HUMILITY UNLOCKS DIVINE FAVOUR WHILE PRIDE REPELS IT

Humility is the key that unlocks God's unlimited blessing and favour while pride repels them.

KEY POINTS

- Humility is a characteristic we should all possess. Not only does it attract God's attention, but it also is the key that unlocks His unlimited blessing and favour.
- In 1 Samuel 8:1, the prophet Samuel in his old age had appointed his sons as Israel's leaders. But the prophet's sons were corrupt and desired material treasure more than Godly service and integrity (v. 3)
- The people saw this and the elders of Israel asked Samuel for a king to rule over Israel so they could be like the other nations. This request displeased Samuel, but God told Samuel that the people had not rejected him as their prophet; they had rejected God as their King (v.v. 7-8). So, God gave the people what they wanted.
- It is against this backdrop that we are introduced to Saul, a member of one of the smaller and less prominent tribes of Israel, the tribe of Benjamin.
- When we get to 1 Samuel 9, the Bible tells us that Saul was on a journey looking for his family's lost donkeys. It was a routine search that he had done many times before. What he didn't realize was that which seemed routine and mundane would lead him on the trajectory toward his God-given destiny.
- It was on the third day of looking for the lost donkeys that Saul encountered the prophet, Samuel. The prophet told him not to worry about the donkeys; they were already found. More importantly, Samuel told Saul, "And to whom is all the desire of Israel turned, if not to you and your whole family line?" (1 Sam. 9:20b).
- By this, Samuel strongly hinted that Saul was the one God had chosen to be the first king of Israel. Saul couldn't believe he would be considered for such a high office and said as much to Samuel (v. 21): "But am I not a Benjamite, from the smallest tribe of Israel, and is not my clan the least of all the clans of the tribe of Benjamin? Why do you say such a thing to me?"
- James 4:10 tells us to "humble yourselves before the Lord, and he will lift you up." Saul didn't manipulate the situation so he would become king. It wasn't even in his thoughts! All he wanted to do was find his father's lost donkeys.
- 'Humility', as defined by the Oxford and Merriam-Webster dictionaries, respectively, is "the quality of having a modest view of one's value or importance," and the "freedom from pride or arrogance." The King James Bible Dictionary says that humility "consists in lowliness of mind; a deep sense of one's own unworthiness in the sight of God, self-abasement, penitence for sin, and submission to the divine will."
- It was Saul's humility that caught God's attention and that unlocked the door for God's divine favour to be poured out on his life. It was also that divine favour that took Saul to the house of the prophet and allowed them to be seated at the head of the table (1 Sam. 9:22). Humility unlocks divine favour!
- After they ate, Samuel prophesized, telling Saul what he was going to come across (1 Sam. 10:5-6). Everything the prophet told Saul came to pass, even the fact that God's Spirit would come upon him powerfully and would enable "him to prophesy along with the other prophets" (v. 10).

KEY SCRIPTURE: 1 Samuel 15:12-23

(all scripture in NIV unless otherwise noted)

Start-up: Have you ever failed a

"life"

test (i.e., keeping your cool in a stressful situation)? When "retested", did you pass? How?

- Humility unlocks divine favour that will radically transform your life. As the spirit of God moves through you, you enter a new dimension that makes you a different person, like Saul. He was a new man with a new purpose because God was with him.
- But what Saul didn't realize was that his attitude of humility was going to get tested. And he failed the test. Instead of continuing to obey the instruction of the prophet—which was the Word of the Lord—and remaining humble, Saul thought that now that he was king, he could make his own decisions outside the given parameters of the prophet.
- Pride is an attitude the Lord detests (Proverbs 16:5). If we're not careful, it creeps in slowly and catches us unawares.
- In 1 Samuel 13, the prophet Samuel told Saul to wait for him for seven days in Gilgal and when he arrived, then he would offer sacrifices before an upcoming battle against the Philistines. But Saul became impatient and offered the sacrifices himself. A king does not perform the duties of a prophet or priest; he is not qualified to do so.
- Samuel came as soon as Saul had offered theses sacrifices and asked what he had done. Then Saul began to justify his actions instead of acknowledging his wrongdoing, even going as far as to blame Samuel for being late.
- Samuel told the Saul, "You have done a foolish thing.... Now your kingdom will not endure..." (v.v. 13-14).
- The humble attitude with which Saul began his journey was being eroded and replaced by pride. He thought he could take matters into his own hands—which was contrary to the given instruction—and still be blessed.
- How many of us have been like Saul, where we've been given instruction by God and we either try to go around it or disobey it outright? Why do we do that?
- Because pride is getting into our hearts and we figure we know better than the man of God. When that happens, God will begin to remove some things from us and give them to someone who is humble, obedient, and has a correct view of themselves.
- Pride repels blessing and favour.
- If we want to unlock God's favour in our lives, we need to be sober in our thinking and be humble in the sight of God. Because humility unlocks divine favour while pride pushes God's blessing away.

DISCUSSION/REFLECTION TOOLS

- In your own words, define "humility." What does the Bible say about humility? Would you describe it as an obvious or inconspicuous attribute? Why or why not?
- Discuss Saul's humility as evidenced in 1 Samuel 9:21 and 10:14-22. Looking at 1 Samuel 15, now discuss the elements of pride that led to King Saul's downfall.
- 3. How do we go about avoiding a similar fate to King Saul?

PRAYER TIME

Lord, help me "act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with [You]" (Micah 6:8). Amen.
