Abortion, Death Penalty, and Pro-Life Lutheranism

This past month, we have seen a Ukrainian girl stabbed/killed on the subway in Charlotte. We have all watched the assassination of Charlie Kirk at Utah Valley University. We have also therefore brought up recent discussions about the death penalty due to Tyler Robinson. In this brief article, I will not be able to address even one of these issues fully, though they each deserve our time and attention.

Additionally, some of us recently attended the National Lutherans for Life conference in Fort Collins, Colorado. And our Synod President Matthew C. Harrison recently published an article in the Reporter about Charlie Kirk which is worthy of your time and linked below. In our Circuit Winkel at Curtis on September 30th, this article was particularly recommended to all the pastors and congregations in our circuit.

And the Youtherans brought up tonight the Pope's recent comments regarding the award due to Sen. Dick Durbin. Of course we do not much care what the Pope says about anything at all, but he essentially claimed that he can be against abortion, against the death penalty, and for the immigrant.

At the root of all of this is the Fifth Commandment: You shall not murder. What does this mean? We should fear and love God so that we do not hurt or harm our neighbor in his body, but help and support him in every physical need.

Let me be clear: Death happens and will continue to happen. The wages of sin is death. But it is the Lord who gives and the Lord who takes away. Abortion is sin because it is the killing of a baby. Miscarriage on the other hand is not sin, but is rather the effect of sin, a truly deep and difficult suffering for Christians to endure.

And murder is sin. Tyler Robinson is a murderer. The man who stabbed Iryna in the subway is a murderer. And Genesis 9:6 applies: "Whoever sheds the blood of man, by man shall his blood be shed, for God made man in his own image." We are pro-life Lutherans who are against abortion, and we are for the death penalty. It was God's command after the Flood, and it was repeated in Romans 13:4- For the one in authority is God's servant for your good. But if you do wrong, be afraid, for rulers do not bear the sword for no reason. They are God's servants, agents of wrath to bring punishment on the wrongdoer.

We would expect the Pope to teach false doctrine, and thanks be to God, we do not follow him. Rather we follow God's Word and believe what the Bible says.

To wrap up for now, I leave you with this comfort: Jesus suffered capital punishment on Good Friday. He and two thieves (and should have been Barabbas) were killed on the cross. The two thieves died for their crimes, one unrepentant and the other repentant. But they still paid the price, a life for a life. Jesus, on the other hand, is the only person in history who does not deserve the death penalty, and yet He willingly died on the cross to save you. He died so that you live. He died so that your sins are paid for. He died the most gruesome, public, humiliating death for your soul's everlasting life in heaven with God. Don't fall into the devil's trap of being against the death penalty when your own Lord saved your soul through that very means.

Let us in the meantime pray about all of these "life" issues and give thanks to God for the life granted to us here on earth and the promise granted to us of life eternal with Him.

Rod Christmann moved to adjourn. Bob Lantis seconded the motion. Motion carried.





MENS BIBLE STUDY

"The **Men's Tuesday Bible Study (8am)** is studying Ephesians 6:10-18, "Your Strong Suit". "The scientific evidence on the many links between housing and health has grown substantially in recent decades (www.who.int)."

Examples of key housing-related health risks include: respiratory and cardiovascular diseases from indoor air pollution; illness and deaths from temperature extremes; communicable diseases spread because of poor living conditions, and risks of home injuries. WHO (World Health Organization) estimates that nearly 2 million people in developing countries die from indoor air pollution caused by the burning of biomass and coal in leaky and inefficient household stoves (Download the entire report here).

When you come build a house with Amor, you impact so much more than their living space. You provide them with the opportunity for a higher quality of life. They are able to feel secure knowing they have a solid roof over their heads protecting them from the outside elements. 
