It is that time of year again when we run around buying gifts, putting up lights, and traveling all over the country. Christmas songs play in every store and mall hallway. In some ways, this Advent season brings excitement, fun, memories, and good food...the usual. For others, it brings loneliness, frustration, depression, and sorrow. Maybe you feel like it brings both at the same time. It can be confusing, and perhaps there is another way.

Advent is traditionally a time to pause and reflect on the work of Jesus, and why God became man and broke into this world. When we focus on Christ, we receive the power to weather this holiday storm, no matter what we are struggling with. I encourage you to keep your eyes on the Light of the World and let Him bring light to your Christmas season.

Throughout Advent we will be running a sermon series called "A Thrill of Hope: The Heart of Our Carols." We will explore the biblical roots of some of our favorite Christmas hymns as a lens to see the Christmas

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

I like to recommend a resource during the Christmas season to help keep our hearts and minds on Jesus. There is a devotional about Christmas hymns I have been enjoying that I would like to share with you: "Joyful Noel: Rediscovering Classic Christmas Hymns and Carols" by John Williamson. We will have three copies available in the library if you would like to borrow one, and you can always purchase a copy for yourself. This devotional is a great way to start your day this Advent season.

I want to challenge you to use this Advent season as an opportunity to be on mission. Perhaps there is someone you can bless through service. Perhaps a neighbor, friend, or co-worker you can surprise by showering love upon them. Is there someone you know who desperately needs to know Jesus? Let this Advent season be an opportunity to share your faith. Pray and look for opportunities to let this person know about the incredible Light of the World who broke into the darkness. Why not invite someone to Bethany for the Advent season? As we are on mission for God. He continues to mold and shape our hearts toward Him. May this Advent season be one of warmth, love, joy, and fruitfulness in mission through the One who gives us everything we need.

THE HAVEN Community Food Pantry at Bethany Church

We wanted to share a little update about how God is blessing the ministry of the Haven.

Between the current economic squeeze and the ripple effects from the recent government shutdown, a lot of folks are finding it incredibly hard to stretch their budgets and cover basic needs. Christ brings a peace deeper than circumstances. His presence quiets anxious hearts. "My peace I give you." John 14:27








Operation Christmas Child









This year's Operation Christmas Child collection week was a great success. We had had the privilege of dedicating 102 shoeboxes donated by Bethany members during the Sunday, November 23 service. Additionally, 568 shoeboxes came through the doors of Bethany Church on their way to the central drop off location in New Castle where nearly 20,000 shoeboxes were collected from churches in our local region. These shoeboxes will now move on to a national processing center before traveling to children in far off lands. Operation Christmas Child is a wonderful opportunity to share the Good News of love and saving grace of Jesus Christ through these simple shoeboxes. Since 1993, over 232

Bethany Church members and friends have been part of this program for many years by donating hundreds of shoeboxes as well as donations towards The Greatest Journey – a 12-week lesson discipleship program for shoebox recipients. Through this program children learn about Jesus Christ, and many have prayed and accepted Him as their Lord and Savior.

Heating System Update

If you've been in the church over the past week or so, you may have noticed that it's been a little chilly in some areas. That's because Roth Mechanical has been hard at work installing a brand-new boiler. Our old boiler was nearly 40 years old and had been giving us plenty of trouble in recent years.

Over the past couple of years, the Property Committee has carefully researched the best way to update our heating system throughout the church. Earlier this summer, we also replaced the rooftop unit that heats and cools the sanctuary, which had been old and failing as well. The good news is that the new rooftop unit is now working beautifully!

We expect the boiler installation to be completed soon—hopefully within the next week—so that we'll have full heat again before the really cold weather arrives.

You may also be wondering about the cost of these improvements. We've been preparing for these expenses for quite some time and have been setting aside funds for them. If you've noticed a negative number in the financial section of the newsletter, it's because we've been paying for the new equipment but haven't yet transferred the money from our savings. Once that transfer is made, the numbers will look much better.

Although our financial statement appears to show that we are running a deficit, in reality, the amount that we are in the negative was spent on the bell and heating system repairs that were planned from the beginning of the year. The money for those repairs is in our savings account and will be transferred at the end of the year. Our finances are in good order.



THE CANDLE IN THE WINDOW A CHRISTMAS STORY OF HOPE

It was Christmas Eve in a small mountain town blanketed with snow. 
