

> ROMANS 5:6-11,18-21

⁶For while we were still weak, at the right time Christ died for the ungodly. 7 For one will scarcely die for a righteous person—though perhaps for a good person one would dare even to die— 8 but God shows his love for us in that while we were still sinners. Christ died for us. 9 Since, therefore, we have now been justified by his blood, much more shall we be saved by him from the wrath of God. 10 For if while we were enemies we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, much more, now that we are reconciled, shall we be saved by his life. ¹¹ More than that, we also rejoice in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation.

¹⁸Therefore, as one trespass led to condemnation for all men, so one act of righteousness leads to justification and life for all men. 19 For as by the one man's disobedience the many were made sinners, so by the one man's obedience the many will be made righteous. ²⁰ Now the law came in to increase the trespass, but where sin increased, grace abounded all the more, ²¹ so that, as sin reigned in death, grace also might reign through righteousness leading to eternal life through Iesus Christ our Lord.

Gifts can be tricky. When someone gives us a gift, we feel the pressure to act like it's what we've always wanted—even if it's socks from Grandma. On the other hand, when we give a gift, we often feel nervous, crossing our fingers in hopes the person will really like what we picked out.

When I was a kid, I desperately wanted a set of Hit Stix for my birthday. These were electronic, toy drum sticks that created different drum and percussion sounds. In the commercials, the kids had cool clothes and funky hair, made incredible music with their friends, and were backed by amazing 80s hip-hop tracks. When I tore the paper off the gift box from my parents, I was overjoyed to see that it was exactly what I wanted. It didn't take long to figure out that playing by myself at home—with little skills, no backing track, and no group of amazing musicians—wasn't anything like the commercials. Reality didn't meet my expectations, and the gift I'd wanted most turned out to be pretty disappointing.

LEVELS OF BIBLICAL LEARNING // SALVATION

Day One **JAMES 4:4**

Previously, James called Christians to live not according to earthly wisdom but wisdom from above. Further, James pointed out that the conflict people experience, specifically in the church, comes from pursuing selfish pleasures rather than serving one another. As God's people, we live in a covenant relationship with Him, much like the commitment of a husband and wife to each other. In the same way a husband pursuing pleasure outside the marriage is adultery, James said the church was being unfaithful to God in pursuing worldly pleasures. They were adulterers! Friendship with the world refers to living by the world's values and finding pleasure in the same places as ungodly people. When we live this way, we set ourselves in opposition to God. As God's people, we are to reject the values of the world and find our joy and meaning in Christ.

Day Two **JAMES 4:5**



When we come to saving faith in Jesus, the Holy Spirit dwells in us. The Spirit opens our eyes to the truth, convicts us of sin, comforts us when we grieve, and provides strength for living well. Further, because we are in a committed covenant relationship with God, it provokes the Spirit to jealousy when we find pleasure in things of the world. In a certain sense, jealousy is wrong—we aren't to be envious or covetous toward others. specifically the good things they possess that we might want for ourselves. However, from another angle, jealousy is totally appropriate. For instance, it's good for a husband to have healthy and balanced jealousy for his wife's affection and faithfulness. The Spirit, who is Himself God, is jealous for our love and affection, and He envies intensely for our hearts when we seek pleasure and fulfillment in worldly things.

Day Three **JAMES 4:6**

Grace is specifically a free gift that we don't deserve and can't earn. Grace is central to our salvation—we could never earn God's forgiveness, and we certainly don't deserve God's favor. It's pretty clear that grace is the only way we could be saved. However, it might be less obvious how grace plays a part in our lives beyond salvation. Here's how: We're not only saved by grace, but God's grace also provides the strength to follow Jesus every day. It's God's grace at work in our lives that moves us to find pleasure in Him. It's God's grace that helps us to live sacrificially and with love toward others. It's God's grace that leads us toward unity in the church. It's worth asking how we can put ourselves in the position to receive this grace. The answer is clear: When we're prideful, we set ourselves in opposition to God, and He withholds His grace from us, at least in an immediate sense. If we want to receive God's overflowing grace, we must choose humility as the pattern of our lives.

Day Four **JAMES 4:7**

James was writing specifically to Christians who were being persecuted for their faith. They were experiencing some really tough things, and they were surely tempted to complain or even walk away from their faith. However, James told them that God uses struggles and trials in the lives of His people to shape us into Christlikeness. Submitting to God isn't always easy, not only because we can be naturally prideful and selfish, but even more so when life brings suffering and we wonder why God isn't working things out the way we want. James wanted the church to know that the devil will tempt us to rebel against God, especially when life isn't easy. The answer is to resist the devil. The word resist used here is a military term which means to put on the armor of God and take a stand against the devil and his temptations. When we do this by the power of God, the devil will flee, and we will be blessed even in the midst of difficulty.

Day Five JAMES 4:8



When we're tempted to complain, or even to give up, James issued two challenges. The first was to resist the devil. However, this is only half the equation. At times as Christians, we can focus too much on the sin in our lives, specifically avoiding it or putting it to death. We are to put off the attitudes and actions associated with the flesh, but if this is all we do, a void is left for sin to creep back in. Once we've resisted the devil, it's just as important that we pursue God with our whole heart. It's good to hate sin. But even more, we're called to love God with everything we are. When we pursue God, we'll find that He welcomes us into His presence and He draws near to us in incredible ways.
