What are the implications of Satan being 'not strong enough' to overcome God's power for our personal faith?

How can we balance being prepared for spiritual battles without becoming paranoid or overly fearful?

In what ways might our modern interpretations of biblical stories, like Job or the Garden of Eden, limit our understanding of God's message?
