
The date of Pastor David's Installation Service is unknown at this writing but he's already getting comfortable his office and he's with us on Sundays.

We will be starting our Lenten journey on **Ash Wednesday**, **February 14th.** On Wednesday's we will be doing a

series called "Broken For Us" which contemplates the reasons why Jesus is going to the cross. Our lives are hard—because of our own sinfulness, but also because of the actions of the world. God knows this and has promised to deliver us from the pain of this world. He promises the ultimate redemption of the world and of all those who believe. The concentration of his promises is found in Jesus' cross. On Sunday's we will be continuing our journey through a series called "Just As He Promised" which focuses on the promises that God has made to us. We need to start with the situation that God promises himself into our sin and brokenness. It's not going to be easy for us; in fact, it will probably be harder than we can ever know. Yet, God promises his hope and his new life, and we will see it in our lives.

Pastor David's Message

David Kaiser has recently joined St. Paul's as our Interim Contract Senior Pastor. He has been an occasional guest preacher here for about 12 years. David and his wife, Kelly run an organization in the Old South End of Toledo called Mosaic Ministries. St. Paul's has been a supporter of Mosaic; serving dinners and helping in other ways.

Contracting with David will deepen the connection between the two ministries. Mosaic is too small to support a full-time pastor. For St. Paul's, the advantage is having a local platform for evangelism. If you would like to volunteer at Mosaic please let David know. We will communicate more about Mosaic in future newsletters.

David and Kelly married for 38 years ago and have 5 children and 6 grandchildren, so far. They started Mosaic Ministries 16 years ago. The goal is to transform individuals and the neighborhood through the power of the gospel and education. Low-income kids in most of our cities are falling terribly far behind middle class children.

David is very excited to serve at St. Paul's. "I think the church has a great foundation for the two kinds of growth I hope to see Jesus cause here. The first is individual growth in our relationship with Him. The second is congregational devotion to increasing our impact for His kingdom. My first priority is to get to know each of you. I hope to talk with each person regularly and meet together a few times per year as well."

Health Matters Paul Doerfler, Pastor

"If you love me, keep my commands. And I will ask the Father, and he will give—you another advocate to help you and be with you forever—the Spirit of truth. The world cannot accept him, because it neither sees him nor knows him. But you know him, for he lives with you and will be in you. I will not leave you as orphans; I will come to you. Before long, the world will not see me anymore, but you will see me. Because I live, you also will live." JN 14:15-19

As you consider the New Year and what lies ahead for you, think about reflecting on how *you* would answer that *same* question Jesus asked his disciples, soon before leaving this earth: "*But what about you?"* he inquired. "*Who do you say I am?"* MT 16:15.

With most of 2024 still ahead, do you realize that both the daily behaviors and words you chose to use, or to *not* use *now*, pretty much defines who Jesus presently <u>is</u> to you? Also, that <u>this</u>, in turn, becomes *your* Jesus witness to those within your circle of community life?

As Jesus followers, we accept Him as our life's "template." Through your reading and studying of God's Word, *who* Jesus *is* to *you*, your life-witness of Him, is disclosed by how you daily live. I'm reminded of that old adage parents use with their kids when they know they are falling short in some manner of their "Good Housekeeping" parental standards, and they sharply respond to them with a: "Do as I say, *not* as I do." When they too, find it hard, to meet The Jesus Standard. As loving parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles, sisters, brothers, fellow Jesus followers—the "bar" is high. And that "perfection standard" is impossible for us all. So, what is one to do?

I don't know if it's merely a new trend this year, or, if the science will actually hold true beyond 2024. But, I've read some rather unique articles recently, re the "best new way" to break old, unhealthy habits. Over the years, we've been constantly barraged by incentives concocted to help make us crave, then quickly consume a "thing" of multiple types, and/or origins. Call it brain overload via too many choices, or time-stressors in excess—we are being drawn into the "Devil's playground" through worldly thinking and at times, mindless acting. Our brains, originally wired primarily for survival and bearing Kingdom fruit for God, are being hijacked such, that much of life is now focused primarily on "me." Resulting in unhealthy habits enduring.

I'm not telling you anything you don't already know when I expose—how self-control, as the old key-approach to handling habits, often fails. There's brain chemistry involved when habits form. There are "feel-good" chemicals at work in the brain helping to reinforce one's harmful ways. Be they drugs, excessive alcohol, smoking, unhealthy sexual choices, etc. Yet, there's a cited better way now, of handling habits than simple self-discipline. Science these days call it: mindfulness.

The art of mindfulness training tries to make people more aware of that "reward" which reinforces their particular unhealthy behavior. They're helped to identify what really drives their bad habits in the first place. Then, once they're more aware, they discover the reward isn't nearly as gratifying as they first believed. Thus, unhealthy behaviors can more easily be changed, by consciously realizing the reward isn't worth the risks, in simple terms. While this idea may be newer to science, there's nothing new under sun with God. Let me end this "new science realization" by invoking Our Creator, who gives us all we need, in His Word.

God has already spoken about human mindfulness in large part in RO 8:6, which says: "For to set the mind on the flesh is death, but to set the mind on the Spirit is life and peace." RO 8:6, ESV. The peace mentioned here, you see, isn't limited to our victory over death through Christ. But, it's a peace which one also can live and enjoy daily by making a first life-investment in a regular ongoing relationship with God and His ways of dealing with every issue we face in life.

Prayer: Dear God, as our deigned helper, aid each of us this year ahead by enabling us to best prioritize our spiritual convictions. Relying on You more, and our flesh, less. Guide us daily into actively abiding in and being in harmony with those values of the Holy Spirit. Inasmuch as we do Lord, grant that we experience Your promise of true life and Your peace. Bought and paid for us through your Son, Jesus. It's in His Name we pray this. Amen

I read once that we are 17x more likely to focus on the negative than we are on the positive. I don't know how true that is, but I certainly feel it in my own life. It is so easy to dwell on what's broken. What's not working. It is so easy to offer up criticisms, discouragements, and put downs. But, like Pastor David said, what would life look like if you and I were a people of gratitude? If, instead of focusing on the negative, we celebrated the positive? I think we would see life begin to flourish.


I wonder if we wouldn't begin to see even ourselves changing from bitter, angry people, into more gentle, loving and kind people.



Our upcoming scheduled meetings are January 27, February 3, and 17, March 2. Coffee and Donuts are provided.




