LEARNING // GOD

It seems that no matter what we have, we still have a craving for more. In the 1990s, a man named Sergio Hernandez won three million dollars in the California lottery, and he chose a payout of 120 thousand dollars a year for twenty-five years. Naturally, we might think, "He's got it made. He's set for life." However, in 1993, he was sentenced to a year in prison for receiving stolen property that was looted during the Los Angeles riots.² Apparently, three million dollars isn't enough to satisfy the desires of the human heart. Somehow, Hernandez struggled to be satisfied with what seemed to be more than enough and longed for more.

It might be easy to point a finger at Mr. Hernandez, but what about us? Many times, almost as soon as we've acquired the thing we wanted so desperately, we become discontent and our desires move on to the next and best thing. What's the solution to this discontent? In Paul's letter to the Philippians, Scripture teaches us how to be content. Here's the secret: It's not found in circumstances or possessions but only in the person of Jesus.



Day One **1 TIMOTHY 6:3-5**

Paul wrote the letter we call 1 Timothy to his young student, Timothy. The purpose of this letter was to encourage Timothy in his responsibility of leading the Ephesian church. Like other first-century churches, Ephesus faced false teachers who were making claims that weren't in line with the truths Jesus taught. Rather than promoting unity, these false teachers were creating division and provoking the congregation to engage in debates about things that mattered very little. The reality was that these false teachers simply didn't understand the truth of Jesus; therefore, they weren't in the position to lead the church. On top of this, they pursued their positions in the church not because they were motivated by the gospel but because they wanted power and money. Let's not misunderstand—it's good for churches to pay their pastors (1 Tim. 5:17-18; Gal. 6:6; 1 Cor. 9:14). However, material blessing should never be the motivation to follow Jesus, for ministers or anyone else. We follow Jesus not for material blessings but because we love Him.

Day Two **1 TIMOTHY 6:6**



The false teachers in the Ephesian church lived as if material gain was the goal of their godliness. However, this wasn't godly living at all. Godliness is living in ways that reflect the nature and character of God. Scripture teaches that Jesus is the express image of God in human form. The way Jesus lived while on the earth was the perfect example of godliness, and it's pretty clear that Jesus didn't pursue His ministry for the money. The true gain associated with following Jesus isn't material wealth or earthly pleasures but a spirit of contentment, no matter our circumstances. This kind of satisfaction in life is true gain. And we find it not when we follow Jesus as a way to get what we want but when we pursue godliness as an expression of our love for Jesus.

Day Three **1 TIMOTHY 6:7**

Our culture often acts as if worldly things are of highest value. We're constantly bombarded with ads that promise happiness and satisfaction if we'll simply buy the next and better product, whether it's chocolate, shoes, or a new car. However, almost as soon as we've bought the thing, the new wears off and we find there was no lasting satisfaction. And then there's another new round of products and their associated promises. Here's the point: There's no meaning or fulfillment to be found in the things of this world. Material possessions have no lasting significance, and when this life is over, we'll leave behind all the stuff that might have seemed so important. We must be careful to value those things that are truly valuable and to see material things for what they are.

Why are people inclined to see possessions as more important than they actually are?

Day Four **1 TIMOTHY 6:8**

It can be tough to distinguish between real needs and simply wants. In our culture, there are things that we see as belonging to the basic needs category which might not be so basic after all, like air conditioning, highspeed internet, smart phones, nice vehicles, four-bedroom homes, and much more. This stands in stark contrast to the standard Paul established. He said that if we simply have food and clothes, that is enough. And, by the way, he wasn't even talking about a fridge full of food or an overflowing closet. He was speaking essentially of food for today and one outfit to keep warm. This is not to say that owning possessions is wrong or bad. God does often bless people in a material sense and then calls the blessed to be generous. However, satisfaction is never found in riches. Instead, if God's provided enough for today, we are to be content, whether we have much or little.

Day Five

1 TIMOTHY 6:9-10



Verse 10 is commonly misquoted to say money itself is the root of all evil. Notice, this isn't the language of Scripture. Instead, it's the love of money that leads to sin. Money is, in a sense, neutral in nature. It can certainly be abused and used for selfish and sinful purposes. However, material resources can also be used to advance God's kingdom on earth, and when used rightly, temporary things can make an eternal difference. The context here is that false teachers had pursued ministry and a life of supposed godliness as a way to material gain. Further, the people of the church may have been tempted to do these same things—to follow Jesus in pursuit of earthly blessings. This mindset is a trap that has led many people to buy into a false gospel, leading ultimately to their eternal judgment. To pursue Jesus for the earthly blessings is not a path that leads to God. Let's make sure we love Jesus for Jesus. Then, we'll be content with whatever much or little He provides for us.
