

Join us for Advent & Christmas worship!



On the first three Sundays of Advent, beginning on December 3rd, we will examine how Christ's birth changed the entire course of history. We even separate history according to Jesus' birth (B.C. to A.D.)! Our sermon series called **"The Line"** uses passages from scripture that don't normally fill an Advent calendar to show how Jesus changed the world by entering history as the God-man, and He can change our lives as well.

The last Sunday of Advent is Christmas Eve. In the morning, we will have one service at 9:30 am. At this service we will sing carols and have members share testimonies of how they have seen God in their lives.

Later that day, under the theme, **"The Wonder of Christmas"**, we will have our usual Christmas Eve schedule of services: **3:00 pm, 7:00 pm, and 10:30 pm**. At these services, we will explore the power of the incarnation of God in Jesus and the importance of God dwelling with a broken humanity to bring about redemption. Our 3:00 pm service is a family-friendly Communion Service and a nursery is available for ages 0-4. The 7:00 pm service is a family-friendly Communion Service with candle lighting. And finally, our 10:30 pm service is a Communion Service with candle lighting.

As the Israelites did, we will look back to remember God's faithfulness in the past year, and then look forward to consider how we can trust him this coming year.

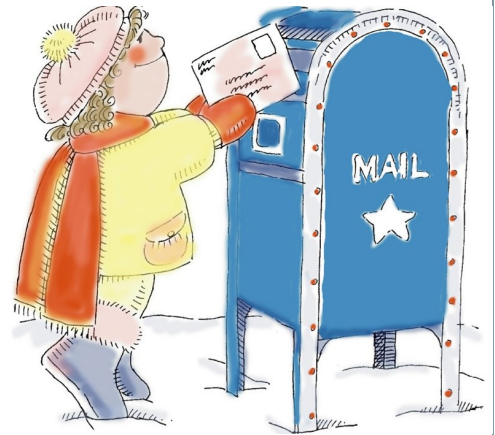

LETTERS FROM HOME

I would like us to take on a new challenge the next couple of months. Let this month's **Health Matters** be an encouragement to you to think about either a loved one, or maybe someone not that well known to you that you indeed care about. Tell them that you care about them; that they have made a difference in your life, where that is true. Maybe even let them know that you've been praying for them—if you have, or have begun to.

This special person (or perhaps these special people) may be a family member you've lost touch with, or possibly a long-lost friend, perhaps a shut-in here at St. Paul's, or maybe a man or woman who has been faithfully serving our nation in the armed forces. Please take a few moments this month and make an effort to remind, encourage, and even bless someone with the knowledge that they are in your thoughts or prayers. Let them know that you really appreciate them and what they have brought to your life. Or, perhaps, simply acknowledge who they are as a fellow brother or sister in Christ Jesus.



There is a sense of urgency in Paul's original language words here (Greek): **"As we have opportunity..."** It literally implies **seizing** the time we now have to do this supportive thing; taking advantage of the moment while the occasion is yet available. Sometimes the opportunity to make a difference in another's life occurs only once before it is lost forever. St. Paul's words remind us that if we do not take this point in time and grasp this opportunity for sowing, we may never reap a "full" harvest.

My prayer for you this month is that the Holy Spirit direct you to contact that person (those people) right now that would so appreciate hearing an encouraging word from you. Do it in celebration of the love and all the blessings God has shown you.

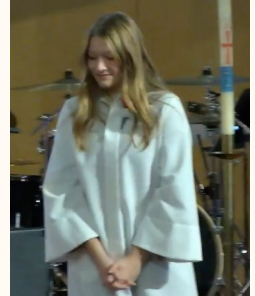
Confirmation celebrated on Reformation Sunday

December Message from Aaron

64%

According to recent data published by TENX10, and the Barna Group. Both leading experts in ministry trends, but particularly youth ministry trends, record that the number of students aged 18-24 that will walk away from their faith is 64%. That makes a conservative estimate of 10 million people that will leave their faith in the next 10 years. And the reasons they give are really pretty shocking.

Hypocrisy, irrelevance, and inauthentic are the 3 main reasons they give. And I could devote an article to any one of those, but I'm gonna focus on inauthenticity. For some of you, perhaps you think I share too much about my own personal life and struggles. That's not my view, but I understand it. My counter to that is this: I would rather overshare than under-share, and that's deliberate on my part.

Because the data shows that Gen Z responds best to a faith they see as transformative. As in, Gen Z responds best when they see how what you claim to believe is actually changing you as a person. So, I think, what we as a church need to do, is embody authentic vulnerability. Being willing to discuss all the ways Jesus is changing and transforming us as Christians, and as human beings. And that involves openness and vulnerability. Discussing the tensions Jesus calls us into, as we live out where we are, and embody obedience as we become who He intends for us to be.

struggling folks in our local area? Want to do something that can be done when you do your grocery shopping? The Outreach MAT has an opportunity for you! Both of our food storehouses have seen an increase of use by families who are having a hard time with the lack of food in these times of rising costs. God's Storehouse offers an inside "store" for families as well as The Blessing Box which is our outdoor 24/7 "store".

Every month, we will ask for donations of a particular item to "stock the store". These items are ones that are in demand by our families. You can help us out by purchasing that item while you are shopping and donating it at church in a special box labeled "Stock the Store".

For December, you can "stock the store" by donating toilet paper and towel (like Bounty). So watch each month in the Gathering Space for the item you can donate to help Outreach MAT "stock the store". Thank you for your support!!

### God's Blessing Box (outside parking lot food pantry)

An offshoot of our God's Storehouse is God's Blessing Box which is our 24/7 outdoor non-perishable food items pantry. Stocked with items from God's Storehouse, the Blessing Box offers an opportunity for struggling community members to find food or personal items they need for their homes. With the "take what you need" or "leave what you can" philosophy, this outdoor food pantry has seen a lot of business. If you would

like to donate to this pantry, leave NON-PERISHABLE items (canned goods, boxed dinners, etc.) in the red box near the Gibbs Street parking lot entrance. Thank you for donating to this ministry!

### Baby University (a Mosaic ministry)

Baby University ministers to families in Toledo's Old South End. They are collecting children's books especially board books (hard cover). Research proves that reading to children from birth (or even before birth) every day for the first five years prepares them for success when they start formal schooling. Parents are their children's first and most important teachers. We, as a congregation, can help them achieve their mission by providing them with books.



There is a collection container in the Gathering Space to place the books. Thank you for helping this important, but vulnerable part of our population.

### Aldi's Plastic Handled Bags

Because of restricted supply from Aldi's, Outreach MAT's collection of plastic, handled bags used to pack the Holiday Baskets is dwindling. We could use your help! If you shop at Aldi's, please consider purchasing a dozen bags for our use when we do the Food Baskets. We need about 250-300 bags. The bags have white handles and are \$0.13 each. ### God's Storehouse (St. Paul's food pantry)

God's Storehouse, our food pantry, is St. Paul Lutheran's "hand up" for families in the area who are struggling to make ends meet in these difficult times.

Try building a 3-D Christmas tree!

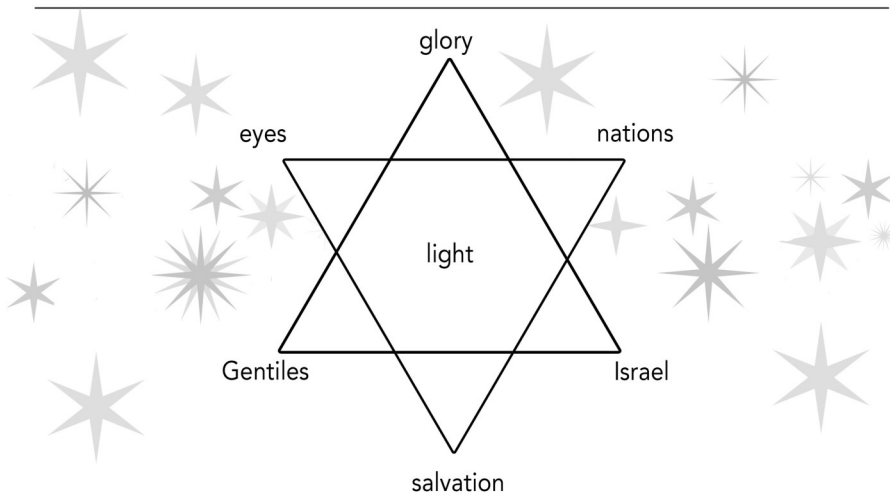
