Eliza Broadus Offering for State Missions

In 1913, the Kentucky Woman's Missionary Union®, under the leadership of Eliza Broadus, established the State Missions Offering and Season of Prayer to promote and support missions within the commonwealth of Kentucky. From that time on, an annual observance of the season of prayer and offering for state missions took its place along with those for International and North American missions.

In 1976, the state missions offering was renamed to what we know now as the Eliza Broadus Offering for State Missions®.

Eliza Broadus Funds at Work-Linda Otterback

Linda Otterback's ministry has taken a lot of different turns. In early 2000 she was scheduled for a mission trip to El Salvador. When the trip had to be cancelled, Linda received a phone call asking if she would like to go to Fleming-Neon instead. "What country is that in?" Linda asked. Linda soon learned that Fleming-Neon is in Eastern Kentucky. She said "yes" to that mission trip, which began the Eastern Kentucky SONrise ministry that is still active today. Linda and her husband Larry poured their



hearts into the Eastern Kentucky area, where they have led prayer meetings, women's and men's conferences, gathered much needed resources (clothing, diapers, household furniture, Christmas gifts), and led mission teams to the EKY area. They have also been such encouragers for



many residents, as well as missionaries that serve in eastern Kentucky.

Larry and Linda were married 52 years, grew up in church together, and served together as North

American Mission Board MSC Missionaries. Larry served in this position for 12 years until health issues forced him to step down. In 2016 Larry went to his heavenly home and Linda was left to serve alone.

As a widow Linda felt her life was over. "I couldn't sleep or eat for almost a year," she said. "I cried every night and much of the day. I put on a great face to others, but really had hit the bottom. My kids were concerned that they had lost me also. But, PTL for friends, family and God who didn't let me stay there. I started reading the Psalms in detail after Larry passed. I believe God wrote them for me especially!! They hadn't meant as much before, but now I see how HE spoke to me through my trials and valleys." As a result of this experience, Linda began a KBC widow's ministry called Joy in the Mourning.

Her work continued in all parts of Eastern Kentucky and in 2023 she hosted a Revival featuring Billy Graham's grandson, Jonathan Lotz as the revivalist.



Linda has completed a written testimony of God's work in her life with her new book, *WOW... God!* It humorously chronicles her life story with emphasis on how God used the mountain tops and valleys to give her the strength to move on and to show Himself to others. "This is my autobiography but it's not about me. It's about God's grace working through an obedient life."

Mijombini Orphanage/Ultimate Wings Rescue Center Update

Recently, we mentioned that the Kenyan government was considering a move to close some orphanages and work with others to begin reintegrating children back into their homes by 2032. The local government and Children's Resource Officer has requested that Ultimate Wings begin this reintegration process. The government is no longer issuing the needed licenses to continue to allow the children to be housed at the facility, so the children have been moved to the homes of extended family members. They will continue to be educated and fed at the Center. Additionally, the Center will become a community based ministry and offer classes and other types of support to help families care for the children.

The new social worker, James Baya has been conducting in-home assessments of the families who have taken the children in. These assessments are being forwarded to the church office and unfortunately indicate that the homes are very much poverty-stricken and in need of basics that include better home construction, food and new mosquito netting.

Because this is a government move, there is not a lot of wiggle room to keep the children at the Center. We are working with Nathan, our administrator, to ascertain specific needs for each of the families. Sponsorship gifts will now be shared amongst the whole family, rather than one individual child. We will also redevelop what the annual sponsorships will provide. Since children will no longer be housed at the center, it opens the door for us to help more in the community. You will begin to see additional children featured for sponsorship in the coming weeks.

As a staff, we have all questioned this move as it seems to move what we have accomplished over the past few years backwards. It will help to understand that before the AIDS epidemic and Covid the norm for communities was that families would take care of families. With so many deaths resulting just from these two instances, a family disconnect occurred and orphanages took over the care of children who lost parents. The government seeks to reestablish the Family Core as the caregivers, hence the return of the children. Again, unfortunately, we are finding that the families in Kilifi no longer have the social, emotional, financial or spiritual ability to care for these children.

The social worker is developing a good structure of core family care to assist both the families and the children in the best practices of reintegration. All of the previous educational programs, health care and meals will continue for the children, they just won't be housed on site. The recent purchase of the van has become a vital key to transporting the children to and from the Center. We are also making the move to change our terminology from the Mijomboni Orphanage to the Ultimate Wings Rescue Center.

We will continue to keep you updated as to what programs are being developed and how the reintegration progresses. Understandably some children are having difficulty moving back into the community and we ask you to pray for them. Your prayers are much needed for Nathan and Lillian as well as they navigate these changes.

Conversation is beginning regarding the possibility of a mission trip in 2026. Begin praying now about your involvement especially you are able to lead a parenting seminar!



In other news... we have three additional children that an SBC family has adopted!

This is Neema Kadzo. She is fifteen years old and her son Brian is four months. Neema is mentally challenged and was sexually exploited and became pregnant. She lives with her grandmother as her mother is also mentally challenged and has been abused. Neema is unable to do more than simple household tasks like gathering water or preparing maize.

Neither she nor her mother are able to work outside the home. Both Neema and Byrian are nutritionally poor and this past week a local Muslim man made a commitment to donate an amount of milk to the family to help them

recover. A photo of Neema and Brian's home shows rooms divided by torn clothing and pieces of aluminum.

The young boy is Boniface Nginge. He was born dumb and does not speak. He may stand and walk but not for long periods of time. The social worker believes that his inability to be locomotive stems from poor nutrition.

Our church golf league concluded in September. We had 12 outings this year with a total of 40 different players participating. We averaged 14 per evening. Eight new players joined us this year!


Sovanna Chhan attended all of our outings and was our only participant that played in all 12 events.
