### Prepare to Share

### Scriptural Background

Prepare to teach by preparing your heart. Read the key passages for this lesson along with this background.

Thanksgiving is a time of showing appreciation for the blessings we have. We may go around the table and share things we're grateful for, things like family, friends, health, job, or highlights from the past year. But how often do we stop and just thank God for who he is and what he has done? James 1:17 says, "Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of lights with whom there is no variation or shadow due to change." We see here that all our blessings come from God-every good and perfect gift. We also see an important attribute, or quality, of God—his immutability. To be immutable means that God will never change. Other verses speak of God's immutability (see Numbers 23:19; Malachi 3:6; Psalm 102:25-27; Hebrews 13;8). Unlike the capricious false gods of other religions, we can count on God to keep his word and remain true to his character. The character of God helps us know and praise him for who he is.

Many of the Psalms give thanks and praise to God for who he is—his attributes. Psalm 33:2–5 gives thanks to the Lord for his faithfulness, righteousness, justice, and steadfast love. Psalm 100 is an

### Historical/Apologetics Background

The titles, names, and descriptions of God are worthy of further examination. Let's look at three mentioned in this lesson: Creator, Shepherd, and King. Many psalms emphasize God as Creator. While the Psalms are poetic rather than narrative writings, they contain historical truth and verify the Genesis account of creation. Psalm 104 gives praise to God for his greatness and power to create. The chapter even parallels the days of creation in Genesis, while covering other good things God made for man (e.g., water, food, wine, and oil). Psalm 95:5 proclaims that God made the sea and dry land, and Psalm 8:3 examines God's creation of the heavens. moon, and stars. Psalm 33:6-7 show that God created by the power of his word. Then God created mankind. Psalm 100:3 says, "It is he who made us, and we are his." Because God is our Creator, he is the ultimate authority. We answer to him. This is why exuberant song of thanksgiving to God our Maker and Shepherd who is good and whose love and faithfulness last forever. Without the love, righteousness, and faithfulness of the Lord, we would have no hope or salvation. Psalm 100 was associated with thank offerings and may have been sung when offerings were being presented on the altar.

The psalms also praise God for the things he has done. David begins Psalm 9 by recounting the wonderful deeds of the Lord, and we can follow this example. Remembering God's faithfulness to us in the past strengthens our faith in the present. It is all too easy to focus on our problems and lose our gratefulness instead of focusing on God.

Psalm 95 describes God as "the rock of our salvation" (v.1) and "a great King above all gods" (v.3), and then gives an overview of his power over creation (vv.4–5). The earth and everything in it are his because he is the Creator.

Our response to discovering more about who God is and what he has done should lead to joyful praise and grateful prayer. Singing to God is one way to express thanksgiving to him. Another way is to thank him specifically in prayer. Pray the psalms back to God, praising him for who he is and thanking him for all he has done.

biblical creation is under attack. Man wants to make his own rules and live free of God's laws. But we can only be truly free when we repent and come to God in faith and humility.

The Bible accurately tells us that "we all like sheep have gone astray; we have turned—every one—to his own way" (Isaiah 53:6). The Bible often refers to people as sheep: prone to wander, helpless against predators, and dirty with sin. Sheep are mentioned over 500 times in the Bible! However helpless we are, we can be thankful that we have a good Shepherd—Jesus! Jesus said, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep" (John 10:11). That's exactly what Jesus did for us. He died on the cross, laying his life down willingly so we can be saved by faith in him. Those who accept the gift of salvation offered through Jesus belong to God and are called his sheep (Psalm 100:3), and he will care for

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them (Psalm 23; Isaiah 40:11) and give them eternal life. This is cause for thanksgiving and worship!

As a good shepherd, God also takes responsibility for his sheep. Sheep learn to follow the voice of their shepherd. Jesus said, "My sheep hear my voice, and I know them, and they follow me. I give them eternal life, and they will never perish, and no one will snatch them out of my hand. My Father, who has given them to me, is greater than all, and no one is able to snatch them out of the Father's hand. I and the Father are one" (John 10:27–30). Jesus promised to give eternal life to his sheep and to protect them from the ultimate predator, Satan. The analogy of shepherd and sheep in the Bible was readily understood by people during Bible times, and it can com-

fort and encourage us today to know that God is our Shepherd, who provides, protects, and saves us.

Finally, God is our King. Psalm 95:3 says, "For the LORD is a great God, and a great King above all gods." God is the eternal king from creation (Psalm 74:12) to forever (Psalm 29:10). As King, God has power, authority, and control over all creation, including us. He is sovereign, and he will reign with justice and righteousness (Psalm 33:5; Isaiah 32:1). The Bible tells us that a day is coming when every knee will bow and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord (Philippians 2:10–11). All people will one day recognize God as the great King and Jesus as Lord. Let us remember to thank him today!

# Turkey Hunt Review Game


#### **Materials**

Small paper bag
Small wrapped candies
Turkey Feathers (following pages)
Turkey Footprints (following pages)
Tape

#### **Instructions**

Before class: Fill a small paper bag with candies, fold the top down to seal it closed. Draw a turkey face on one end (eyes, beak, wattle). Hide the turkey in your classroom. Print and cut out the Turkey Feathers with the review questions on them. Hide the feathers around the room. Print and cut out enough of the Turkey Footprints to tape on the floor as a path leading to each feather. Save some footprints to lead to the turkey bag after the last feather.

Lead the class around the room, following the footprints to each feather. As you come to a feather, ask the review question on the feather. When it is answered correctly, follow the footprints to the next feather. After all the review questions are answered, follow the last footprints to the turkey bag and share the candy inside.



Print and cut out enough footprints for the path according to your classroom space.


1. What are some ways we can give thanks to God? Singing praise, praying, telling others what he's done.

### Thank You Candle

### **Materials**

Maple leaf tags (following page)
Wide-mouth canning jars (pint)
Variety of popcorn kernels, dried beans, lentils, peas, etc
Spoons or small scoops
Bowls
Votive or tea light candles or LEDs
Glue
Ribbon or raffia in fall colors
Crayons



#### **Instructions**

Print on card stock and cut out one maple leaf tag for each student. Pour each kind of dried beans, etc. into separate bowls for students to share. Have students color their leaf tag and set aside.

Pass out one canning jar to each student. Have the students scoop one color at a time of the dried beans, etc. into their jar, layering the different colors. Fill the jars about ¾ full. Place the candle into the center of the beans, gently pushing it down so it is stable.

Tie a length of ribbon or raffia around the jar near the top. Use a dot of glue to hold it in place. Glue the leaf tag to the center of the ribbon or directly onto the jar.

### **Suggested Discussion**

**?** Who can tell me what the tag on your candle says? Thank you, God!

You can take this candle home and ask your mom and dad to light it on Thanksgiving Day. Remember to thank God for all the things he has done for you and given to you and your family.
