Sermon Summary Growing up to the Image of Christ (Ephesians 4:1-16)

Summary: The church's growth depends not only on our relationship with God but also on our mutual relationship cultivated with humility, gentleness, forbearance (or patience), and love, by which we will grow up to the image of Christ, the Son of God.

The Life Worthy of God's Calling – Four characteristics, humility and gentleness, forbearance or patience, and love

Paul identifies himself as "a prisoner for the Lord" (Eph 4:1). The correct translation is not "a prisoner for the Lord" but "a prisoner in the Lord." He was in prison because of his testimony of Jesus the Lord: he was in the Lord. He was bound to the Lord, tied to him. He was the prisoner of the Lord. Paul's imprisonment is an outcome of his obedience to Christ, his sovereign lordship.

Ephesian Christians, who are not in prison, are the prisoners in the Lord because they are bound to Christ. The relationship they made with Christ is through his blood; it is the blood-bound relationship. Through his blood, the Ephesians were in peace with God; they were the dwelling place of God through the Holy Spirit. This relationship is with God as a community rather than as individuals. The Ephesian Christians are the body of Christ and the dwelling place of God on earth. Paul urges them to live a life worthy of their calling as the dwelling place of God, as the community of the people bound to Christ through his blood: "I urge you to live a life worthy of the calling you have received" (Eph 4:1).

The four characteristics worthy of God's calling into Christ are humility and gentleness, patience or forbearance, and love. These are all about the relationship between the church members. They make us worthy of God's calling into the body of Christ. Humility is related to gentleness, and patience is related to love. When we are humble, not thinking ourselves superior to others, we become open-minded to the people around us, showing our gentleness. Love is costly. It requires patience or forbearance. Without forbearing, we cannot show our love.

These characteristics are basic to sustaining "the unity of Spirit" among us in "the bond of peace." Our status in Christ is in reconciliation with God and between us, because of which we as the church are the indwelling place of God. We must "make every effort" to keep our status in the unity of the Spirit and the bond of peace. All our efforts for the unity and peace of the church are founded on our humility, generosity, patience, and love.

Building up the church means cultivating not only our relationship with God but also our mutual relationship. To have peace with God, we must break down the wall between us. God created us into one humanity in Christ, the crucified Lord, and then made us his dwelling place. Reconciliation between us is prior to the reconciliation between God and us (Eph 2:14-16). This is also the instruction of Jesus on how to worship God and pray to him: "Therefore, if you are offering your gift at the altar and there remember that your brother has something against you, leave your gift there in front of the altar. First go and be reconciled to your brother; then come and offer your gift" (Matt 5:23-24).

Why We must Build up the Church – God the Trinity, and Christ as the Cornerstone of the Church

One Body

It is God the Father who sent Jesus the Son to us and let him die on the cross and raised him from the dead and made him "both Lord and Christ" (Acts 4:36). Through the resurrection of Christ God proved that He "is over all and through all in all" (Eph 4:6). We have one Lord, Christ Jesus; "Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to men by which we must be saved" (Acts 4:12). Christ poured out the Holy Spirit into his churches. God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit are one and the same God, who created the church. We have "one Lord, one faith, one baptism; one God and Father of all, who is over all and through all and in all" (Eph 4:5-6). We are the household of God. Our humility, gentleness, patience, and love will cultivate our church to grow as the one body of Christ and the dwelling place of God through the Holy Spirit.

Leadership

Every church member is a church leader because all of them receive the assignments from Christ. We are all gifted people; some are called to be apostles, some to be prophets, some to be evangelists, and some to be pastors and teachers. The purpose of Christ to give us these assignments, these leaderships is the same; it is "to prepare God's people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up" (Eph 4:12). It is not for individual or personal prosperity but for the growth of the church as the body of Christ. How can we evaluate our ministry? It is the only criterion: we empower the congregation to move toward unity and mutuality, or instigate competition and divisiveness, or grouping. All of us are called to encourage the congregation to carry out the ministry of reconciliation, to keep the church in unity and love.

Growing up to the image of Christ

The goal of the growth of the church is to reach to "the unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God" and "to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ" (Eph 4:13); it is to unite us in our faith and knowledge in Christ and transform us to the image of Christ and make us grow up to the full measurement of the image of Christ.

Humility, gentleness, patience, and love characterize Christ the crucified Lord. All these characters reflect the image of Christ. Christ did self-downgrading by taking the image of human beings, lowering himself to the place of slave and accepting the humiliation to the crucifixion, the death punishment to the worst criminals from the underclass people; "And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself and became obedient to death – even death on a cross!" (Phil 2:8). Through the humility of Christ, God showed us his gentleness to us. Christ was patient even to the death on the cross. His bearing of the cross on himself showed God's love to us. God's love is costly; he sacrificed his Son to the cross, and his Son, Christ, was patient even to the death on the cross to manifest God's love to us.
