Our educational program concluded with Advent presentations by Pastor Trey.

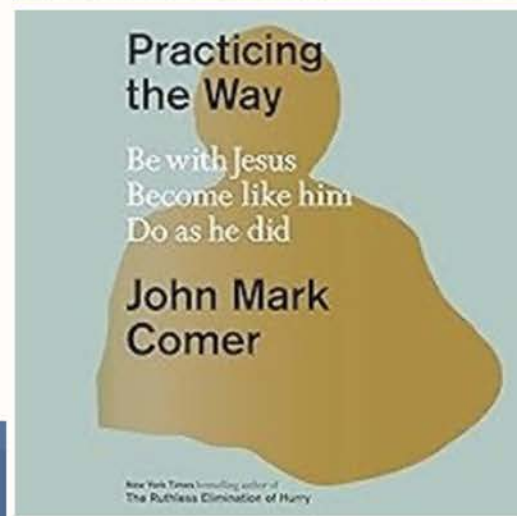
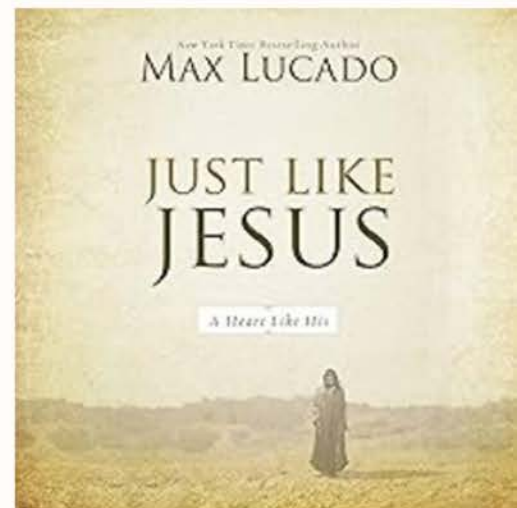
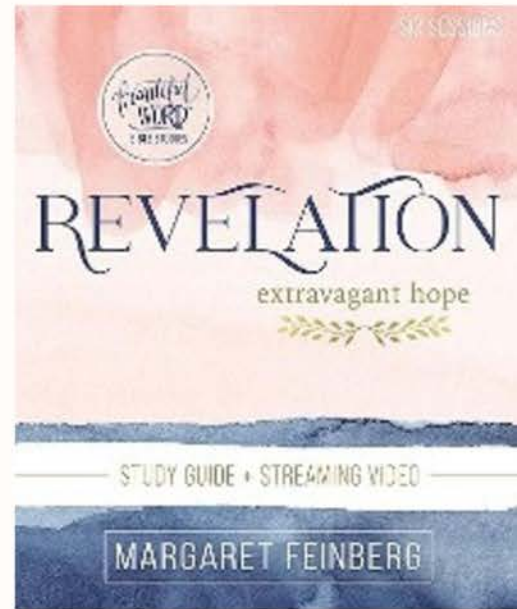
We had a formal survey earlier in the year, and another informal survey during the Fall Kickoff. Unfortunately, we received few responses.

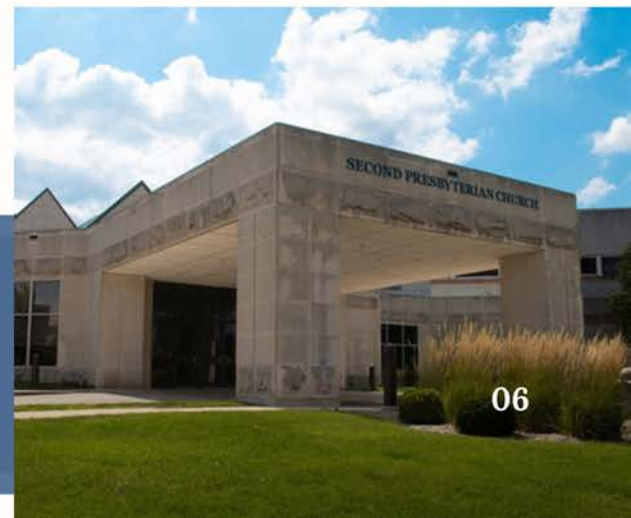

CHILDREN, YOUTH & FAMILIES



WEDNESDAY NIGHT PROGRAMMING

Our Wednesday night programming continues to grow, with an average attendance of 20-25 students in grades PreK-8 with the junior high program doubling in size. The program focuses on discipleship, relationship-building, and establishing a strong Biblical foundation, all within a loving and safe environment for the kids.

The evening begins at 6:00 p.m. with a family-style dinner, followed by Bible study, memory verses, and related activities. Gerald works hard to enhance the dinner menu to include more fruits and vegetables, while Cheryl prepares a vegetable appetizer each week for the kids to try. Initially this met with some resistance, now students enjoy the variety and eagerly anticipate these new options.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS & EVENTS

This year featured several special programs:

- Spring: The kids visited Westminster for tea and cookies and shared a hand painted flower decoration with the residents.
- Mission: The children learned about Little Children of the Philippines and have sponsored two children through this ministry.
- June: Nearly 65 kids participated in Vacation Bible School (VBS), with the theme "True North". The church was transformed into a Northern woodland where children experienced "Trusting Jesus in a Wild World" activities, and themed snacks. Over 40 volunteers contributed to the event's success.
- Summer Fellowship: YOUth Min, Trey & Jamie enjoyed an outing to Grady's for a meal and games.



COMMUNITY OUTREACH

- Trunk-or-Treat: In October, several volunteers represented the church at the "Rainforest Themed" table for a successful Trunk-or-Treat event on the Square in Downtown Bloomington handing out candy to 1500-2000 kids. We were able to talk to the families about the ministries at 2PC..
- Gingerbread Build: December's Annual Gingerbread Build drew 26 families. While most participants were already connected to the church through membership, preschool, or robotics, many had no prior affiliation joined simply for fun.



DECEMBER 7 SERVICE & BRUNCH

The sanctuary was filled with joy on December 7th as youth sang carols, read scripture, and led the worship service. It was a celebration of faith and community.



SUNDAY SCHOOL & CONFIRMATION

Sunday School averages about 6 students. The kids begin in the sanctuary with Jamie for a scripture reading and lesson before transitioning to the KidsMin space for their class. They rejoin the congregation for baptisms, communion, or special events, allowing parents uninterrupted worship time.

MEAL PREP

Meal prep and fellowship ministry is going well with an average of 9 families attending monthly. Parents select a time and choose from various meals to prepare. The church staff handles menu planning and grocery shopping, and families leave with freezer-ready meals. Dinner and childcare are provided during the evening, making it a fun and supportive event.



ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Family ministry is working alongside Worship & Music to begin an incorporation of the whole church body into our weekly worship. Although we don't fully have a plan in place we are looking forward to having children of all ages showing up and participating wherever volunteers are needed. Think greeting, choir, ushers, communion, lay readers and Sunday brunch. We are excited for the growth we have seen and look forward to what a more integrated church body will bring in 2026.

None of these activities would be possible without our dedicated Family Ministry Committee members and volunteers. Their investment in our students—both within the church and in the community—is evident through their willingness to attend sporting events and other activities.

In 2025, Deacon meetings were held in March, July, September, and December on the second Tuesday of the month at 4:00 pm.

American Red Cross Blood Drives were held February 20, May 15, August 28, and October 23. All were very successful.

JOY Fellowship heard the story of McLean County Barns by Bill Kemp, Honey & Beeswax, Maria Millen's trip to Egypt, and Dr. Mike Lockett's children's books. Road trips included Lincoln sites in Springfield and the Barn III in Goodfield. Prayer Lunch continues to meet weekly for Fellowship and enjoy Gerald's lunches on Thursday mornings.

Communion is served quarterly to Westminster Village Residents. Hospital visits are provided on weekends. Easter lilies were delivered in March, and Poinsettias were delivered in December. Sunday altar flowers and prayer quilts were delivered throughout the year. And, we visit the homebound regularly.

Caring Card Committee has been sending cards/notes to those on the daily prayer list, as well as other members that we hear about that need to know they are being remembered with prayers. Birthday cards are sent to those living in area retirement facilities and to members that are shut in, letting them know we are thinking of them.



Brunches were sponsored for 50th Anniversary/Widows & Widowers in May, and Veterans in November. A lunch was provided for Fox Creek Teachers in October.

Group Sale continues to be our most visible activity, providing \$29,000 in support of Mission Projects.

The mission of **Easy Stitches** is to share God's love by providing handmade stitchery items to local and global community members in need, as well as to the nonprofit organizations that serve them. In 2025, this dedicated circle of women crafted and

donated 803 items, partnering with Bright Point, Carle BroMenn Prenatal Unit, Hammitt School, Home Sweet Home Ministries, Lifelong Friends, Pads Project, Second Presbyterian Church, and the Salvation Army.

Since its founding in May 2022, Easy Stitches has blessed others with an astounding 3,361 handmade gifts. Each piece represents not only skill and creativity but also compassion and prayer woven into every stitch. God continues to multiply the impact of this ministry, turning simple threads into lasting blessings for countless lives.

STEWARDSHIP UPDATE

Stewardship Sunday was Sunday, September 7th. As of January 16th, the church has collected 137 stewardship cards totaling \$877,494. For your consideration and prayer, the session has approved the 2026 budget. The budgeted pledged giving for 2026 is \$834,110 and was \$862,791 for 2025.

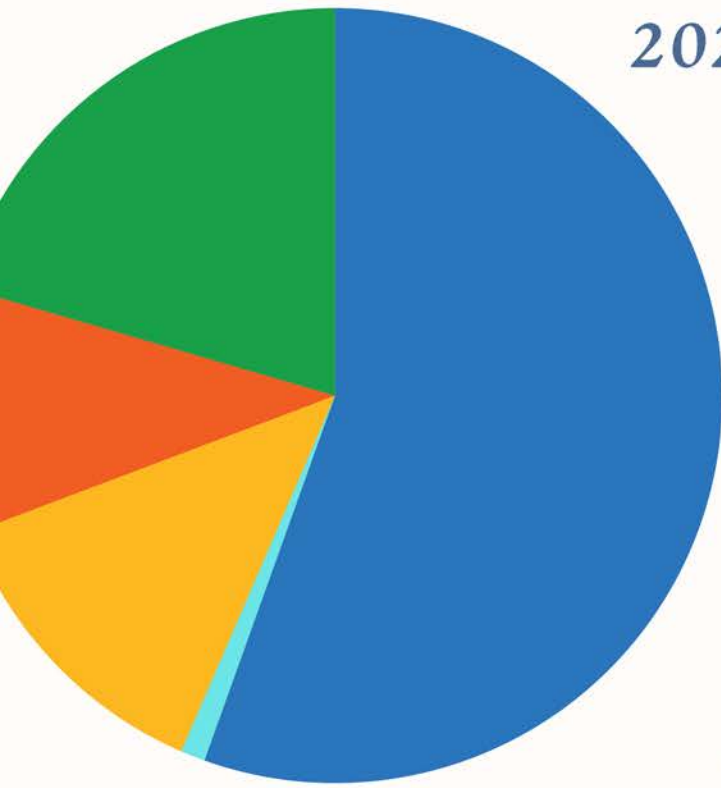

FINANCIAL UPDATE

Contributions are positive compared to the annual budget by \$43,089. During 2025, the church received a very generous one-time estate distribution of \$19,989. Other Receipts (income) are more than projected by \$67,403. Additionally, during 2025, \$200,000 of the budgeted \$250,000 "Foundation Support" was needed to finance church operations. Actual expenses are \$86,212 greater than the annual budgeted amount. In summary; income for 2025 is \$1,549,425, or \$80,481 greater than the budget amount. Expenses were also greater than the budget amount by \$86,212. This provides a net loss of \$56,945 for 2025.

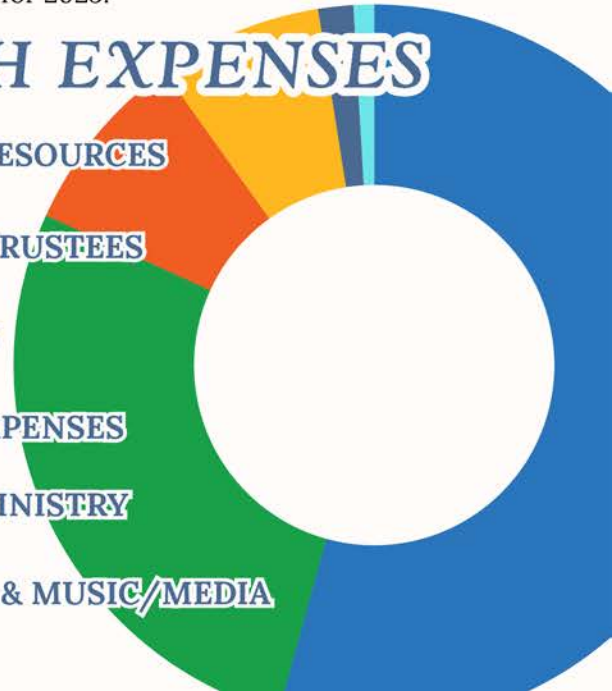

FOUNDATION

The Board met quarterly during the year. The Foundation budget included \$250,000 to support church operations as needed for 2025. At year end \$200,000 had been used. The budget annually also provided \$30,000 for Western Avenue and \$41,000 for maintenance of the church campus buildings, as well as other smaller line items for support of church staff and ministries. The Foundation in 2025 supported tuition for one seminary student. Capital projects supported by the Foundation in 2025 include the new sanctuary sound system (with a restricted gift), Martin Hall roof and bathroom architectural design, Martin Hall exterior doors, and exterior repairs to the sanctuary walls.

In December 2024 the Board approved a budget for 2025 with disbursements of \$423,622 (Benevolence Grants \$79,792, Project Grants \$65,330, and Administrative Expense \$278,500, including \$250,000 in anticipated Operating Support for the church, to be drawn down as needed). The budget for 2026 was approved December 17, 2025 and included income and expense of \$360,750.

On October 31, 2025 the assets of the Foundation, totaled approximately \$4,612,045. The investment gains through October were \$672,922. Investment performance in the last three years has been very strong and supported some major needs of the church without significant incursion into principal.

The Foundation is subject to an independent audit every year.

For the Foundation to continue to support Second Presbyterian Church through Benevolence and Project Grants, and Operating Support necessary in this period of rebuilding our campus and our congregation, it needs the support of the congregation. GLOBAL MISSIONS

Global Missions has had another very impactful year aiding our mission partners.

Little Children of the Philippines new CEO Brittany Foster and LCP representative Cerila Patrimonio visited Second Presbyterian Church in October. They gave the Children's Message and Minute for Mission. They also spoke at our Adult Christian Education class. In the afternoon, they both spoke at a Donor and Sponsor Appreciation Luncheon. Their visit resulted in at least six additional sponsorships of children and over \$10,000 in donations. As of December 2025, LCP has a total of 988 sponsored children. Additionally, over 50 sponsored children graduated from the LCP program this year.



Shannon and Katie Bachelor, with **Common Ground Ministries**, are continuing their mission in the Middle East, visiting the Middle East and keeping in contact with the people and partners there.



Tofiq Mammadov, who lives in Normal, joined **International Students Ministry (ISI)**. He has engaged with students and participation levels have increased. Global Missions terminated our relationship with Team Expansion (which initially helped with ISI after John and Linda Berger's retirement) early in 2025 because their mission was no longer aligned with Global Missions.

Hebron USA/Chiapas - After eighteen years (since 2007), our church family has enjoyed a rich relationship through Hebron USA with Pastor Pablo and Jan Feliciano Cruz, our mission partners in Chiapas, Mexico. We have sponsored medical mission travelers, many construction teams, vacation bible school and Christian education training - all to serve the indigenous Tzeltal people in this ancient Mayan region. The Los Manos de Cristo medical clinic, begun in 2006, and completed in 2012, stands as a lasting tribute to Pablo and his visionary leadership to meet the spiritual and physical needs of his people. Pablo died two years ago, and the Hebron Tzeltal leadership has been diligently working to maintain the clinic operation, construction projects in the villages, as well as spiritual leadership through the Tzeltal synod. Hebron USA has decided that the time has come to end joint participation in this ministry, and turn over all future decisions and financial support to the local leadership. We celebrate the positive impact of our work, the relationships that we formed, and the opportunities to collaborate with our brothers and sisters in Chiapas to share Christ's love.

Evangelical Theological Seminary/Cairo - We are continuing to support seminary students there. Graduates of this institution become pastors in the Middle East.

Frontier Fellowship - George and Pamela Pendergrass are the new leaders of this ministry. This ministry encourages churches and other organizations to become mission partners to connect with unreached people all over the world and to introduce these people to God's word in their native language.

ISU Heritage Internship: Intern George Palmer processed the Ordained and Lay Leadership materials and organized the entire Music Collection. The collection includes cassette and VHS tapes, an LP record, 13 boxes of sorted documents, binders of Choir Sunday and Choir Tour photos, file cabinets of Choir Tour planning materials, as well as the framed photos in the Choir Sunday Gallery. He shelved all items, leaving the worktables clear.

In January, the committee met for a day-long webinar entitled "The Art of Hospitality" presented by ShareChurch. The four video sessions provided new ideas on how to provide a welcoming church, follow up with our visitors and engage new members into the life of the church. This webinar created a great deal of excitement and enthusiasm that resulted in several new initiatives.

Second Pres now provides umbrellas at both doors, emergency feminine hygiene products in the women's restrooms, improved elevator signage and coffee in the south entrance before the service. Our greeters are wearing blue "greeter" ribbons and return to their posts at end of service to provide a heartfelt goodbye to our members.

We have increased our exterior signage in many ways – a 14' tall welcome banner flag that is set on the south side of the church and two-sided sandwich signs that give a warm welcome on one side and an appreciation of attendance on the other. The best new sign was the electronic message board at the corner of East and Jefferson streets. A big thank you to all who donated, directed memorial donations or approved Group Sale proceeds to help fund the cost of the sign. Displaying the life of our church to the passersby on US Highway 51 has been a longtime goal of this committee!



On Sunday, June 8, the committee planned our "Sun-day Social" with ice cream "sun-daes" and hot dogs. Since it was Pentecost Sunday, we decorated the Fellowship Hall with red and white balloons and circus decorations. Games for the kiddos and a cake walk provided entertainment while people could learn to make balloon animals and juggle scarves.

The "Hearts in Action" Ministry Showcase was held on September 7 to present and promote the many ways that our church members can be involved with Second Pres. Many volunteers were engaged in this program year kickoff.

On November 2, "Prepared Hearts: Hospitality and Safety Go Hand in Hand" was presented after the church service. Sandy McGhee spoke on principles of hospitality. Our security guard Mark Paul addressed security issues. Dr. Jim Swanson talked about the different medical emergencies that have occurred. Barbara Meek described steps that should be taken during a fire or other life safety concerns and Tammy Haggard presented precautions that should be taken during weather events. A pew card that addresses all of these topics was distributed and will be in place soon.

Please pray for our ministry as we discern the will of God for future elders, deacons and members for Trustees, Foundation, Human Resources, Finance and Stewardship, Deacons and Leadership Development and Nominating standing ministries.

We have and will continue to look for opportunities to fulfill parts of the 2PC Promise as noted below and celebrate these signs of God’s Promise to us.

In 2025, LDN:

LOCAL MISSIONS

Joycare/Jobs Partnership: Jason Jennings represents this program, which helps individuals transition from incarceration to employment. Michelle Cook (“Mamma”) coordinates, supporting participants in finding jobs that build self-sufficiency. Recently, Jobs Partnership partnered with Aetna Insurance to emphasize preventive health care. A HIGI machine in our building now monitors clients’ basic health indicators onsite, alerting them when medical attention is needed and enabling early intervention.

Western Avenue: Orman Jones represents WACC and leads the organization’s senior programs. WACC is currently in an exciting period of transition, welcoming a new director and adding talented staff to its team. As these changes take shape, the organization looks forward to continued collaboration and fresh, innovative approaches to serving the community.

Salvation Army: Trudy Strand provides regular updates. Bloomington has authorized the nighttime warming center, which requires extra staffing and supplies, creating a need for more funding. Their only source of income is the Red Kettle Campaign and donations. No national funds are received. All money stays in the community for local support.

Home Sweet Home Ministries: Steve White represents us, and several members regularly volunteer by serving meals or working at The Junction. Each year, Second Pres decorates HSHM for Christmas. The Bridge, a new development of 48 secure cabins with on-site restroom and laundry facilities, will offer mental health services and transitional housing for three to six months before residents move to permanent homes. It is expected to be completed by late 2025.

OUR SECOND PRES OUTREACH MINISTRIES SHARING THE HEART OF CHRIST IN THE HEART OF OUR COMMUNITY

Little Free Food Pantry: Julie Cross manages the Little Free Pantry, which benefits from the generous contributions of Second Pres members and building partners. The pantry also receives consistent food donations from community members. It has been frequently recognized for its cleanliness, thanks to the dedicated efforts of weekly volunteers. Each week, Julie Cross prepares a daily crate containing a selection of items for volunteers to distribute according to their assigned schedule.



Reverse Advent: Jan Harrell oversees the Reverse Advent initiative, which invites people to donate items instead of receiving daily gifts. A calendar listing needed donations is shared with both members and non-members. Each day features a specific item for contribution. This initiative makes a lasting difference by stocking the Little Free Food Pantry for several months as well as cold weather gear and hygiene products. The event is essential to assisting local community members who are experiencing poverty.



Sunday Brunch: Our team has provided consistent support to the downtown community over the past five years. Numerous achievements have been realized. Sunday Brunch has cultivated an inclusive environment where attendees feel welcome and respected, as reflected by feedback indicating its positive impact on their lives. Attendance generally ranges from 60 to 80 individuals each week. Participants regularly express appreciation for both the meal and the opportunity to connect with others sharing similar experiences. This year we added a security role on Sunday mornings, staffed by trained Behavior Detection Specialists who offer basic medical assistance, oversee parking areas, manage challenging situations, and check any discarded belongings.

Clothing Pantry: Jan Harell and Jane Sumrall are managing the clothing pantry. Pantry hours were adjusted to Wednesdays from 1:00 to 2:30 PM. Although the potential impacts of such changes are not always predictable, the adjustment has resulted in an increase in guests. Community members may access the pantry twice annually: once for cold weather clothing and once for warm weather clothing.

ROBOTICS



This year the robotics program has hit its stride with 80 students across 7 teams, and over 20 adult volunteers. We have 18 students waiting to join the program should another spot open on the team.

This year our focus has shifted from numerical growth to technical excellence, organizational strength, and continued spiritual depth. Since we have nearly doubled in size every year for the last 3 years, we realized that this year we needed to cap enrollment to focus on strengthening our leadership structure and formalizing our policies. The net result is that communication is better, our volunteers are better equipped, and the program overall is running more smoothly than in years past.



BUILDING ENHANCEMENTS

Over the past year, we have continued to work to improve our space. We have:

1. Increased the robotics footprint to now fill the entire middle floor of Martin Hall instead of just the west half. This has enabled all 7 teams to have their own room for meetings.
2. Upgraded the old chalk boards in all 10 classrooms with new magnetic whiteboards.
3. Replaced 10 doorknobs with modern, lockable, ADA compliant hardware in the west half of the robotics floor (east half was completed last year).
4. Painted the 4 classrooms in the west half of Martin Hall.



WORLD CLASS PROGRAMMING

This year's theme is related to archaeology. For that reason, our four Lego League teams traveled to Cahokia Mounds and the City Museum in St. Louis in order to learn about how technology is used in archaeology. They had the opportunity to meet with 6 archaeologists from the State Archaeological Survey and received hands on experience using drones, laser scanners, LIDAR, and more. We also traveled to the Field Museum in Chicago. All our trips are free for students and their families.

This year, our students had the opportunity to speak with:

- Michael Finch, Robotics Engineer, JR Automation
- Dr. Jeritt Williams, Assistant Professor of Engineering, Illinois State University
- Dr. Erin Benson, Vice Chancellor Research Institutes, Illinois State Archaeological Survey
- Dr. Angela Cooper, Interpreter and Site Specialist, Cahokia Mounds

In addition to learning about varied topics driven by the year's robotics theme, Jamie Kaiser provides a Bible lesson to all our Lego League children every week.

GIVING BACK

The robotics team offered tech workshops in the month of August where members of the church could come by on Tuesdays and receive technical help with their cell phones, computers, and printers. The event was a success with approximately 10 people stopping by for assistance.

VOLUNTEERS

We are always looking for more volunteers, especially those who know how to use 3D printers, CAD, code in Java, project management or generally want to invest in the next generation of students.



SECOND HALF

Helping Hands Spring Clean up day was held on Saturday, May 3rd. We met at Denny's Donuts for coffee, donuts and fellowship before we headed out to our project sites. Sandy Groves sent us out with prayer. We helped Alene Gregory, Marlene Gregor, Rick and Holly Tindall, and Ardelle Deckert. We were about 20 people strong for this day.

We worked on a very good topic that would have strong interest in the congregation. Fraud affects us all every day. The local police departments put on seminars on these topics and we worked with the Bloomington Police Department to put on a presentation for our church.

We worked in conjunction with the ACE (Adult Christian Education) and Finance & Stewardship committees. The presentation occurred on Sunday, November 16th. Forty five people were in attendance. This would make it one of the largest audiences our presentations have had. Sgt. Kiel Nowers had an excellent presentation.

Our Helping Hands Fall Clean Up was held on Saturday, November 8th. We met for fellowship, donuts and coffee at Denny's Donuts. Sandy Groves dismissed us with prayer and we went out to our assignments. During this clean up we helped Alene Gregory, Marlene Gregor, Holly Tindall and Ardelle Deckert. MISSION & VISION

- **Mission Statement:** To glorify God through meaningful, Spirit-led worship and music that engages the congregation and honors the church's traditions and values.
- **Vision:** To cultivate a vibrant worship experience that blends creativity, reverence, and community participation.

ROLES & RESPONSIBILITIES

The committee work covers several categories of worship.

- Worship Planning
- Liturgical Calendar
- Communion

These categories are a cooperative effort with the Worship Planning group, whereby the Worship and Music committee provides support to Worship Planning; Worship preparation assistance with communion, and changes in the liturgical calendar, (advent, lent easter, ordinary time, etc.)

MUSIC MINISTRY & OPERATIONS

- **Hymn Selection:** Based on theme, scripture, and congregational familiarity.
- **Chapel Choir Intern Program**
- **Rehearsals:** Weekly schedule for choir, band, and soloists.
- **Copyright Compliance:** Licensing for music as required.
- **Music Library:** Maintain, organize digital, and physical archives.

The committee was involved with securing the Director of Music in August, taking responsibility for choir interns. and in November approved a motion to purchase a new shelving system to better maintain the music library. This project will carry over into 2026.

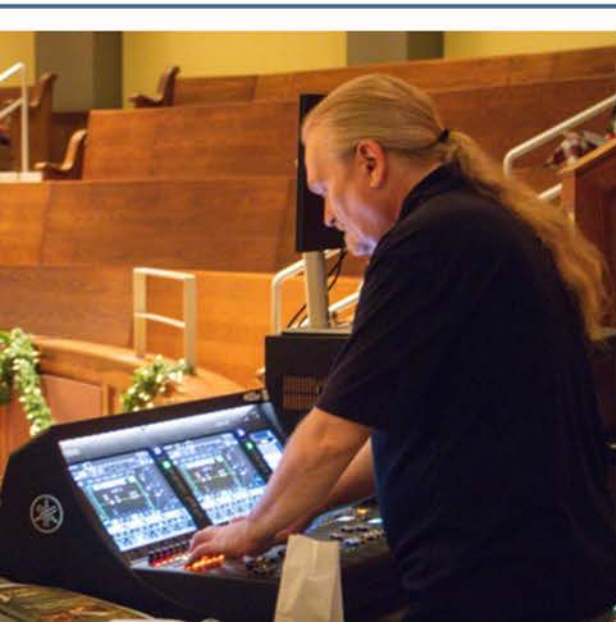
GRATITUDES

EQUIPMENT & TECHNOLOGY

- **Sound System:** Setup, maintenance, enhancements, plan for updates, and other duties as needed.
- **Instruments:** Inventory and care of pianos, organs, drums, etc.
- **Projection & Livestream:** Slide creation, camera setup, streaming platforms.

A new sound system became operational during the summer of 2025. The operating budget for Equipment & Technology is reviewed by the committee and sent to Session for approval for fiscal year 2026. Updating of livestream is a topic for committee discussion in 2026.



SPECIAL SERVICES & EVENTS

- **Seasonal Services:** Christmas Eve, Easter Sunrise, Good Friday, etc.
- **Concerts & Cantatas:** Planning, promotion, and execution.
- **Guest Musicians:** Guidelines for inviting and hosting.

Only two of the committee members continued on in June 2025; all others are new appointments. As a committee we reviewed the "Task and Responsibility" manual of operation on file (known as the MOO). The committee decided it should be updated, and reorganized. It is a work in progress. We also have spent considerable time discussing how to make worship "Deeper." A major movement is to encourage more involvement of youth in the worship service. Plans are in the development stage now and is the committee's goal for implementation early in 2026. Additional ideas include recruiting others to be liturgists and singing with the choir to name a few areas of worship that are open to changes or improvement. Everyone is invited to provide the committee with ideas, thoughts, and suggestions towards a deeper level of worship.
