Get To Know You Question:

What is the funniest or craziest thing you have ever "squandered" money on?

Let's Dig Deeper

Someone read **Luke 2:8-14.** Spend some time and share some key words that spoke out to you while reading. What is it about those words that spoke to you?

A Savior Has Been Born (Luke 2:8-11).

- 1. When the angel announces "good news of great joy," why do you think joy is tied to the arrival of a Savior rather than to anything else in life people normally look to for happiness?
- 2. There are many people that assume Jesus came to fix our unfulfilled dreams or emotional struggles. Why do you think our culture tends to redefine salvation around feelings instead of sin?
- 3. In your own life, where do you see the temptation to treat Jesus more as a "life improver" than as the Savior from sin?
- 4. If "saved" means "rescued from danger," how does that word reshape the seriousness with which we view sin?
- 5. What changes in a person's worship when they begin to understand that salvation is not ultimately about life becoming easier, but about being delivered from guilt and judgment?

The Universal Need for Rescue

- 6. Pastor Scott points out that not everyone feels unfulfilled or driven by destructive passions. Why is it essential that salvation answers a *universal* problem rather than a selective one?
- 7. When you think about standing before God apart from Christ, what part of your own sinfulness reminds you most that you needed rescuing?

8. How does the truth that Jesus saves from sin (not merely from unhappy circumstances) bring deeper gratitude than the "popular" versions of salvation many people embrace?

Christ the Lord (Luke 2:0-11).

- 9. Luke gives titles instead of a name: Savior, Christ, Lord. Which of these three titles strikes you most deeply right now, and why?
- 10. Jesus is King, Priest, and Prophet simultaneously. Which of those roles do you feel most dependent on in your life right now?
- 11. Pastor Scott emphasizes that confessing "Jesus is Lord" is the foundational statement of Christianity. What does that confession practically demand in the way you make decisions, submit to God, or lead your home?
- 12. Why do you think it is easy to affirm "Jesus is Savior" but harder to consistently live as if "Jesus is Lord"?

Glory to God in the Highest (Luke 2:13-14).

- 13. The angels erupt in praise simply because Jesus arrived. Why do you think heaven reacts with such intensity to something the world barely noticed?
- 14. We need to remember that "peace on earth" is not emotional calm but peace with God. How does that distinction change the way Christians should face fear, disappointment, or uncertainty?
- 15. The phrase "men of His good pleasure" means God freely delights to save. How does this truth humble pride, deepen gratitude, and reshape the way we view the people around us who do not yet know Christ?
