When have you found yourself avoiding God, Knowing His presence and truth would mess with decisions you had already made without His help?

In what way can God's commands to Ahaz help you in your own crisis of faith: Be careful, keep calm, don't be afraid, and do not lose heart?




God Has Done Wonderful Things

Both Paul (Romans 9:33; 10:11) and Peter (1 Peter 1:6) use Isaiah 28:16 to apply it to Christ and the disciple's faith in Him. Reading this passage in its original context from Isaiah, what lessons do we learn about building a life that will endure?

Jesus saw a parallel between the attitude of God's people in the days of Isaiah and the attitude of God's people in his own day (Matthew 15:7 - 9; Mark 7:6 - 8). This attitude that God is pleased with the mere external professions of His people threatens the life of the church in all generations. How have you found this to be true? In what ways can the "mountain of God" turn into "the realm of the dead" among believers today? How can it be prevented?

Read Isaiah 32 - 39 in preparation for this week's study.

Summarize your reading. What made an impression on you?

Describe the attack by Sennacherib on the power and character of God?

We have an enemy who, "when he lies, he speaks his native language, for he is a liar and the father of lies" (John 8:44). How does our enemy use the same tactics as Sennacherib's field commander?

Why are Hezekiah's actions a godly response to times of crisis? What can help you when you are challenged by your next difficult situation?

What do you find significant about Hezekiah's trusting response to his time of illness? What would you like to emulate in your own life?

Hezekiah was a great man of faith, and yet he showed on at least one occasion that his pride countermanded his trust in God. What warnings or alarms does Hezekiah's example set off for you? How do you pursue keeping pride in check so that trust in God may have control of your life?

Read Isaiah 40 - 44 in preparation for this week's study.

Summarize your reading. What made an impression on you?

Describe messages of the four voices in Isaiah 40. What do we learn from these four voices?

What images does Isaiah use to illustrate the relationship between God and Israel? What do we learn from these images about the relationship between God and Israel?

"apart from me there is no God"

In Isaiah 44:6 - 20 he describes the foolishness of idols. What do we learn about idols from this passage? What idols do we tend to follow today? What makes idolatry just as foolish today as it was in the time of Isaiah?

What idols have you had to struggle with in your life? How can God's character and promises help overcome idolatry in our lives?

Read Isaiah 45 - 48 in preparation for this week's study.

Summarize your reading. What made an impression on you?

What does it mean to be a servant, specifically a servant of God?

As a servant of God, what tasks was Israel expected to fulfill? (See Isaiah 42:1 - 7; 43:8 - 13; 46:8 - 13)

As a servant of God, how well did Israel fulfill their role as God's servant? (See Isaiah 42:18 - 20; 45:9 - 13; 48:1 - 8; 48:17 - 19)



Sunday, March 1 Lesson 9

"for the sake of Jacob my servant"

What was God's promise to Israel as His servant? (See Isaiah 15:1 - 7; 46:1 - 4; 48:9 - 11)

In what ways is God's mission for the church like the mission He gave to Israel? In what ways does God work His mission in us as He did in Israel?

In which aspect of your mission would you most like to grow in?

Read Isaiah 49 - 59 in preparation for this week's study.

Summarize your reading. What made an impression on you?

In what ways do discipline, hardships and trials help prepare a person for the mission and service of God? What insight does James 1:2 - 8 help us in this?

How does the description of the Servant in 52:13 - 53:14 fulfill the mission that we read about in chapters 42 and 49?

Although Jesus quoted Isaiah frequently, the Gospels never record that He quoted 52:13 - 53:12. He simply lived it. Even so, this passage is cited more often in the New Testament than any other Old Testament passage. The early Christians considered it the central explanation for Jesus' work on earth.

What phrase is especially significant to you? As you meditate on it, what implication does it have for your life?

How would you describe the peace and healing you have experienced because of the Servant of God?

How will you come to know and appreciate the Servant of God better so that you can become the servant of God for out time?
