

# Congregation voted on Call Committee's selection

After it's positive vote, the Call Committee, headed by Beth Heisey, recommended to the Trustees and the congregation to extend a Call to Pastor Jason Pankau to become our next Pastor.

Jason brings a multi-faceted background of leadership and wisdom to people and organizations with whom he works. God currently uses him as a life coach and consultant to executives, mentor to pastors and Christian leaders, and is a soughtafter speaker, creator of Christian training seminars, and best-selling author. Jason is a former two-sport All-American athlete, serving as captain of the Brown University football team and national qualifier



in the discus. In 2014, he was commissioned to lead the LUKE project which focused on revitalizing five congregations in the city of Chicago. In 2017, his family moved to the inner city of Chicago to plant Chicago Hope Church, a multi-cultural, disciple-making community on the Near West Side of Chicago. This is where they expanded their family and took in students and people from the community in need. This ministry is called the Hope House for Christian N.U.R.T.U.R.E.. Jason is married and has four children.

Those who were present for worship on August 27th heard Pastor Pankau preach as the Call Committee invited him and his wife, Jennifer, to St. Paul's for a visit.

A specially-called meeting of the congregation was held on Sunday, October 15th, to affirm the Call Committee's selection (or not) and we are happy to report that the congregation voted to do just that. (Final tally: Yes—102; No—8.)

As we wait on Pastor Pankau's response, the Trustees continue to be actively involved with Pastor Jason regarding his Call to be with us.

"Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with each other and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you.

And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity." COL 3:12-14

This is a time of year we tend to celebrate the fullness of gratitude we each have to God. Especially on pondering <u>all</u> of our blessings. Even as we think of them ever so briefly, it leads to a spirit of thanksgiving for many of us. Which in turn for many—increases our giving even more to others, and to God's Church and ministries, in deep appreciation.

For the faithful Jesus disciple, it's easy to become deeply moved, even tearful over how *awesome* our God *is* and how *generous* He has been to us all. The Scripture above reminds God's Holy People to show our world what a Biblical, life-living Jesus-attitude *looks* like. It's full of His kind of compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness, patience and forgiveness. A kind of life-living attitude we are asked to carry, which culminates in one thing. <u>True love</u> as Jesus lived it, and as God proclaims it, throughout His Word.

Chuck Swindoll wrote some words many years ago that I believe also have a lot to say about the significance of where you and I presently are, within the *choosing* and *acting upon* our present attitudes. I pray that your overall attitude, your life-outlook, be a blessing to you and those that touch your life. Both *now* and *ahead*. In a spirit of thanksgiving and with deep gratitude, even joy in your celebration of your provision, and the greatest blessing of them all—Jesus Christ. So, wisely *choose* your attitude leading to loving actions, all your days ahead.

### The longer I live, the more I realize the impact of attitude on life.

Attitude, to me, is more important than facts. It is more important than the past, than education, than money, than circumstances, than failures, than successes, than what other people think or say or do. # Check out our sermon topics for November

We start out the month with our annual "All Saints Sunday" observance. On this Sunday we will be remembering those who we have lost this past year.

The next week, we will look at the "Lord of All". We will be examining the biblical, theological, and practical understanding of the lordship of Jesus. Jesus is not just a means to heaven or a good teacher, but Lord of all the universe. Our walk with Jesus is not segregated to a personal rather it spiritual feeling, influences every aspect of our life and the ethic we live out each day.

The Sunday before Thanksgiving we will "Give Thanks To God Our Father". We will look at Jesus' words on materialism and worry. This message reminds us that we must be thankful for God's good gifts despite our circumstances.

Finally, we will end the month on Christ the King Sunday with "Glory to Glory". We will be examining the biblical truth of God's surpassing glory in the new covenant in contrast to the old covenant. Through understanding Paul's imagery, we can see the reality of God's glory in Jesus and the challenge to change old habits that hinder what God is doing.

The lyrics are appropriate for any time of giving or thanksgiving. Consider using this hymn as your Thanksgiving dinner prayer:



Praise God from whom all blessings flow; Praise him, all creatures here below; Praise him above, ye heavenly host; Praise Father, Son and Holy Ghost.

Some church bodies have altered the words to "The Doxology" slightly, but the overall sentiment — praising the Triune God — remains the same. How profound to know that when we sing it, we join Christians around the world and across hundreds of years!

#### **Prayer Corner**

# Church office closed for Thanksgiving


The church office will be closed on Thursday, November 23, and Friday, November 24, for the Thanksgiving holiday.

The office will reopen at 8:00 am on Monday, November 27.



Handicrafts can spark appreciation for simple items. Weave this basket as a gift.



#### What you need:

- Paper plate
- Pencil
- Scissors
- Yarn (different colors)

#### What you do:

- 1. In the center of the plate, trace something round. Draw 9 lines (evenly spaced) from the circle to the plate's edge.
- Cut along each line, stopping at the center circle. Trim more of the plate off so the cuts make a gradual V shape.
- 3. Fold the plate's sides upward to form basket sides. Keep these upright as you weave a bowl-shaped basket.
- 4. Begin weaving a length of yarn at the circle's base. Hold the end of the yarn in place as you spread the length over and under each side of the plate.
- 5. Switch colors to make a pattern. Keep the yarn tight as you weave up the sides.
- 6. To finish, bend down any remaining paper. Leave a tail of yarn and tuck it under a woven portion. Share your craft with a friend!


