to her that she would have considerable disfigurement, but if she ever got insurance a plastic surgeon could repair the scar. When we finished an hour and a half later, I'm not sure who was the most traumatized: the patient, me or the medical student who assisted me. I charged her the most I have ever charged a Mountain Hope patient at the time, \$75. It turned out better than I thought. She was ecstatic with the results. It has been five years and the cancer has not returned.

We remove four or five skin cancers a month in addition to abscesses, warts, cysts, and numerous suspicious moles that we send out to labs to be examined to be sure they are not melanomas. We substantially reduce many patients pain by injecting carpal tunnels and arthritic shoulders and knees. Except for the melanomas, none of the things we surgically treat would be fatal. But we do improve their pain, their view of themselves and their quality of life.

Perhaps this is what Jesus was speaking of when he said, "Whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me."

Our Clinic continues to provide quality medical, dental, and behavioral care to the uninsured. All services are possible through community support; we genuinely appreciate your heartfelt giving.

Margaret & Prayer Shawl Ministry,





I love lentil soup, especially during Lent! During Lent I do not add meat to it (a good option anytime though.) Just the name puts me in a contemplative perspective. While preparing it, sometimes I set some lentils aside and meditate on them as one might with rosary beads. It adds to the prep time, but I swear it adds love to the pot. Lentil soup is easy and biblical. Think the red pottage that Jacob gives Esau for his birthright. Next to grain, lentils and other beans are a huge component of biblical folks diets. And pretty healthy. Jewish legend calls the lentil "the mourners' meal" as it's' little round shape reminds one of the way death goes around and is all around'. A very Lenten theme.

During Lent I serve with flatbread, maybe hummus. Other times, it has meat (ham or beef) with rolls, olives and even a salad as sides. I do not like bland food so I use Mediterranean spices and have started adding lemon juice for a lift.

Also, I am not an exacting cook adding or subtracting to taste. Feel free to play with the recipe as needed for taste or health issues.

TIME: Prep - 10-15 mins/ Cook - 45-55 mins Servings: 4-6

INGREDIENTS

2-3 tbsp Olive Oil

1 med/lrg Onion (white, yellow, sweet)

2-3 garlic cloves or 1 TBS minced - minced

1-2 large Carrots or 1 \(\frac{1}{4} \) cups – coarsely chopped

2 Celery ribs or 1 cup - coarsely chopped

2 Cups of Lentils – use whatever variety at hand or a mix of yellow, brown, green, red (no need to pre-cook or soak lentils)

1 can or 1.25 cups crushed/ diced tomato with sauce/liquid

6 cups/ 1.5 quarts chicken broth (use vegetable if vegetarian or during Lent)

½ teaspoon each of freshly ground coriander, freshly ground toasted cumin

1½ teaspoons of paprika

2-3 bay leaves

2-3 tablespoons of lemon juice (if using whole lemon, use medium size and add zest)

Salt and pepper to taste



Len-ten Lentil Soup

INSTRUCTIONS

In dutch oven or large soup pot over medium heat, heat up olive oil. When oil is hot, add the onion, carrot, celery and salt. Sweat until the onions are translucent (take this slow – 7-10 minutes to create flavor base)

Add in Lentils and stir until coated

Add tomatoes and broth. Let cook ten minutes on medium before adding fresh spices

Add spices and bring to a simmer about 10 minutes.

Cover, reduce heat and cook 20-30 minutes until lentils are tender. You may want to skim the float off the surface as it bubbles up.

Turn off heat. Remove bay leaves.

Serve.

SERVING NOTES:

- Season to taste with salt and pepper. Grate over the zest of the lemon then add a squeeze of lemon juice just before serving. Garnish with parsley if desired and serve with warm crusty bread slathered liberally with butter!
 - · For thicker or thickest soup:
- For Thicker soup (this is best of both worlds. Gives richer thick soup with bean/veggie texture) remove 2 cups and let cool slightly in blender or processor. Use towel or pot holder when holding top to blend. Whirl for 1-2 mins. Mix back into main pot.
 - For Thickest soup using stick blender in pot (or remove after cooling ALL in batches) blend entire pot
 - · Soup freezes well for at least 3-5 months. But it is too yummy to stick around long

I'm able to get around and sometimes have to realize all the things that I want to do are maybe not possible. Bummer! Oh well, that is life.



Over the years I have been on many committees and teams at Grace. The Lord has been looking out for me, especially on my 19-day bike trips with 18+ teenagers. I look back and think how did I do all that? We had to have sponsors for our miles ridden to raise money for special projects. We rode our own bikes packed with sleeping bags and our necessary items. We didn't have a vehicle following us or have cell phones. Each afternoon we stopped at a scheduled church, shopped for food, slept on concrete floors (usually). What an adventure! People were friendly and of course we attracted a lot of attention. I don't believe we could do it now considering how traffic and everything else has changed. Our boys went on many of the trips. I was happy to be able to go with them on a trip around Lake Michigan and then on a trip to Knoxville's World's Fair & back. Another special trip for me was 7 days of canoeing and camping in the Boundary Waters. On all the trips we all learned a lot about each other and about ourselves.

Grace has been a big part of my social life and my children as they were growing up. It is amazing what can be accomplished with God's help and everyone working together. I'm not comfortable speaking in public so I do a lot of my church work behind the scenes.

I retired 20 years ago from a rewarding job as an Occupational Health nurse at Caterpillar Inc. I've spent 20 years volunteering as a CASA/GAL (Court Appointed Special Advocate/Guardian Ad litem) for the Abuse and Neglect Court of Kane County.
