Big Idea: Sound theology must always lead us to passionate doxology.

"The ultimate goal of theology is not knowledge, but worship. If our learning and knowledge of God do not lead to the joyful praise of God, we have failed. We learn only that we might laud. Another way of putting it is to say that theology without doxology is idolatry. The only theology worth studying is a theology that can be sung." —Sam Storms

1.	Read Romans 11:33-36. Why does Paul end chapter 11 in such a passionate expression of worship?
	What attributes of God do these verses emphasize?
	What do these verses tell you about yourself?
2.	The goal of sound theology is passionate doxology. Yet passionate doxology can't exist apart from sound theology. Asses whether your knowledge of God outweighs your worhsip or whether your worship of God outweighs your knowledge.
	What does it say about your relationship with God if you know him more than you worhsip him?
	What does it say about your relationship with God if you worship him more than you know him?
3.	Think of one or two ways in which you might be in a <i>glory war</i> with God. Dedicate these situations to <i>Soli Deo Gloria</i> —for the glory of God alone.
4.	Commit to spending some time purposefully worshipping God this week outside of Sunday morning. When, where, how are you going to do this?
