

Pastor Jenn's Letter to the Congregation

"Our involvement in political systems is rooted in the gospel imperative to love our neighbors, to do justice, and to care for the vulnerable. As United Methodists, we acknowledge that love requires responsible political action and engagement aimed at the betterment of society and the promotion of the common good. We acknowledge that such political engagement demands humility and mindfulness of our complicity in perpetuating injustice. It also necessitates compassion, prayer, and a willingness to discern God's guidance." (from the Preface to The Political Community in the Social Principles of the UMC 2025-2028)

As United Methodist Christians, our social and political action DNA goes all the way back to our founder, John Wesley. He made ministry to the poor a priority in the early Methodist movement. He promoted equity in health care, food sustainability and economic systems and spoke out against colonialism and the slave trade. Wesley believed our discipleship should transform our personal lives, our families, our churches and the world. We carry on this tradition today, rooting our social and political involvement in the principles of love, justice and care for the most vulnerable among us. As United Methodists, we have sought to evaluate the social concerns of our time through the lens of faith, without endorsing or promoting particular political candidates or platforms.

However, this summer the IRS released a statement that churches and other houses of worship can endorse political candidates to their congregations, carving out an exemption to a decades-old ban on political activity by tax-exempt nonprofits. The agency said that if a house of worship endorsed a candidate to its congregants, the IRS would view that as a private matter; "like a family discussion concerning candidates" and not campaigning. Critics of the ruling warned that political groups could now use nonprofits as a kind of "legal disguise." In other words, political operatives could funnel money to their preferred candidates through churches while receiving tax breaks at the expense of tax payers who may not share those views.

While this is a valid concern, as a Pastor and follower of Jesus, it is not my primary concern. My primary allegiance is to Christ and his kingdom, which will never neatly coincide with a particular candidate or political platform. The vision that God holds for our world is far bigger and that is our focus. In faith, I acknowledge that there are diverse perspectives on many pressing issues and all of us are on a journey of learning and growing. Our job together is to examine issues in light of faith and then trust one another to make our own decisions regarding voting and action.

I have always believed this respects the God-given intelligence and freedom within each of us and is essential for a healthy democracy. Only a free church can criticize its government when it behaves in harmful ways. Conversations with our Social Justice Team and Church Council members assure me that our lay leadership is in agreement with this perspective.

So, while the law may not prevent me, or this church, from endorsing candidates or aligning ourselves with particular political parties, faith in Christ does. I will do my best to speak out boldly on social issues from a gospel perspective and to equip us to learn and act for justice and mercy in our world. But, I will not ever use the church to endorse particular political candidates. For while I may believe that the views of some candidates better reflect Christian values than others, none will ever fulfill the kingdom we seek. I am reminded of The Romero Prayer, named after Father Oscar Romero.

It helps, now and then, to step back and take a long view. The kingdom is not only beyond our efforts, it is even beyond our vision.

We accomplish in our lifetime only a tiny fraction of the magnificent enterprise that is God's work.

Nothing we do is complete, which is a way of saying that the Kingdom always lies beyond us.

No statement says all that could be said. No prayer fully expresses our faith.

No confession brings perfection. No pastoral visit brings wholeness.

No program accomplishes the Church's mission. No set of goals and objectives includes everything.

This is what we are about.

We plant the seeds that one day will grow.

We water seeds already planted, knowing that they hold future promise.

We lay foundations that will need further development.

We provide yeast that produces far beyond our capabilities.

We cannot do everything, and there is a sense of liberation in realizing that.

This enables us to do something, and to do it very well.

It may be incomplete, but it is a beginning, a step along the way, an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and do the rest.

We may never see the end results, but that is the difference between the master builder and the worker.

We are workers, not master builders; ministers, not messiahs.

We are prophets of a future not our own.

May we all be workers and prophets of a future not our own,

Report on the 2025 California-Nevada Annual Conference - By Vicki Daughtry



It was my privilege to represent Lynnewood again this year in Sacramento at our annual California-Nevada Annual Conference, June 27-30. This 177th Annual Conference focused on Thriving in Community, and gave me my first chance to see the leadership of our new bishop, Sandra K. Olewine.

Saturday morning, our speaker was Dr. Stephanie Hand, focused on social justice work. She suggested the following steps: fasting and praying as we build up discipleship ministries; asking the right kinds of questions; identifying and addressing the justice issues of our community; understanding systems of oppression.

In the afternoon, we dealt with legislation issues; my group's concerned encouraging every attendee to spend time daily outdoors in God's beautiful world, having the district superintendents make climate justice a missional priority, and eliminating our retirement funds' investments in fossil fuel. Back in the plenary session, all legislative items passed.

On Sunday, I attended a breakout session on small group ministry led by Samuel Yun. He brought us to together by teaching us to say "God is good, all the time" in Korean (phonetically, "Ha na nimh chota, HONG sahng"). He suggested we use Acts 2's description of the early church as a prescription for how church should be today. Small groups focusing on the spiritual check-in question "How goes it with your soul?" can find deeper spiritual connection and growth. The other three components of these life groups are study, spiritual accountability, and mutual support.

As a conference, we voted on the budget, we ordained new ministers, and we laid hands on those being appointed and reappointed to churches (always a meaningful ritual for me). You can access conference proceedings here by <u>clicking here.</u>

I have many mountaintop moments at conference, surrounded by so many acting as the hands and feet of Jesus Christ in the world. My favorites are usually musical, and this year was no exception. As we closed out the ordination service on Sunday, we stood and sang; I happened to be next to a gentleman from Park Presidio UMC in San Francisco. At the end of the last song, he grabbed my hand and exclaimed, "I LIKE singing with you!" Church, I like singing with you, and for you. I ask God to continue letting me do it as long as God sees fit. Thank you.

Finance Update

Here's a quick snapshot of the general fund* numbers as of the end of June (1st half of 2025). (*General fund refers to those monies that cover salaries, building maintenance, program expenses, etc.):

You may ask – how can you run a church this way? No business would enter the year with a projected deficit budget. And you would be right when it comes to talking about for-profit businesses.

But here's where a faith budget comes into play. The previous 2 years, we entered the year with a projected deficit. But we have yet to end a year with a deficit. Between spending less than projected and income being more than projected, we closed the gap those two years.

Do I like the way those numbers look? Absolutely not. But I have faith that God will continue to provide for the Lynnewood ministries to the community and the world. You all are the vehicle through which God provides.

Consider this a challenge! In 2025 to date, Lynnewood has had approximately 120 different giving units (families or individuals). If each giving unit were able to give an additional \$12 to \$15 per week over the next 19 weeks, we would close the deficit. I do recognize that not everyone has the means to do this. And that is okay. Please remember that your presence and service are also gifts that are greatly needed and appreciated by the Lynnewood family.

This discussion has not even included your giving to special appeals, such as the one this August for Texas flooding relief. You have been generous time and again. Thank you!
