# A Light for all People





dvent is not simply about waiting for a baby.

Yes, we celebrate the birth of Jesus. Yes, we light candles and sing carols and remember that night in Bethlehem. But Advent invites us into something bigger: the arrival of a Light that refuses to be contained.

This Advent season, our worship series is titled "A Light for All People," and we will journey through the book of Acts alongside some of our favorite Old Testament texts. We begin with Saul's dramatic encounter on the Damascus road - a man transformed from persecutor to proclaimer. We watch as Peter heals Aeneas and raises Tabitha, as God's kingdom breaks into ordinary lives with restoration and hope. We witness Peter's stunning vision that shatters his assumptions about who belongs at God's table. We celebrate the birth of the church in Antioch, that unexpected place where Gentile believers first took the name "Christian."

Through Acts, we see what the prophet Isaiah promised centuries before: "The people walking in darkness have seen a great light." That light didn't come to shine only on a chosen few. It came for ALL people - Jew and Gentile, insider and outsider, the expected and the surprising.

This theme isn't just for our Sunday mornings. On December 21, we celebrate our annual "You Are Loved" day of service, when our congregation scatters across Oklahoma City to be light in tangible ways. Some will serve Christmas dinner at the Homeless Alliance Day Shelter, sharing a feast with 350 neighbors. Others will box meals at the church for "Dinners With Love," ensuring families have full Christmas dinners on their tables. We'll distribute hoodies, hats, scarves, gloves, hygiene supplies, and dog food - small acts of love that proclaim: you matter, you are seen, you are loved.

Because that's what Advent is really about. It's about a God who doesn't wait for us to get our act together before showing up. It's about a Light that shines in the darkness and the darkness cannot overcome it. It's about good news that's meant for everyone, everywhere.

As we move into January and February, we'll continue following the gospel's multiplication through Acts - watching Paul and Barnabas set apart and sent, seeing the early church navigate conflict and division, witnessing the Spirit lead in unexpected directions. We'll learn what it means to be a community that proclaims freedom even from prison cells, that speaks truth in marketplaces of competing ideas, that trusts God's light to shine through our imperfect witness.

And as we approach Westminster's 80th anniversary this spring, we remember that we are part of this same story. For eight decades, this congregation has worked to be light in this city, to welcome the outsider, to proclaim that God's love truly is for all people.

Friends, I hope your Advent season is filled with wonder. May you see the Light. May you be the light. May you trust that the Light is still breaking into our world, still transforming lives, still refusing

to be contained.

# From the First Candle to the Star



G

reetings WPC members,

Each season invites us to pause, to notice, and to be shaped by the story of God with us. This sacred rhythm reminds us that faith is not only something we believe, something we practice. Through waiting, celebrating, and listening for the voice of God, we make space for Christ to be born anew in our hearts and in our world. The mystery of the Incarnation grounds all of this. God has come among us. God is with us. God will come again. From the first candle of Advent to the glow of Epiphany's star, we are invited to live this truth, not merely to remember it. Each season gives us the opportunity to see God's presence more clearly, to slow our steps, and to let light grow within us. It brings to mind a line from Barbara Brown Taylor's An Altar in the World, "The practice of incarnation is about learning to live reverently in this good creation, learning to see, hear, touch, taste, and smell the presence of the divine in all things."

I love this thought because it so beautifully captures what we strive for in the Spiritual Formation ministry, from our youngest learners to our lifelong members. In Children's Chapel, we have been exploring what it means to wait with intention during Advent, to wait not with frustration, but with hope. The children have learned how this season invites us to prepare a room in our hearts and in our homes in anticipation of Christ's coming. Soon they will turn to the season of Christmastide, those twelve beautiful days that allow us to marvel at the mystery of "God with us" before the Magi arrive at Epiphany to announce that the Christ Child, the promised Messiah, is for all, not just some.

So, as you prepare for Christmas, I hope this season of Advent bears witness to the truth of this holy season. May you find time to reflect on how lovely it is that Christ dwells among us and that the light still shines in our midst. May these weeks remind us that faith is not only something we believe, but something we live. And through waiting, celebrating, and listening for God's voice, we make space for Christ to be born anew in our hearts and in our world. As the hymn reminds us, "Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel." May we live in the joy of this promise every day. his quarter was full of creativity, connection, and joyful momentum for Big Faith Resources. We continue to see how deeply churches long for tools that nurture belonging, honor neurodiverse children and families, and help congregations live into God's radical welcome.

Here's a glimpse at what we've been up to lately:

#### **Around the Table**


In August, Big Faith Resources was featured on the Around the Table podcast, discussing ways to help neurodivergent worshippers feel right at



home in church. This podcast reached congregations across the country, sharing insights on faith formation, accessibility, and supporting neurodiverse communities.

#### **Wonder of Worship**

Big Faith Resources traveled to Houston, TX, to partner with Wonder of Worship, a fellow Lilly Endowment-funded project of Columbia Theological Seminary. We participated in their event focused on Neurodiversity and Worship, sharing resources and engaging with others on creating worship spaces that are inclusive for all.



#### **Oklahoma Autism Network**

We attended the Oklahoma Autism Conference in October, a gathering designed to equip families, educators, and leaders with tools to better support neurodiverse communities. We hosted a



table to connect with attendees and provided resources for creating inclusive spaces where all are welcomed and loved.

#### Lilly Endowment Inc.

In October, Big Faith Resources traveled to Indianapolis for the Lilly Endowment Annual Meeting of Grant Recipients. It was a meaningful opportunity that celebrated innovation, collaboration, and the shared hope of building ministries that make a difference.



#### The Presbyterian Outlook

We partnered with The Presbyterian Outlook to host a webinar on neuro-affirming worship that reached more than 250 participants. This sparked rich



conversation and offered practical steps for churches seeking to create worship experiences that welcome neurodiverse children and their families.

#### **Progressive Youth Ministry**

In November, we participated in the Progressive Youth Ministry Conference in Austin, Texas. There we hosted an exhibit booth, led a workshop titled Calm



Spaces, Big Welcome, and designed a sensory space for worship. It was a joy to connect with attendees from across the country who are eager to create spaces of belonging for young people.

#### **Indian Nations Presbytery**

Big Faith Resources attended the Indian Nations Presbytery's stated meeting in November, representing Westminster Presbyterian Church. There we shared our



upcoming Wonder Box, sparking excitement for these hands-on tools that help children explore faith with curiosity and confidence.

#### **Wonder Box**

The invitation for churches to sign up for our first Wonder Box has gone out, and we are excited to begin shipping later this year. It is filled with sensory-



friendly supports for worship and faith formation, these resources will bless families and congregations across the Synod of the Sun and beyond.

# Faith For The Journey



ne thing I look forward to every year around this time is writing a devotional for our Advent Booklet. In a moment of nostalgia, I read through my submissions from years past, and one hit me right where I am today. It was in response to the reading for that day: Luke 9:1-6. Jesus has blessed and commissioned his disciples to go out to proclaim the Kingdom of God and to heal. And Jesus told them to take nothing with them.

Here are some of my thoughts from 4 years ago:

This makes me think about our calling and how to trust God enough to step out in faith. Jesus sent the disciples out to proclaim the word and to heal. There was no internet, telephone, or printing press to help spread the word. There were no cars, trains, or planes to expedite travel. No hotel reservations to secure a place to sleep, no drive-thru for a quick meal. Do all the changes we have experienced in our world diminish our true calling: to be in Christian community, to welcome and embrace one another into a community where there are no strangers? That requires our physical presence, our connection to one another through our thoughts, words, and deeds.

Can we step out in faith, using solely what is contained in who we are, and proclaim the word to one another and provide healing to one another with our love and care? We can, with the enduring love and confidence that Jesus gave his disciples and gives us through the Holy Spirit. With that in mind, may our prayer today be: "When we come to the edge of all the light we have and must take a step into the darkness of the unknown, may we believe that one of two things will happen. Either God will provide something solid for us to stand on, or He will teach us how to fly."

So, as we navigate the Advent season, anticipating the birth of Jesus, the winter season longing for warmth, and the holiday season seeking connection, may we find hope, light, and joy that doesn't need wrapping paper or a bow. It can be as simple as looking someone in the eye and saying, "Peace be with you."

# People, Look East



eople, look east. The time is near
Of the crowning of the year.
Make your house fair as you are able,
Trim the hearth and set the table.
People, look east and sing today:
Love, the Guest, is on the way.

Furrows, be glad. Though earth is bare,
One more seed is planted there:
Give up your strength the seed to nourish,
That in course the flower may flourish.
People, look east and sing today:
Love, the Rose, is on the way.

Birds, though you long have ceased to build, Guard the nest that must be filled. Even the hour when wings are frozen God for fledging time has chosen. People, look east and sing today: Love, the Bird, is on the way.

Stars, keep the watch. When night is dim
One more light the bowl shall brim,
Shining beyond the frosty weather,
Bright as sun and moon together.
People, look east and sing today:
Love, the Star, is on the way.

For me, the last Sunday of Advent would not be complete without the singing of our very favorite Advent hymn, "People, Look East" (Glory to God 105).

When I see bare earth, a world where it can feel hard to keep building God's kingdom, and a night darker and colder than I expect, I'm reminded how much we need God to dwell with us. Though God is already here, this season lets me make new room for that presence. This Advent hymn shows that faithful waiting opens our lives to holy work: flowers flourish, nests find new life, and light shines for those who still walk in darkness.

The final stanza echoes many beloved Christmas carols:
Angels, announce with shouts of mirth
Christ who brings new life to earth.
Set every peak and valley humming
With the word, the Lord is coming.
People, look east and sing today:
Love, the Lord, is on the way.

The angels declare the coming of Christ, as they have every Christmas of my life. I will always remember how deep my joy was at the end of my first Advent, after four weeks of preparation and expectation.

This year, our Sunday preparation features the first six O Antiphons in a new commission by Dominick DiOrio (made possible by the Mary Margaret Heath Choral Music Endowment), with the seventh on Christmas Eve. DiOrio notes the refrains are scored for chorus, violin, and organ, usually working together but sometimes diverging. The third highlights a lyrical violin line, the middle is an a cappella motet in early Renaissance style, and the sixth rests the violin. The final, O Emmanuel, borrows the opening stanza of the ancient hymn Veni, Veni, Emmanuel, beloved by many, including the composer.

And so we declare the hope of "People, Look East," rejoicing that our Emmanuel has come to us and will

come to us again. I hope you find this journey of peace to be a meaningful part of your preparation for Jesus' arrival, and that all our hearts will be a little more open to receive him this year.


#### **Camp Shiloh Cookie Donations**


