did when he continued his mission despite warnings of prison and hardships?

In what ways might we be idolizing human leaders or figures in Christianity, and how can we ensure our focus remains on Christ?

How can we develop the discipline to not only hear the Word of God but to actively study and apply it in our daily lives?

What does it mean to be 'sanctified' beyond initial salvation, and how does this relate to our ongoing spiritual growth?

How can we maintain a balance between respecting church leadership and being discerning about the teachings we receive, as Paul warned that even from within the church distortions could arise?

In what ways can we be more intentional about sharing our faith and the 'whole will of God' with others, even when it might be uncomfortable or unpopular?
