Jesus uses this worldly concern as an opportunity to teach a lesson on the dangers of all kinds of greed, and the truth that one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions. How hard it is to learn this eternal truth.





Stranger

Wanting to vindicate himself, he asked Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" —Luke 10.29

God is universally kind, even, Jesus says, to the ungrateful and the wicked.

God asks us to love our neighbors.

Meaning, of course: Who aren't?

In Jesus' parable the neighbor is the stranger, the outsider. The Hebrew Bible says in one verse to love your neighbor—and 36 times—36 times— it says to love the stranger. Because you yourselves are strangers, not insiders.

Don't look for "something to love" in one who is different. Love them.

Love is not latching on to what we have in common, or making us alike in some way, but honoring one who is different.

Allowing them to stay different.

Honoring their being, not their condition.

Seeing God's image in one who is unlike you.

Because they are God's,

who is infinite,

and whose image in us is therefore of infinite variety,


and who loves us

Volunteer Opportunities At Resurrection Street Ministries

The LOC community last summer started working with Resurrection Street Ministry located at Stapley and Main in Mesa, donating water to their heat respite center. This year, the Faith in Action team is planning to expand our involvement with their community, increasing our donations to include water, shelf-staple lunches, snacks, items for their respite center, and volunteer coordination to help with meals and other ser-

vices.

Resurrection Street Ministry (RSM) heat respite center coordinates with the city of Mesa, has opened and is operating from 9:30 a.m to 6:30 p.m., Tuesday through Sunday. Guests can get out of the heat, have lunch and snacks, take showers, and do laundry. The facility accepts pets, and has a system to secure bicycles. RSM is also home to a thrift shop and food pantry.

We are seeking volunteers as described below.

We have extended our plans to help Resurrected Street Ministries every Friday for the month of August. Thank you for your generosity in kind and donations! These duties may include talking to visitors to answer questions or just visiting with them, escorting them to various areas of the facility, including lunch, showers and laundry, cots where they can sleep. We are planning to provide and pass out snacks to the visitors as well as help prepare and serve food.

About Family Promise

In Operation since 2000, Family Promise – Greater Phoenix has provided more than just shelter for families. For the past 19 years, the programs at Family Promise have helped more than 500 families. These programs have enabled families to move from homelessness to self-sufficiency.

The Family Promise Mission is providing emergency shelter and social services to help families move toward independent housing and self-sufficiency. Vision:

The Vision of Family Promise is a community of whole and healthy families.

At Family Promise, we give families the tools and training to care for their children, find employment and housing, and become independent and successful. We strive to provide a safety net for children and their families before they drop into a cycle of endless shelters, loss of school attendance, unemployment, family instability and foster care.

Family Promise provides basic needs such as food, clothing and shelter, but we also provide a safe, encouraging, and constructive environment for families that feel lost and scared. Family Promise's long-term goal is to break the cycle of homelessness and create a sense of community for the families that participate in the program, and the thousands of volunteers that have contributed to this program over the years.

The Faith In Action Team

Some of you might be wondering what the Faith In Action Team does and how do they decide on which organizations to help. Here are the guidelines that the Faith in Action Team uses when determining which organizations to help.

Faith in Action Team Guidelines

The Faith in Action team serves as a bridge between our church community and the wider world, discerning how best to support the ELCA and Christ-centered ministries through financial gifts, donations, and volunteer efforts. These guidelines ensure that the team's efforts align with our faith, values, and mission.

The following guidelines will be used when determining support for a ministry:

- 1. **The Impact on the Recipients**: Who will be receiving the donation and how will it be used to address critical needs such as food, shelter, clothing, healthcare, education, and spiritual growth. Will this gift provide dignity, empowerment, and long-term benefits for recipients.
- 2. Impact on Our Church Community and our neighbors. (World, National, State,

and Local) The project/ministry should reflect and enhance our congregation's commitment to living out the gospel of Jesus Christ and fit within the mission of the ELCA. Regular updates, testimonies, or success stories from the project are encouraged to inspire the congregation and how their support is making a difference.

- 3. How Can We support this ministry (meaning money, donations in kind, time, talent) will it provide opportunities for hands-on involvement where possible, enabling members of our church community to serve directly. Are clear communications about the roles, time commitment, and training required for volunteers provided.
- 4. **Does the organization have a belief of "love your neighbor"?** Meaning, does the ministry reflect the teachings and mission of Jesus Christ. And does the ministry demonstrate God's love and grace through acts of compassion, justice and service. **Follow -Up-** We are asking that the volunteer provide a video or enews follow-up The Faith In Action Team will use these guidelines to reflect our commitment to be Christ's hands and feet in the world, demonstrating faith through action while strengthening our own faith community. It is our hope and prayer that we can best serve as God's instruments of love and transformation.



Pastor Steve's sermon title: "Take Care! Be on Guard"

Ecclesiastes 1:2, 12-14; 2:18-23

Vanity of vanities, says the Teacher. vanity of vanities! All is vanity. ¹² I, the Teacher, was king over Israel in Jerusalem. ¹³ I applied my mind to seek and to search out by wisdom all that is done under heaven; it is an unhappy business that God has given to humans to be busy with. 14 I saw all the deeds that are done under the sun, and see, all is vanity and a chasing after wind.

¹⁸ I hated all my toil in which I had toiled under the sun, seeing that I must leave it to my successor, ¹⁹ and who knows whether he will be wise or foolish? Yet he will be master of all for which I toiled and used my wisdom under the sun. This also is vanity. 20 So I turned and gave my heart up to despair concerning all the toil of my labors under the sun, 21 because sometimes one who has toiled with wisdom and knowledge and skill must leave all to be enjoyed by another who did not toil for it. This also is vanity and a great evil. ²² What do mortals get from all the toil and strain with which they toil under the sun? ²³ For all their days are full of pain, and their work is a vexation; even at night their minds do not rest. This also is vanity.

Colossians 3:1-11

So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. ² Set your minds on the things that are above, not on the things that are on earth, ³ for you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. 4 When Christ who is your [a] life is revealed, then you al-

so will be revealed with him in glory. ⁵ Put to death, therefore, whatever in you is earthly: sexual immorality, impurity, passion, evil desire, and greed (which is idolatry). 6 On account of these the wrath of God is coming on those who are disobedient. ^[b] ⁷ These are the ways you also once followed, when you were living that life. [c] 8 But now you must get rid of all such things: anger, wrath, malice, slander, and abusive a language from your mouth. 9 Do not lie to one another, seeing that you have stripped off the old self with its practices 10 and have clothed yourselves with the new self, which is being renewed in knowledge according to the image of its creator. ¹¹ In that renewal e there is no longer Greek and Jew, circumcised and uncircumcised, barbarian, Scythian, enslaved and free, but Christ is all and in all!

Luke 12:13-21

The Someone in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, tell my brother to divide the family inheritance with me." 14 But he said to him, "Friend, who set me to be a judge or arbitrator over you?" ¹⁵ And he said to them, "Take care! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed, for one's life does not consist in the abundance of possessions." ¹⁶ Then he told them a parable: "The land of a rich man produced abundantly. 17 And he thought to himself, 'What should I do, for I have no place to store my crops?' 18 Then he said, 'I will do this: I will pull down my barns and build larger ones, and there I will store all my grain and my goods. ¹⁹ And I will say to my soul, Soul, you have ample goods laid up

for many years; relax, eat, drink, be merry.' ²⁰ But God said to him, 'You fool! This very night your life is being demanded of you. And the things you have prepared, whose will they be?' ²¹ So it is with those who store up treasures for themselves but are not rich toward God."
