Crystal Wheeler—A Journey of Faith, Strength, and Survival



Two years ago, my world changed when I heard the words, "You have cancer." That was the hardest part of this journey—simply finding out. I was so angry. I was so jealous of other women. I was full of envy and jealousy because I felt like no matter what other women were going through or what they were telling me whether their dog was dying, or that their baby was sick, or they were gaining weight, or they couldn't pay their bills... it didn't matter because they didn't have cancer! All I wanted to scream was "at least you don't have cancer!"

I learned how to pray more and increase my faith. I held on to the promise that all I needed was "faith the size of a mustard seed" and that's what got me through. I prayed a lot and had **faith**. I felt comfortable telling God that I was scared and worried. When I prayed, I asked God to give me the **strength** and the peace that I needed not to worry. I was able to be real with God about how I was feeling. I talked honestly with God, and I asked Him to give me the strength and peace that I needed.

My doctor encouraged me the most. She told me, "How you go into this is what matters," and I chose to go in with positivity and faith. I did a lot of praying, research, and spiritual learning. I realized that my fight wasn't just physical, it was spiritual, too. This journey completely changed how I see life. I no longer value material things the way I used to. What matters most to me now is time, peace, and the gift of each new day that God gives me.

Today, I am two years cancer-free! I celebrate August 18th as my "new birthday." I survived surgery, anesthesia, and chemo treatments, and I thank God for bringing me through it all. I pamper myself with all things pink, soft things, peace and tranquility.

If I could give anyone advice who has just been diagnosed, I would tell them what my doctor told me—it's all about how you go into this. If you manifest negativity, you get negativity. There is power in the tongue. At first, there will be no settled answers because you just don't know until you start your journey. Don't expect the physical to change, heal or to manifest until you start with the spiritual.

I want to be there for others walking this same road. No one should go through this alone. I believe God places angels in our path—I met so many women who encouraged me and reminded me that I wasn't alone. I knew that God had placed that person right there with me to tell me, "I got you. You're going to be all right."

Monique Kiser—Faith Over Fear



I was diagnosed with breast cancer in 2020 — right in the middle of the COVID pandemic. It's been five years now. Because my cancer was caught early and it was very small, I had a good medical team and a strong faith that carried me through.

After my surgery, I asked my doctor when I could officially say I was cancer free. My

oncologist told me that the lump was gone, but that I still needed to go through radiation. Thankfully, I didn't have to go through chemotherapy. I continue to visit my oncologist regularly, but this December marks my fifth year — and I will finally say, "I am cancer free!"

My biggest fear/challenge was that as we were in the heart of Covid, I had just had my mammogram and they called me back because it showed something suspicious. I had to take a series of tests. When the next set of tests came back, the imaging practitioner called me and said, "you have a little bit of cancer." I remember thinking, "What's a little bit of cancer? What does that even mean?"

Hearing those words over the phone was devastating. I sat and cried. My mother had been a double breast cancer survivor, and my first thought was, "I'm glad she's not here to hear this — she would think the worst." But then immediately after that, I was sad, because she wasn't here. I had so many thoughts racing through my mind: "Mama's gone... we're in the middle of a pandemic... and now I have cancer... what am I to do?"

When I got the diagnosis, I had to go into the hospital building during COVID. Everyone was masked up. I was afraid to go in with a compromised immune system. I had to go in to get prepared and each time I went in, my heart rate was up, so I had to keep going back until my heart rate came down. Wrapping my head around the fact that we were right in the midst

of this pandemic and I was diagnosed with cancer — that was the hardest part for me. But the Lord worked it out. When I went in for my procedure, I didn't have to go through the emergency room where the COVID patients were. That was nobody but God.

After the initial phone call, I was in a daze. I thank God for placing the right people around me. I can't remember if I called or she called. But talking with a fellow sister from our Missions Ministry, she was one of the first people I told. We prayed and talked, and I was so thankful that she understood what I was going through because she was also a survivor. I didn't feel alone anymore. The Minister of Missions and our Pastor prayed for me constantly. Even though my mama was gone, I realized that God had given me a family (My Church Family) that would be with me as I went through this.

I had a great doctor. She was thorough, detailed, and she really listened. Whenever I needed something, she referred me to the right specialist. When she sent me to a particular imaging center for my mammogram, I believe that's what allowed my cancer to be found early. I trust her and thank God for putting her into my life early on.

When I went to the hospital to have the surgery, my oncologist was very positive. She said "The good thing is it was caught very early. The size of an M&M. We are going to do this operation so you can go on and get on with your life. And your doctor believes in God and she is a praying person."

I'm telling "Lottie Dottie and everybody" — get your mammograms! While you're healthy, build a relationship with a doctor you trust. Early detection saved my life. I wasn't always great at doing self-exams, but I've learned how important they are. Too many people avoid going to the doctor because they're afraid of bad news, but I tell everyone — go anyway! It's better to know and take action than to not go and not know.

I celebrate my milestones by giving back. I became part of the Breast Cancer Ministry at my church, and I share my story whenever I can. God brought me through, and now I want to help others find the same hope, healing, and faith that carried me.

Reneé DeShazor—A Faith Strengthened

Reneé DeShazor has been a devoted member of TSAKS for 15 years and currently serves as the Coordinator for our Cancer Support Ministry. Her journey through breast cancer is one of courage, faith, and transformation. She is a 14-year cancer survivor.

After receiving her diagnosis and prior to getting her biopsy, Reneé says she heard God speak clearly to her heart: "You must go through this to get to what I have for you." She owes her greatest recovery to Almighty God for His favor and grace on her life. The road ahead was difficult. She recalls, "There were days I had to crawl upstairs because I was too weak and in too much pain to stand." She also suffered from neuropathy in her fingers and feet on a daily basis, and other body impairments during the journey. But she persevered even while still working.

Her family and church friends became her lifeline. Her daughter, sisters, sister-in-law, and nieces—along with her best friend of 52 years from Ohio—stood by her side every step of the way. They each took part in accompanying her to her monthly chemotherapy treatments. Church friends brought meals, prayed with her, and lifted her spirits. Knowing that others were praying for her was deeply encouraging.

The experience changed her outlook on life. "People think they will live forever," she reflects. "This was my wake-up call." Her faith has grown stronger, and she feels more connected to God than ever before. She believes she's gained a spirit of discernment and now understands the power of mindset. "Life is what's valuable — not stuff."

For anyone who has been recently diagnosed with breast cancer, Reneé offers these words of encouragement: "I had no symptoms other than a small bump under my arm. I missed my mammogram in 2009, and in 2010 they found a lump. This disease can be a silent killer. I urge others to draw closer to God, seek a faith-based support system, and believe that healing is possible." She also shares a practical tip: applying Lidocaine and Aquaphor to the injection site before chemo or radiation can help ease burning sensation or pain.

Reneé celebrates milestones by holding on to her Faith and listening to her body. Her advice is clear, "Do self-examinations every month and GET YOUR YEARLY MAMMOGRAM. Early detection is the best protection."





AROUND THE WORLD ON CHRISTMAS

Christmas is an annual tradition to commemorate and recognize the birth of Jesus Christ, as the Son of the Living God. It is celebrated throughout the world on or around December 25th.

Here are just a few places and their traditions . . .

First up – **MEXICO**

"Feliz Navidad" means Merry Christmas and in Mexico they celebrate the birth of Christ primarily on Christmas Eve, "Noche Buena" which means "the good night". They gather with family at church and then home for a huge meal and fellowship. However the celebration is not held to one night as it is here in America.

The Christmas season begins with "Posadas" (which means inn, hostel or hotel) and is a festival held from December 16th to the 24th and reenacts Mary and Joseph's journey to find a place to stay for Jesus' birth. It often involves a procession with singing and the breaking of pinatas. The people are welcomed into individual homes for food, drink and prayer.

Christmas celebrations conclude with "Dia de los Reyes". When translated it means "Three Kings Day." It takes place on January 6th, (the 12th day of Christmas) and commemorates the arrival of the Three Wise Men. Children receive gifts brought by the Wise Men instead of Santa Claus.

The celebration meal may be a rich, flavorful oxtail soup or stew and for dessert, "Rosca de Reyes", which is a sweet bread treat that has a figurine of the baby Jesus hidden inside!

Next - FRANCE

French traditions center on the main celebration, "Le Reveillon", (Christmas Eve Dinner), which is a large, festive meal prepared on December 24th. It often includes seafood, turkey, and "foie gras" (the liver of a goose or a duck that has

been fattened through a process of force feeding or "gavage", to make the organ bigger, richer and more buttery). Oh my!

Alsace, a city in France, is known for its elaborate and almost magical Christmas displays. Christmas trees are placed throughout the city along the streets. They are decorated with beautiful lights of all colors! And of course the celebration would not be complete without attending church services.

They do have a "Santa" of sorts whom they refer to as "Pe're Noell" or Father Christmas.

Last, but certainly not least – **ZIMBABWE**

Zimbabwean Christmas traditions start with church services. It is a special occasion so people typically dress up in new clothes or their Sunday best. The children believe that a "Santa Claus" brings them presents early on Christmas morning. They get the chance to show their friends at church and at the parties throughout the day what they received.

The day begins with worship. After that, they visit with family and friends, going house to house to fellowship with each other and of course there is a feast; a very large celebratory meal. This usually includes a dish with chicken, (which used to be very expensive in Zimbabwe), rice, and all kinds of vegetables. There is also dancing and singing of Christmas carols with traditional and modern music. Some homes are decorated with Christmas trees and other decorations throughout the house. Some households still decorate with various plants and Ivy focusing just on the main living room. Presents are also exchanged.

Many Zimbabweans blend Christian practices with traditional beliefs including feasts to honor ancestors alongside Christian sermons. A lot of the people will put their stereo speakers in the window or outside of the house and play their favorite music real loud! It is not just Christmas music that can be heard but also the latest tunes and old African favorites fill the air.

Wow! What a trip, right? So what do you see that we all have in common? No matter where in the world, we celebrate the birth of God's only begotten son.

Though the customs differ across countries, the heart of Christmas remains the same: Celebrating the birth of Jesus Christ, bringing families and communities together, and sharing joy, love, and faith. As the Bible reminds us:

"For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given; and the government shall be upon His shoulder: and His name shall be called Wonderful, Counselor, The mighty God, The everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace." - Isaiah 9:6

YOU ARE GOING TO HAVE A BABY—The Real CHRISTmas

COOL A FAVOR Six more

Firstborn children bring a lot of excitement to waiting parents. But if an angel were to tell you that you were going to give birth after being barren your whole life, and it would be a son in a culture where not having a son was disgraceful you would have reason to be speechless with unbridled joy. But what kind of emotions would you have if you were not yet married and an angel were to tell you that you were going to give birth to a son? And not just any boy, but the Son of God conceived by the Holy Spirit. This is not your typical birth announcement and may not be met with the greatest level of excitement, since sex outside marriage was a capital offense. This is not an entertaining soapbox drama, but the unfolding of God's eternal plan, surrounded by miracles and charged with emotion.

A FAVORED VIRGIN

Six months after telling Zechariah his prayer had been answered, God sent the angel Gabriel to Nazareth, a town in Galilee (1:26), on another mission with another birth announcement. At the time, Israel was divided into three territories: Judea, Samaria, and Galilee. Nazareth was in Galilee, the northernmost of the territories. Nazareth did not have much going for it, except that two insignificant people lived there who would become very significant in the plan of God.

God is not limited to working within the same value systems we tend to elevate. Why Nazareth? Why Mary? Why Joseph? Because insignificant places and people are made significant when God shows up and leaves His fingerprints on them. Without His touch, those the world considers significant live in constant search for meaning and importance. Gabriel had another miracle to announce. It might have seemed miraculous that an elderly couple would have a baby, but it could be explained that strange things sometimes do happen. However, a virgin having a baby is impossible. Even angels should know that.

This time, the miracle was not the result of prolonged prayer. In fact, this miracle might not be viewed as a blessing. The birth announcement was delivered to a virgin, whose name was Mary (1:27). Being unmarried and pregnant would pose a very disgraceful, critical problem. If an unmarried woman became pregnant, the only conclusion would be that she was immoral and should be stoned to death as prescribed by Jewish law. If she were to claim her innocence by saying she was a virgin whose pregnancy was caused by the Holy Spirit, the charges of lying, insanity, and heresy could be added.

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The angel said, "Greetings, you who are highly favored! The Lord is with you" (1:28). Why was Mary so highly favored? Why was the Lord with her in some special way? Why did God choose her to bear His only Son? Mary was certainly a remarkable young woman. There is no indication, however, that she was immaculately conceived herself, as some suggest, or that because of her role in God's plan she should be the channel through which our prayers reach God. She was chosen by the sovereign decision of God, separated out from others to be God's servant for a special task. God often works out His sovereign will by favoring common people like Mary and us to accomplish His purpose. The focus should never be on us but on the purpose of God that is being accomplished through us.

Mary was pledged to be married to a man named Joseph (1:27). Mary and Joseph were not yet married only pledged to each other. In that culture, pledging or betrothal lasted for a year and was as binding as marriage. It could only be dissolved by divorce, which is why it was said of Joseph that because he "was a righteous man and did not want to expose her to public disgrace, he had in mind to divorce her quietly" (Matt. 1:19). Joseph was identified as being a descendant of David (Luke 1:27). Both of the genealogies of Jesus, recorded in Matthew and Luke, traced His lineage back through David, fulfilling the prophecy that the Messiah would be of the house of David.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE BIRTH OF THE SON OF GOD

Just as Gabriel had done with Zechariah and Elizabeth, he communicated God's choice for the child's name: "You are to give him the name Jesus" (1:31). It is in the name of Jesus that "every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the

Father" (Phil. 2:10–11). We must first know Him as Savior before we can know Him as Lord.

God's divine plan of salvation would be accomplished through a never-to-be-repeated miracle. Gabriel told Mary that the Holy Spirit would come upon her and the power of the Most High would overshadow her (Luke 1:35). This rather simple message contained complex realities that mystified Mary and around which we cannot fully wrap our understanding. The angel was telling Mary that the baby she would carry would be of divine origin. Her conception would not be the result of human action but of Holy Spirit action.

Mary's response was, "How will this be?" (1:34). She would have every reason to question the validity of the message. Yet her question seems to be more for understanding the process than of accepting its truthfulness "Given what you say, how will it happen, since I am a virgin?" We may believe and accept the Word from God, but when viewed through the lens of our circumstances and our understanding of the laws of nature, the plan and promise of God can appear impossible.

The word given to Mary needs to be spoken into the life of every follower of Christ: "Nothing is impossible with God" (1:37). Our circumstances may make the transition difficult, but this Word needs to move from being intellectually believed to being the conviction of our hearts. We will face things in our lives that have no resolution, and we will see them as impossible. But when God is included in the equation, possibilities show up. Nothing is impossible with God!

Mary's response to the plan of God was remarkable. Knowing the potential for personal embarrassment and disgrace, she said, "I am the Lord's servant ... May it be to me as you have said" (1:38). Though Mary was favored by God, it did not insulate her from difficulty and hurt. In fact, obedience to the plan of God would lead her

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into the potential of experiencing serious problems. But she viewed herself to be the Lord's servant, and servants serve their masters.

After delivering his message, the angel left her. Times of divine visitation are wonderful, but the moment comes when we are left alone. There are no angels. There is no further word from God. There is no one else with whom we can share our thoughts or questions. No doubt Mary would wake up tomorrow with a new set of questions, but who would answer them? Who would walk with her through the days of uncertainty that lay ahead? The words of the angel would become her assurance: "The Lord is with you." When we follow the plan of God, we experience the presence and receive the provisions of God.

Meanwhile, what must Joseph have been going through? He too was being asked to believe that God would accomplish His plan through him. Our commitment to pursue God's purpose for us will affect our relationships with others. God's plan for Mary needed to be accepted by Joseph as well. She could be pleased that in spite of big risks; he stood with her in her journey of faith. If your resolve to follow Christ is supported by spouse, family, and friends, you are a blessed person and should thank God that He is working in the lives of those around you while He is working in you.
