

Join us for an Epiphany "celebration"

"These things I have spoken to you, That my joy may be in you, And that your joy may be full."." JN 15:11, ESV

Joy. <u>Joy</u> has a variety of dictionary definitions. For example, joy—is a *vivid* emotion of pleasure arising from a sense of well-being or satisfaction. Joy—is the feeling or state of being highly pleased or delighted. Joy—is a feeling that echoes an *exultation* of spirit, gladness, or delight.

Upon researching some for the purpose of a sermon, one thing I could not find in the secular definitions of "joy" I read, was a clear statement of accountability for the joy we either have, or not. The joy communicated in scripture does include accountability as part of its meaning. Can there be such a thing as a "joyless Christian" for example? With rare exceptions, in the majority of cases, it would seem that a "joyless Christian" would only be true through one's free choice.

A "joyless Christian" sounds like an oxymoron. Two words stuck together that pointedly clash with one another. It's like saying something is pretty ugly, awfully good, or growing smaller.

When we are obedient in love to the teachings of Jesus, we *are* at the same time faithful stewards of His calling us to be His Servants. We become His loving servants whenever we abide in Him (*take up your cross and follow me*, He said). Jesus asks His followers to minister to one another for the sake of His Kingdom. Both in the here and now, and His Kingdom to come.

Are you abiding in Jesus? When we faithfully abide in Him, <u>Kingdom fruit</u> results. Even more fruit results when we are pruned a bit. Our life's situations being a catalyst. Prayers are "answered" when <u>we abide</u>. Relations become ever *deeper* in the Lord. Joy is felt; expressed; enjoyed.

"I slept, and I dreamt that life was all joy. I woke, and saw that life was but service. I served, and discovered that service was joy," wrote Rabindranath Tagore. Jesus informed His disciples that their joy would correspond to their obedience to His teachings. How Jesus lived and what He taught indeed produces freedom and joy. Never bondage. Never grief. Never a sense of hopelessness. But most of all, a study of the joy Jesus experienced shows that it came as a result of how Jesus selflessly served others. Who is Jesus calling you to serve in His name this coming year?

May the New Year find you taking advantage of all those *serving* opportunities God sends your way in 2024. To be His servant in love and in obedience to Him. And may the *joy* of <u>Jesus</u> fill your hearts and minds all along the paths He leads you.

January Message from Aaron

"Repentance"

I've been thinking a lot about repentance recently. To repent literally means to turn from something and turn toward God. What is that, if not a choice. To repent is to choose. At the family youth group, I'd been teaching through 1 Peter, and 1 Peter 2 opens in a rather strange way. "Therefore, put away all malice, slander, hypocrisy, and envy..." Peter starts with the assumption that that's who the readers are.

Who WE are. I can recognize in my own life how true that is, that I can be hypocritical, envious, slander others, bear malicious intent. What strikes me isn't that. What strikes me is the call to put it away. Those things are so difficult to change. Maybe even impossible. Yet notice what Peter says, put it away. You can change. Those things he lists have a way of corrupting us, of molding us. And yet Peter's message for us is that Jesus enables us to change.

For me, that's really good news, that I can change. That you can, too. Maybe you gossip a lot, maybe you lie, maybe you're addicted, maybe you're a hypocrite. Because of Jesus, the message is the same though. You can change. That may be who you were, but it doesn't have to be who you become, it doesn't have to be who you stay. When Jesus was born in that manger, everything changed, and we can, too. Those things that seem like they have such a powerful grip on your life, they don't have to have the final say. They don't have to define you.

You can receive something so much better in Christ. As we enter a season of resolutions to change. That's really the spirit of Christianity. That you can change. That change is possible, and real.



Geodes look plain on the outside but contain beautiful crystals. Create these "rocks" to show how God makes us new on the inside.

What you need:

 Clean cardboard egg carton



- Scissors (and adult help)
- Epsom salt
- Plastic zippered bags (one per color of dye)
- Food coloring
- Glue
- Paintbrush



What you do:

- 1. Cut out the tops and bottoms of all the egg compartments so you can make 6 ball shapes.
- 2. In each bag, put 3 tablespoons of Epsom salt and a drop or two of food coloring. Seal and shake to mix.
- With the paintbrush, spread glue inside two egg-carton halves. Sprinkle a spoonful of Epsom salt into those halves. Then close and shake.
- 4. Open your homemade geode and shake out excess salt.
- 5. Optional: Preserve the crystals with a coat of clear-drying glue.
