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Title: Making It to Shore: Faith for a New Year

Sermon Summary: This powerful message centers on Acts 27, where Paul and his shipmates face a violent storm that threatens their lives. The central revelation is profound: God doesn't just rescue us from storms—He uses storms to reveal what we're holding onto that's weighing us down. This sermon illustrates how believers can navigate through life's storms and arrive safely at God's promised destination in the new year.

The message emphasizes that survival and arrival require three essential spiritual actions: release before rescue, sacrifice before survival, and obedience before arrival. Pastor Canady teaches that storms don't cancel God's plan but reveal His process. God is more concerned with who we are becoming than what we are carrying from our past. True faith is not about rushing but about responding wisely to God's instructions.

The crew had to throw their cargo overboard, then their equipment, and eventually lose the ship itself—yet every single person made it safely to shore. This teaches us that what we refuse to let go of determines whether we'll reach our destination. As we step into 2026, we're challenged to examine what we're still clutching from 2025 that God has told us to release. The storm didn't create their problem; it revealed what was weighing them down.

Some of us are carrying relationships, mindsets, fears, and habits that worked in past seasons but are now too heavy for where God is taking us. The promise is certain: we will make it to shore. But we must release the weight, sacrifice what's familiar, and obey God's instructions even when

the path looks risky. Faith for a new year isn't about how fast we move, but how faithfully we follow. The message concludes with the assurance that even when our ship breaks apart and we're clinging to broken pieces, God promises we will make it to shore if we trust and obey Him.

Chapters

Chapter 1: Release Before Rescue

We must learn to release the weight and burdens we carry before God can rescue us, as demonstrated by the crew throwing cargo overboard during the storm.

Chapter 2: Sacrifice Before Survival

True survival requires sacrificing what is familiar and comfortable, even the ship itself, to prioritize life over possessions and security.

Chapter 3: Obedience Before Arrival

Reaching our destination requires obedience to God's instructions, even when they seem risky or counterintuitive, as not every open door is God's direction.

Chapter 4: God's Presence in the Storm

Despite broken pieces and uncertainty, God promises we will make it to the other shore because He is with us in every storm we face.

Key Points:

- Release Before Rescue: God requires us to let go of dead weight before He brings deliverance; what we refuse to carry determines how we make it to shore
- Storms expose what we trust too much and reveal our real priorities; release creates space for clarity, obedience, and direction
- Sacrifice Before Survival: God is more committed to who we are becoming than what we are carrying; He will choose our life over our luggage
- Survival in God is intentional, not accidental; sacrifice creates room for God to show up and work in our lives
- Obedience Before Arrival: God's promises do not cancel His

instructions; promises don't remove responsibility but invite us to walk carefully

- Not every open door is God's direction; some doors are distractions, not directions
- Faith for a new year is not found in how fast we move but how faithfully we follow God's voice
- God walks with us to the shore; He doesn't rush us there but guides us through the process
- A new calendar does not automatically produce a new life; without release, we risk repeating the same storms with new dates

Scripture Reference:

- Acts 27:44 (Primary text): "The rest were to get there on planks or on other pieces of the ship. In this way, everyone reached land safely."
- Acts 27:18-19 (Release): The crew threw cargo and ship's tackle overboard during the storm

- John 16:33: "In this world you will have tribulation. But be of good cheer because I have overcome the world."

Stories:

- The pastor's 99-year-old Uncle Walter who will turn 100 on February 21st, repeatedly saying "I am that I am" and testifying that despite everything, he's still here
- Paul Ketter, one of the Ketter twins, who lost his voice box to throat cancer between July and September but remains encouraged because God is still with him
- The pastor's experience seeking God's will about the property where the school now stands, walking around the old Sears

building over 500 times, and receiving confirmation through the song "When Jesus Says Yes, Nobody Can Say No"

- The biblical account of the paralyzed man at the pool of Bethesda who waited 38 years but was healed by Jesus without ever getting in the water
- Reference to the church's history being founded just years after slavery, with ancestors who sacrificed and rebuilt after the church was burned down
- Illustration of rocket engines falling off as the rocket ascends higher, symbolizing how some people and things must fall away as we progress in our spiritual journey
- The meteorologist predictions about the snowstorm on December 31st, illustrating that storms don't catch God by surprise even when they catch us off guard

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5-Day Devotional: Making It to Shore - Faith for a New Year

Day 1: Release Before Rescue

Reading: Acts 27:18-19

Devotional: The sailors threw cargo overboard not because it was worthless, but because it was too heavy for their season. As we begin this new year, God invites us to release what weighs us down—unforgiveness, fear, outdated methods, even good things that no longer fit our calling. Release isn't punishment; it's protection. What worked last season may sink you in this one. The rescue was already promised, but the release was still required. God doesn't ask us to let go to harm us, but to save us. Before you can receive what God has next, you must open your hands and release what you're clutching from yesterday.

Reflection: What is God asking you to release as you enter this new year? What weight are you carrying that belongs in the past?

Day 2: Sacrifice Before Survival

Reading: Acts 27:21-22, 38

Devotional: After releasing the cargo, the crew faced another decision: sacrifice the ship's equipment and eventually the ship itself. God was more committed to saving the people than preserving their possessions. Sacrifice means choosing life over familiarity, choosing God's future over

our comfort. What once carried you may now be too heavy to keep you alive. God honors what we're willing to surrender. He doesn't just want our leftovers; He wants our trust demonstrated through intentional sacrifice. When we give up what we think we need, we create space for God to show up powerfully. Your survival matters more to God than your stuff.

Reflection: What comfort, control, or convenience is God asking you to sacrifice for His greater purpose in your life?

Day 3: Obedience Before Arrival

Reading: Acts 27:30-32, 42-44

Devotional: God promised that everyone would survive, yet obedience was still required. When sailors tried escaping in a lifeboat—a seemingly logical choice—Paul warned they must stay with the ship. Not every open door is God's direction; some are distractions. The promise doesn't cancel the process. God's Word over your life invites you to walk carefully, following His instructions even when they seem risky. Some swam to shore, others clung to broken planks, but all arrived safely because they obeyed. Obedience positions us to receive what God has already prepared. Faith isn't about rushing to the destination; it's about faithfully following God's voice along the way.

Reflection: Where is God asking you to obey even when His instruction doesn't make complete sense to your natural mind?

Day 4: God's Presence in the Storm

Reading: Acts 27:23-25; Exodus 3:14

Devotional: In the darkest moment, an angel appeared to Paul with a message: "Do not be afraid." God's presence doesn't always calm the storm immediately, but His presence in the storm changes everything. The "I AM" who spoke to Moses is the same God with you today. He isn't surprised by your circumstances; He's the meteorologist who knew the

storm was coming. God doesn't change because of our storms—He remains constant, faithful, and present. When everything around you is breaking apart, anchor yourself to the unchanging character of God. He holds you with a grip that never weakens, never tires, never fails. Your storm didn't catch Him off guard.

Reflection: How can you recognize and rest in God's presence during your current challenges rather than focusing only on the storm?

Day 5: Faith for the Journey Ahead

Reading: Hebrews 11:1; 2 Timothy 1:7

Devotional: Faith for a new year requires lighter hands, surrendered hearts, and obedient steps. God has not given us a spirit of fear but of power, love, and a sound mind. As you move forward, remember: release creates space, sacrifice demonstrates trust, and obedience positions you for arrival. You may be traveling on broken pieces, but with God, you will reach the shore. Don't carry into 2026 what God told you to leave in 2025. Trust that the "I AM" is with you. Your rescue is already guaranteed; walk faithfully through the process. God is more committed to who you're becoming than to what you're leaving behind.

Reflection: What specific step of faith is God calling you to take this week to move forward into His promises for your life?

Closing Prayer: Lord, as I journey through this new year, give me wisdom to release what holds me back, courage to sacrifice what no longer serves Your purpose, and obedience to follow Your voice above all others. Help me trust that You are with me in every storm, and that You will bring me safely to shore. In Jesus' name, Amen.

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Small Group Guide: Making it to Shore - Faith for a New Year

Opening Prayer

Begin with prayer, asking God to open hearts and minds to receive His Word and direction for 2026.

Icebreaker Question

Share one thing you're grateful survived from 2025 and one thing you're ready to release as you enter 2026.

Key Scripture

Acts 27:44 - "The rest were to get there on planks or on other pieces of the ship. In this way, everyone reached land safely."

Main Points from the Sermon
