God-ordained interruptions require a sensitive heart.

› LUKE 8:40-56

⁴⁰ Now when Jesus returned, the crowd welcomed him, for they were all waiting for him. ⁴¹ And there came a man named Jairus, who was a ruler of the synagogue. And falling at Jesus' feet, he implored him to come to his house, ⁴² for he had an only daughter, about twelve years of age, and she was dying. As Jesus went, the people pressed around him. ⁴³ And there was a woman who had had a discharge of blood for twelve years, and though she had spent all her living on physicians, she could not be healed by anyone. ⁴⁴ She came up behind him and touched the fringe of his garment, and immediately her discharge of blood ceased. ⁴⁵ And Jesus said, "Who was it that touched me?" When all denied it, Peter said, "Master, the crowds surround you and are pressing in on you!" ⁴⁶ But Jesus said, "Someone touched me, for I perceive that power has gone out from me." ⁴⁷ And when the woman saw that she was not hidden, she came trembling, and falling down before him declared in the presence of all the people why she had touched him,

and how she had been immediately healed. ⁴⁸ And he said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace." ⁴⁹ While he was still speaking, someone from the ruler's house came and said, "Your daughter is dead; do not trouble the Teacher any more." ⁵⁰ But Jesus on hearing this answered him, "Do not fear; only believe, and she will be well." ⁵¹ And when he came to the house, he allowed no one to enter with him, except Peter and John and James, and the father and mother of the child. ⁵² And all were weeping and mourning for her, but he said, "Do not weep, for she is not dead but sleeping." ⁵³ And they laughed at him, knowing that she was dead. ⁵⁴ But taking her by the hand he called, saying, "Child, arise." ⁵⁵ And her spirit returned, and she got up at once. And he directed that something should be given her to eat. ⁵⁶ And her parents were amazed, but he charged them to tell no one what had happened.

Sometimes when I'm doing meaningful things, like reading for school or studying to teach the Bible, one of my kids wants attention and interrupts me. My natural response, more times than I'd like to admit, is to get annoyed. Even when I'm doing something totally meaningless, like watching reels on my phone, and one of my kids interrupts, my response is usually the same: I am slightly peeved by others ignoring my preferences. However, me being annoyed was really the only inappropriate thing.

Americans spend on average five hours and sixteen minutes per day on their phones, scrolling through social media feeds, watching reels or YouTube videos, or playing games.² If we're honest, much of this is a waste of time. Yet we still don't like to be interrupted. We would all do well to understand that the people in our lives matter more than essentially anything else.

In our passage, Jesus was surrounded by many people who were pressing in on Him and wanting His attention. While Jesus was on His way to help a desperate man, He was interrupted by another woman in the crowd. Even though Jesus was busy, He paused and offered His full attention.


13 This week, share Jairus's story with a non-believing friend. Point out that Jesus loves us enough to go out of His way to meet our needs.

DAILY DEVOTIONS



The 7 Arrows of Bible Reading



Day One PROVERBS 3:1

In this proverb, Solomon emphasizes the importance of his son continually remembering what his father had taught him. From the beginning, it was the responsibility of parents to first know God and then teach their children the truths that are foundational to living well. Parents certainly aren't perfect. They make mistakes and even terrible choices, but this doesn't change the fact that the overwhelming majority of parents love their children. Here's the thing—every parent will ask their children to do things that aren't easy and might not make sense at the time. And the kids have two choices: either to disobey and do whatever they feel like, or to choose to honor their parents as God has commanded. It's important for us to honor the authority figures in our lives, and if we don't, we'll experience frustration and pain when we're young and when we're older. On the other hand, when we learn to listen to our parents' teaching, and ultimately to God, we put ourselves in the position to experience blessing.

➤ **Why is it sometimes hard to listen to our parents?**

Day Two

PROVERBS 3:2



There are serious implications associated with choosing to listen to the wisdom of our parents. Solomon lists three ways humility and obedience impacts our lives. First, he mentioned that honoring our parents leads to a long life, which is tied to the fifth commandment (Ex. 20:12). Not only does submitting to authority lead to a longer life, but it more importantly leads to a full and abundant life of joy and fulfillment. Finally, learning to honor our parents leads to a life of peace or wholeness. Of course, the opposite also applies: Pride and rebellion generally lead to a life that's shorter, isn't filled with joy, and is characterized by conflict and tension. What kind of life do we want? We have the choice: Will we live in pride and selfishness, or will we choose humility and submission to authority?

Day Three

PROVERBS 3:3

Solomon taught his son that it's important to live by the principles his father taught, and the quality of his life depended on it. Solomon followed this challenge with a powerful principle: Always live according to a code of loyalty and faithfulness. This means that we're to be devoted to the people in our lives, provide support and encouragement, and give those we care about the benefit of the doubt. We should never gossip or tear down but instead build others up with our words, both to their faces and behind their backs. Of course, this applies to our family and to our friends. Even more importantly, we're to be faithful to the God who created us and saved us. This kind of love and trust is evidence of true salvation.

Day Four

PROVERBS 3:4

As people made in God's image, we're created to live in relationships with others. Scripture clearly teaches that there is one God who exists as three Persons (which is impossible to fully grasp). The Persons of the Trinity live in perfect and whole relationship with one another, and our relationships serve as a reflection of a relational God. We're called to live in relationships not only with other people but also with God, and the quality of our relationships depends on the ways we treat others. If we're unfaithful or disloyal, it's easy to understand why our relationships might not be great. However, when we prioritize faithfulness and loyalty to the people in our lives, Solomon taught according to his wisdom (and remember, he was indescribably wise) that treating people this way will lead to favor with both people and God.

Day Five

PROVERBS 3:5-6



As God's sons and daughters, we are called to trust Him. This isn't always easy because God sometimes asks us to do things that don't make sense from an earthly perspective. But trust is all about living as God has called us, which might not be easy or comfortable. When we live by trust in God, not only will we grow in faith and knowledge of Him, but step by step, the old sinful and selfish nature will become increasingly weaker and the new spiritual person will become the more natural way of living. This doesn't mean that our lives will be easy in an earthly sense. However, when we pursue God as an expression of our heart's desire, God goes before us, and He will lead us into the place of eternal blessing.
