n President's Day weekend (February 17-19), Refuel, the student ministry of Lewis Memorial, will host our 10th annual D-Now weekend for middle and high school students. Over the years, D-Now Weekend has served to create many fun memories and heart-changing moments in the lives of our teenagers. The purpose of this article is twofold. First, you will be given a glance inside D-Now Weekend, learning what makes it such a special, transformative event in the lives of those in our student ministry. Second, you will be given an opportunity to commit to praying for our students, leaders, and support team as they come together for a weekend of spiritual growth and renewal.

What is a D-Now Weekend?

An "At Home" Youth Retreat

A D-Now Weekend (short for "Disciple Now") is a youth retreat designed to be "at home." Many youth trips involve traveling and doing mission work at another location. What makes D-Now Weekend different is that we will stay in our own hometown and focus on our own church family and local community!

This year's D-Now Weekend theme is "Renewing the Mind." We'll spend time at the church on Friday evening and Saturday morning studying Romans chapter 12 together. We will be blessed to have the Jason Lovins Band leading worship through music with our students during the teaching portions of our weekend! Then, on Saturday afternoon, we'll serve Jesus together. Our students will take part in several projects around the community and within our local church family, including outreach at our Ebenezer center, and visiting senior adult members of the congregation who are homebound and assisting them with cleaning and small repairs around the house. For the "fun" element of the weekend, we have all-access passes to the attractions at Malibu Jack's, a local entertainment venue! We will enjoy time at Malibu Jack's on Friday night and participate in "The Amazing Race" - a highstakes scavenger hunt - on Saturday night!

Time in God's Word

Our time in God's Word this year will center on the consequential Scriptural passage of Romans 12. This chapter marks a significant shift in the book of Romans as the apostle Paul, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, moves from describing the doctrinal undergirding of our salvation in Jesus (chapters 1-11) to the practical outworking of our new life with Him. Central to our new journey with Jesus is the imperative found in Romans 12:1-2.

I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed. By the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect (Romans 12:1-2 ESV).

Throughout our D-Now Weekend, students will be challenged to, in view of their salvation in Christ, renew their minds in four specific areas.

#1 - We must renew our minds about goals (Romans 12:1-2). We could never repay the debt of love we owe to Jesus. So, what should we, as believers, do in response to our salvation in Christ? God tells us through His Word that we are to present our bodies "As a living sacrifice." Our new lives in Jesus are no longer oriented around our wants and desires but instead around Jesus' teachings and His mission for us. This is the grid by which we evaluate life decisions: How will this decision glorify Jesus and advance His gospel?

#2 - We must renew our minds about serving (Romans 12:3-8). When the church gathers, everyone brings with them their God-given talents and abilities, and teenagers are no exception. Ask any of our adult leaders in Refuel about our students, and you'll quickly come to understand that teenagers excel in areas such as athletics, the arts, technology, and academics. Our students are talented. During D-Now Weekend, students will be challenged to utilize their talents for God by getting involved in the work of the church,

serving alongside other generations to build one another up as we advance the gospel together.

#3 - We must renew our minds about loving God's people (Romans 12:9-13). The people of God are called to love each other with "brotherly affection" (Rom. 12:10). Of course, differences of opinion, personality, and upbringing can threaten the expression of such deep love, leading to indifference and division. Our students will be encouraged to cultivate a longsuffering, patient love toward their brothers and sisters in Christ that works itself out in practical, considerate acts of kindness and hospitality within the family of God.

#4 - We must renew our minds about loving those far from God (Romans 12:14-21). In a post-Christian culture, how should we as Christians act and react when facing persecution? How should we respond when others wish evil against us? Against a cultural backdrop of polarization and outrage, God's Word calls us to, as much as possible, "Live peaceably with all" (Rom. 12:18). We remember the example of Jesus, who loved us when we were His enemies (Rom. 5:8). Students are, in many ways, growing up in a very different world than their parents and grandparents experienced as teens. Still, we believe God has them at this place and at this time for a reason. Our students will be urged to "Not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good" (Rom. 12:21).

How can I help?

Would you consider praying for our students, leaders, and support staff as we approach this special weekend? Here are eight specific aspects of our D-Now Weekend in which we're asking for prayer:


- That our students would grow in unity with one another.
- That cross-generational relationships would be formed between our students and senior adults.
- That our students would connect with God in worship.
- That students and leaders will commit to partnering together for long-term discipleship.
- That students will clearly understand God's call to holy living in certain areas of their lives.
- That students respond in faith to a clear presentation of the gospel.
- That students surrender to the command to be baptized.
- That God gets the glory no matter what!

LOVE WHERE YOU LIVE IN FEBRUARY

Dear Small Group Leader,

Hello! Thank you for being so faithful to participate in the Small Group Leader training in January. I sincerely believe we have THE best Small Group Leaders ever. You guys are awesome. I appreciate your love for the Lord, His Church, and our Pastor. Your dedication to the disciple-making mission of Jesus is second to none. You're a blessing to our Church family.

Second, I want to remind you of our monthly mission for February in the Love Where You Live (LWYL) outreach plan. Send five valentines cards to your five neighbors on your LWYL prayer card. Let your neighbors know you pray for them every day. Give them Valentines candy and use the connect cards (located in both lobbies) to invite them to church on Sunday morning. Also, look for practical ways to share the love of Christ with your neighbors during the month. Historically, February is a snowy month. Be prepared to shovel your neighbor's driveway and help them clear the snow off their car. If you have a four-wheel drive, use your vehicle to take your neighbors to the grocery store to get milk. Everybody gets milk and eggs when it snows in West Virginia, even when eggs cost \$6 a dozen. Finally, don't forget the widows and senior citizens in your neighborhood. Be the hands and feet of Jesus for the least of them. This is Love in Action and Loving Where YOU Live at its best!

In closing, let me remind you of four simple thoughts: *First,* balance intimacy with activity. Duty with devotion. Don't just be a hearer or a reader of the Word, BE A DOER (James 1:21-27). Go deep in the Word and even deeper in your witness. Be a faithful worshiper but don't neglect to witness. Be balanced (LWYL).

Second, believe God. Ask yourself, "Am I believing God for too much or too little? Jesus said, "Have faith in God" (Mark 11:22). Even the Apostles prayed, "Lord, increase our faith" (Luke 17:5). Feed, fuel, and fan your faith.

Third, pray. Ask yourself, "Is my problem unanswered prayer or unoffered prayer?" Be people of prayer (James 4:2).

Finally, pray for the salvation of the lost. How much does Jesus value the unsaved? Perhaps we need to take a "fresh" look at the cross and see how Jesus values people (2 Cor. 5:21).

Remember, who you love will determine how you live. If we're going to LOVE WHERE WE LIVE (LWYL), we need TO BE in love with Jesus. Love Him so you can love others too.

And this is the will of Him who sent Me, that everyone who sees the Son and believes in Him may have everlasting life; and I will raise him up at the last day. - John 6:40

Recommended Reading: Romans 6:21-26

"What fruit did you have then in the things of which you are now ashamed? For the end of those things is death." - 21

Our modern concept of eternity is mostly negative: "I waited in line for an eternity at the DMV!" "It takes forever for my kids to clean their rooms!" In other words, eternity usually is an experience we hope will end sooner rather than later.

Instead of it being something we hope ends soon, eternity in Scripture is an experience that will never end—and happily so! Eternity, according to the Bible, is consistent with the character of God—who is love (1 John 4:8, 16). In fact, God so loved us that He gave His only Son in order that we "should not perish but have everlasting life" (John 3:16). But here is a truth about eternal life that we often fail to realize: It begins now. Jesus said, "And this is eternal life, that they may know You, the only true God, and Jesus Christ whom You have sent" (John 17:3).

Thank God today for the eternal life you have by knowing Him through faith in His Son, Jesus Christ.

ome of us fall out of Bible reading because we fail to make time for it. Busyness crowds out the minutes we might otherwise give to sitting and hearing from God. There's always something that didn't get done vesterday or something relatively urgent that's come up today. It's pretty

amazing, isn't it, just how many things in our little worlds seem to trump listening to the one who made them all?

For others, it's not busyness that gets the best of us but a subtle cynicism about reading the Bible. How am I ever going to understand this? It's hard to keep getting up extra early and setting aside precious minutes when you're not convinced you'll be able to make sense of what you see when you might finish and strangely feel further from God, when you're chasing a full heart morning after morning and yet often walk away just scratching your head.

If you've felt that way before, you're not alone. In fact, even the men who wrote the Bible know something of what you feel. The apostle Peter says of the letters Paul wrote, "There are some things in them that are hard to understand" (2 Peter 3:16). Think about that: Peter, inspired by the Holy Spirit, wrote books in the Bible, and yet even he struggled to read Romans or Thessalonians (or whatever particular letter he had in mind). If he could write on behalf of God and have a hard time understanding Scripture, we shouldn't be surprised if we do too.

And I, for one, definitely do. I've battled to

I've labored through the kidneys, livers, and "entrails" of the Levitical laws. I've grown weary of the repetitive failures of Israel in 1-2 Kings. I've sometimes struggled to see what Hebrews sees in the Old Testament. Much of the imagery of Revelation is still a mystery to me. And so, I regularly find these clear and accessible words from Paul all the more meaningful and encouraging:

Think over what I say, for the Lord will give you understanding in everything. (2 Timothy 2:7)

Understanding Is Possible

This is an amazing acknowledgment from Paul to Timothy. He says, in essence, "I know some of what I am writing won't make sense to you immediately, and you'll be tempted to think you cannot understand it — but you can. So, don't give up too easily. Don't assume this is above you. Assume that God can make his words clear to you."

Those apart from Christ cannot understand the things of God. They flip through the Bible's majesty and wisdom in vain. "The natural person does not accept the things of the Spirit of God, for they are folly to him, and he is not able to understand them because they are

spiritually discerned" (1 Corinthians 2:14). But not you. If you're in Christ, you can see things they can't. You can understand things that they can't. Where they see foolishness and irrelevance, you see unspeakable beauty, a radiant window into reality. Not because you're smarter or more educated or merely a better reader, but because you're not a natural person anymore; you're a supernatural you, with a supernatural mind and heart and eyes.

Or as Paul says elsewhere of natural people, "They are darkened in their understanding, alienated from the life of God because of the ignorance that is in them, due to their hardness of heart" (Ephesians 4:18). But not you. You're not alienated from God anymore. Through the cross, he's brought you near, and in bringing you near, he's softened your heart and unlocked your mind. The God who flooded all creation with light "has shone in [your] heart to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ" (2 Corinthians 4:6). That's who you are when you open the Bible.

And because you're someone new, you can understand more of the Bible than you might think.

In Everything

Not only can you understand more than you think, but the apostle goes even further: "... the Lord will give you understanding in everything." If God lives in you, nothing in the Bible is above you — not the genealogies of Numbers, or the sacrificial laws of Leviticus, or the prophetic visions of Ezekiel, or the apocalyptic imagery of Revelation. With God, all are within your reach.

Lest we think Paul's talking only about the verses immediately before this one, he comes back to the same reality in the very next chapter: "All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work" (2 Timothy 3:16-17). As much of the Bible that has been breathed out by God — all of it! — that much is now profitable for you. Even on the most obscure, most confusing pages, God means to teach you, to exhort you, to correct you, to train you, to equip you — he means to speak to you.

Before any of that can happen, however, we first have to understand what God is saying — which is exactly where God promises to help us: "The Lord will give you understanding in everything."

Varied Means of Understanding

None of this means we just sit alone with our Bibles until we understand everything. No, God gives the gift of understanding in a hundred different ways. Remember, most Christians in the history of the world didn't own a Bible (much less carry it with them everywhere in their pockets). They depended on the regular reading and reciting of Scripture in community. From the first church to today, believers have depended on faithful teachers to rehearse, explain, and model the words of God for them.

And God has multiplied pathways to understanding in our day — first and foremost through our local churches, but then through essages, articles, books, study Bibles, online

courses, commentaries, podcasts, and more. So understanding may come in any number of ways. The point here, however, is that you really can understand what's in this book — everything that's in this book, Paul says.

Now, to say that we can understand everything in the Bible is not to suggest that we will understand everything immediately and fully. We won't — and certainly not the first (or second or even tenth) time through. God can give us understanding in every passage without giving us understanding of every part of a passage. He also often chooses to give understanding, not immediately, but over years or even decades. As we keep reading (and living), familiar verses will emerge with new or deeper meaning and relevance. Some questions will be answered slowly. So don't expect to understand everything now, but expect to understand something now — and then more tomorrow.

Ask God

Up until now, we've seen only that we can understand more than we may assume. You should be asking how. What makes this kind of supernatural reading possible? How do the lights come on?

Think over what I say, for the Lord will give you understanding in everything.

On our own, we can't understand the Bible. If God leaves us alone with this book, it wouldn't be worth getting up early, pouring more hours in, and pressing through difficult verses and chapters. We would search and ask and wrestle in vain. But if it's God who makes things clear, then he can overcome our limitations and blind spots. You can understand the Bible because God will give you understanding. When you read, he's not just over your shoulder; he's inside of you — in your eyes, your mind, your heart — showing you what you'd never see on your own.

The one who reveals himself in the Bible wants to make himself clear. He's not content to have divinely inspired words on the page; he wants them written on our hearts. He wants to see understanding, and satisfaction, and transformation — and so he won't leave you alone with your Bible. This may be why Paul ends the letter the way he does: "The Lord be with your spirit. Grace be with you" (2 Timothy 4:22). We need the present, spiritual help of God in all we do all the time, and especially in understanding his word.

Think Hard

This understanding, however, doesn't float down from the clouds and land softly on our heads. No, God gives the gift of understanding through the hard work of reading well. This verse demands almost as much as it promises: "Think over what I say, for the Lord will give you understanding in everything." This won't come easily, Timothy. Yes, God is the one who gives understanding, but that doesn't mean you won't have to work for it.

Isn't it strange that some of us hear that God sovereignly gives understanding, and we assume that means we need to do less? Satan teaches this kind of calculus all year round (and not just in Bible reading).

No, 2 Timothy 2:7 is far more like God's words to Joshua before Israel entered the promised land:

This Book of the Law shall not depart from your mouth, but you shall meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do according to all that is written in it. . . . Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go. (Joshua 1:8-9)

"I will be with you" didn't mean "You won't have to fight." Along with his promise of help and protection, God gave Joshua a charge: "Be strong and courageous." Fight all the harder because you know I'll fight with you and for you.

So, when you open your Bible, be strong and courageous. God will be with you wherever you read. Don't be discouraged

or intimidated. Think harder and longer because you know the Lord loves to give you understanding. ... because you're someone new, you can understand more of the Bible than you might think. by Marshall Segal Marshall Segal (@marshallsegal) is a writer and managing editor at desiringGod.org. 

DEVOTED TO PRAYER

Paul's devotion to prayer teaches us much about praying for others in this one little passage, even in just this one focus verse. Starting with the very first word, we learn that we are to pray with a purpose. "So", or "For this reason", as found in the NET, is a word or phrase that indicates the need to look back in order to truly understand why Paul and Timothy haven't stopped praying for the believers at Colossae. When we look back to verse 8, we find the answer is that they heard about the Colossian believers' love for others. Specifically, a love given to them by the Holy Spirit. When we share the common bond of love - in the Spirit, whom we have received through faith in Christ, we will be or should be drawn to pray for one another. If we look carefully at verse 9, we will see at least four other lessons worth noting and, I believe, implementing in our own prayer lives.


- Pray with a purpose: "because of your love in the Spirit." (8)
- Pray with others: "we have not stopped praying for you" (9)
- Pray faithfully: "We have not stopped praying for you since we first heard about you". (9)
- Pray specifically and in accordance with God's will: "We ask God to give you complete knowledge of His will and to give you spiritual wisdom and understanding." (9)

"I'll pray for you" can easily become a trite statement, something we say as a Christian nicety but with very little or consistent follow through. However, I believe this passage, specifically verse 9, gives us cause to guard ourselves against the nicety of prayers and implement this example in our everyday prayer life. When we invest in the lives of other believers, as Paul teaches, we will make an impact not only in each other's lives but in the way we live for God. We will be known to bear fruit and honor God, and we will develop and deepen a relationship with Him. We will find ourselves strengthened with His power, not lacking in endurance or patience, and filled with joy. Oh, the blessing and privilege of praying for each other. May He find us faithful, and may we find ourselves different because of it.
