Section 1: Healthy teaching/ Sound Doctrine

INTRODUCTION:

Doctrine is understood as a principle, position, or body of principles in a branch of knowledge. It includes both specific teachings, and groupings of related teachings. Good teaching (*Doctrine*) leads to good practice, and bad teaching (*Doctrine*) leads to bad practice. Whether a certain teaching (*or someone's teaching*) is good depends on its' truthfulness, its' clarity, and its' practicality. If it isn't true, can't be understood, and can't be applied to life, then the teaching has fallen short of its' purpose.

What is spiritually healthy teaching (or sound doctrine) all about? Think about it this way... truth is both helpful & healthy. If you tell someone about a deal that you just found at a certain store, it could be helpful for the other person. If you were lying about it, or simply mistakenly gave them the wrong information, however, it wouldn't be helpful at all. It could even be unhealthy. In some ways, the misinformation, or deceit could even damage your relationship, or at least their willingness to trust you the next time.

If it's helpful and healthy to share information about a good deal on something, how much more helpful and healthy is it to know and share the truth regarding the world we live in, and the God who created everything that exists (outside of than Himself). The world we live in is not the way it was meant to be, but God has graciously revealed all that we need to know regarding origins, meaning, purpose, morality, beauty, destiny, and more. God made all things good (in their original form), and even though the world as we know it changed when humanity rebelled against Him, we are not without hope. We can learn how to engage wisely in the world, through God's revelation to man (The Bible).

The New Testament reveals the concept of 'Sound Doctrine'. It is also referred to as 'Sound words', "the sound doctrine of God', 'the faith', 'the truth', "the teaching", "the apostles' teaching", and more. 'Sound Doctrine' is both healthy and helpful. In this first section, we'll explore what this teaching is, why it matters, and how it can change our lives.

God & the Bible

INTRODUCTION:

There is one true God. He's a person, not a construct, or a force. He exists eternally in three persons (God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit). He wants us to know Him, love Him, and enjoy fellowship with Him. We as humans can know Him, only because He has chosen to reveal Himself. He has done so through Creation, and through His Word (The Bible), and through His Son (Jesus).

Read Psalm 19

- 1. Describe God's revelation through creation (v. 1-6) *Also see Romans 1:18-20
- 2. Describe God's revelation through His Word (v. 7-14)
- 3. Compare and contrast these (2) ways in which God has chosen to reveal Himself.

The Bible also explains that "the word became flesh and dwelt among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth." (John 1:14) Ultimately, Jesus (God, the Son) took on flesh and entered into the human experience. In His conception, birth, life, and death, He revealed that He alone is the way, the truth and the life. No one can truly know God (come to the Father), except through Jesus. He alone has command of nature. As He walked the earth, He both embodied & spoke the word of God in a way unlike that of any religious teacher.

The Bible assumes the existence of God, as when you speak a word, that act assumes your existence. If/since God is God, He doesn't need to "prove" Himself. He is eternal, without beginning or end. He has no origin. This is a strange concept to our finite minds, since everything we encounter here on earth has both a beginning and ending. Yet God has neither. He has always existed. And He has always existed in three distinct, yet equal and united, persons.

Many skeptics think they can stump a believer by asking for proof of God's existence. This shouldn't be intimidating. Although we can't see God, He has provided ample evidence of His existence. The question is whether we choose to believe the evidence, and believe Him.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS:

HISTORY OF THE BIBLE

When God inspired men to write His Word, they wrote in one of three languages: Hebrew, Aramaic, and Greek. Since then the Bible has been copied and translated so other peoples and cultures could read it. Today's Bible can be read in over 704 languages.

Because these books were written hundreds (and in some cases, thousands) of years before the first printing press, copies were handmade. Great precautions were taken to keep each copy accurate, yet variations (most very slight) occurred between copies. In 1516 A.D. the first Greek New Testament was printed on a press.

The Bible we use today is derived from a thorough comparison of early copies to determine the wording that most closely represents the original writings. Many of our popular versions (New American Standard Version, English Standard Version, New International Version, for example) are translated from accurate Greek testaments by groups of outstanding scholars. They have studied each sentence and word in order to bring to us an English Bible that most closely represents the original wording and meaning of God's Word.

THE WORD OF GOD

If the Bible is not God's Word, then all our beliefs are in vain. If the Bible is God's Word, inspired (Godbreathed) and without error, then we can have confidence in what we believe.

Section 6:

Introduction to the unseen realm

REFLECTION QUESTIONS:

"Faith (πίστις) is the **assurance** (ὑπόστασις) of things hoped for, the **conviction** (ἔλεγχος) of things not seen..."

(Hebrews 11:1)

FAITH: "primarily, firm persuasion," a conviction based upon hearing... to believe, also to be persuaded of, reliance upon, confidence in, not mere credence." (Vines)

ASSURANCE: "the noun corresponds only to the following senses, which can involve independent derivations of the noun from the verb: 1. "to stand under (as a support)," 2. "to place oneself under (concealment)," 3. "to stand off from," "to deposit oneself as sediment on the ground," and hence "to be," "to exist," 4. "to promise." From these meanings we get the following meanings of the noun: 1. "support," 2. "ambush," 3. "deposit," "sediment," trans. everything that settles, hence the philosophical sense "existence," "reality," Lat. substantia (*Gerhard Kittel, Geoffrey W. Bromiley, and Gerhard Friedrich, TDNT*)

CONVICTION: "proof, convincing, in Heb. 11:1, the sense of elénchos is "persuasion," but not in a subjective sense. An elénchos is present as the basis of resting on what is hoped for. Faith does not do the convincing, but God, for the whole point in Hebrews is that faith stands on the revelation, word, and promise of God. Faith is the divinely given conviction of things unseen and is thus the assurance of what is hoped for."

(Gerhard Kittel, Geoffrey W. Bromiley, and Gerhard Friedrich, TDNT)

The unseen realm is just as real as the things in the seen realm. The spiritual is just as real as the physical.

ANGEL (מֵלְאָךְ, mal'akh; מֵלְאַךְ, mal'akh; ἄγγελος, angelos).

Heavenly messengers in the Bible. The Hebrew and Greek words usually translated as "angel" are probably better translated as "messenger."



THE PERSONAL FUTURE OF EVERY BELIEVER:

- 1. **Smiling at the future** (Prov. 31:25; Matt. 6:33-34)
- 2. Living with an untroubled heart (John 14:1-6)
- 3. Living a life free from condemnation (John 3:16-21; Rom. 8:1; Rom. 6:1-12)
- 4. Not destined for "the wrath to come" (1 Thess. 1:9-20)
- 5. **Possibility 1: Physical "death"** (2 Cor. 5:8; John 11:25)
 - a. Those who die, will be with Jesus, when Jesus descends with a shout, the voice of the archangel, and the trumpet of God. Their physical bodies will be resurrected at that time. (1 Thess. 4:13-18)
- 6. **Possibility 2: The swallowing up of our mortal body w/ life in an instant** (1 Cor. 15:50-57)
 - a. There is a future moment, when Jesus will descend with 1. a shout 2. the voice of the archangel, and 3. the trumpet of God. All Church Age believers who are alive at this time "will be caught up together with those who have already died, and will meet the Lord in the air" (1 Thess. 4:13-18)
- 7. **The Judgment seat of Christ** (Rom. 14:10-12; 1 Cor. 3:10-15; 2 Cor. 5:10)
 - a. This may happen immediately after death (Heb. 9:27)
 - b. The timing for those who are "caught up" is uncertain. Possibly immediately, or sometime before the marriage of the lamb, since the bride will be without spot or wrinkle (Eph. 5:27; Rev. 19:7-8)
- 8. **A future coming with all "His Saints"** (1 Thess. 3:13; Rev...)
 - a. Takes place after the Marriage & Marriage Supper of the Lamb (Rev. 19:1-16), Armageddon (Rev. 19:17-21), a future resurrection of saints who died during the tribulation (Rev. 20:4; Dan. 12:2) and before a future Millenium/ thousand-year reign (Rev. 20:1-3)
- 9. A millennial Kingdom in which all believers will reign with Christ:
 - a. The Jewish Disciples from Israel will reign (Matthew 19:28)
 - b. Church age believers will reign (1 Cor. 6:1-2; 2 Tim. 2:12)
 - c. Those who died during the trib. will reign (Rev. 20:4)
- 10. A post Millennial resurrection of the rest of the dead (dead without Christ) (Rev. 20:5)
- 11. A final battle:
 - a. The nations will be gathered by Satan to attack Jerusalem once more (Rev. 20:7-9)
 - b. Satan and his minions will be eternally vanquished (Rev. 20:10)
 - c. God will then judge "the dead" (Rev. 20:5, 12), justly throwing them into the lake of fire (Rev. 20:11-15)
- 12. The new Heavens & Earth (Rev. 21-22)

THE PERSONAL FUTURE OF EVERY UNBELIEVER:

- 1. Possibility 1: Death
 - a. body in the ground
 - b. spirit in Hell/ Abaddon/ the pit/ torment
- 2. **Possibility 2: The Day of the Lord** (OT verses about the D.O.L.)
 - a. "Jacob's trouble" (Jer. 30:7)
 - i. National repentance in Israel (Zech. 12; Rom. 11:26; 9:22-23)
 - ii. Seven years of "Jacob's trouble" (Dan. 9:26-27)
 - iii. This period begins when the Anti-Christ enforces "a covenant with many" (1 Thess. 5; Ezek. 38:8,11). This will not happen until He is revealed, which won't take place until "what" & "who" restrains him now is taken out of the way (2 Thess. 2:6-9).
 - iv. The 70th week of Daniel / Tribulation (Dan. 9:24-27; Rev. ch. 4-19)
 - b. **Identifying "the wrath to come"** (1 Thess. 1:9-20; Rev. 6:16-17)
- 3. **Armageddon** (Rev. 19:17-21)
- 4. All who have died will be raised after the Millennial resurrection (Dan. 12:2; Rev. 20:5)
- 5. **In a final battle, the nations, led by Satan, will attack Jerusalem once more** (Rev. 20:7-9)
- 6. They will be judged according to their deeds (Rev. 20:5, 12), since they rejected Jesus (John 12:48). Their sentence will be to be thrown into the lake of fire (Rev. 20:11-15).
