#### Children's Message

#### First Reading: Jeremiah 2:4-13

Because Luke often presents Jesus as carrying on the ministry of the Old Testament prophets, our first readings during these weeks is from several of those figures. Today we continue reading through the book of Jeremiah, with one of his early proclamations of God's Word. Its tone is clear-eyed criticism of the injustice and idolatry of his audience and their forebears; he will go on to warn of the suffering that that behavior will bring.

<sup>4</sup> Hear the word of the LORD, O house of Jacob, and all the families of the house of Israel. <sup>5</sup> Thus says the LORD: What wrong did your ancestors find in me that they went far from me and went after worthless things and became worthless themselves? <sup>6</sup> They did not say, "Where is the LORD, who brought us up from the land of Egypt, who led us in the wilderness, in a land of deserts and pits, in a land of drought and deep darkness, in a land that no one passes through, where no one lives?" I brought you into a plentiful land to eat its fruits and its good things. But when you entered you defiled my land and made my heritage an abomination. <sup>8</sup> The priests did not say, "Where is the LORD?" Those who handle the law did not know me; the rulers transgressed against me; the prophets prophesied by Baal and went after things that do not profit. Therefore once more I accuse you, says the LORD, and I accuse your children's children. <sup>10</sup> Cross to the coasts of Cyprus and look; send to Kedar and examine with care; see if there has ever been such a thing. <sup>11</sup> Has a nation changed its gods, even though they are no gods? But my people have changed their glory for something that does not profit. <sup>12</sup> Be appalled, O heavens, at this; be shocked; be utterly desolate, says the LORD, <sup>13</sup> for my people have committed two evils: they have forsaken me, the fountain of living water, and dug out cisterns for themselves, cracked cisterns that can hold no water.

The Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

#### Psalm 81:1, 10-16 (Leader/Assembly: Spoken)

This psalm continues the theme and tone of Jeremiah's preaching, describing God's heartbreak at Israel's (and our own) unfaithfulness.

<sup>1</sup> Sing with joy to God our strength and raise a loud shout to the God of Jacob.

<sup>10</sup> "I am the LORD your God, who brought you out of the land of Egypt. Open your mouth wide, and I will fill it.

Yet my people did not hear my voice, and Israel would not obey me.

- <sup>12</sup> So I gave them over to the stubbornness of their hearts, to follow their own devices.
- <sup>13</sup> Oh, that my people would listen to me, that Israel would walk in my ways!

<sup>14</sup> I would quickly subdue their enemies and turn my hand against their foes.

- 15 Those who hate the LORD would cringe in fear, and their punishment would last forever.
- <sup>16</sup> But I would feed you with the finest wheat and satisfy you with honey from the rock."

#### Second Reading: Hebrews 13:1-8, 15-16


This week we conclude our reading through the book of Hebrews, which was written to a community beginning to tire of God's delay in fulfilling the promises of Christ's return and their vindication. As usual, the epistle ends with advice for how Christians should live in the extended "meantime" between the incarnation and the Last Day.

<sup>1</sup> Let mutual affection continue. <sup>2</sup> Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it. <sup>3</sup> Remember those who are in prison, as though you were in prison with them, those who are being tortured, as though you yourselves were being tortured. <sup>4</sup> Let marriage be held in honor by all, and let the marriage bed be kept undefiled, for God will judge the sexually immoral and adulterers. <sup>5</sup> Keep your lives free from the love of money, and be content with what you have, for he himself has said, "I will never leave you or forsake you." <sup>6</sup> So we can say with confidence, "The Lord is my helper; I will not be afraid. What can anyone do to me?" <sup>7</sup> Remember your leaders, those who spoke the word of God to you; consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith. <sup>8</sup> Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. <sup>15</sup> Through him, then, let us continually offer a sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of lips that confess his name. <sup>16</sup> Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God.

#### Gospel: Luke 14:1, 7-14

Through these weeks, we have been reading about Jesus' journey toward Jerusalem, where he will be crucified. Last week we heard Jesus' response to those who criticized him for healing on the sabbath. The verses omitted in today's reading tell of another, very similar, event; the story then continues with what happens afterwards at the Sabbath dinner.

The Holy Gospel according to Luke the 14th chapter. Glory to you, O Lord.

<sup>1</sup>On one occasion when Jesus was going to the house of a leader of the Pharisees to eat a meal on the Sabbath, they were watching him closely. When he noticed how the guests chose the places of honor, he told them a parable. 8 "When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not sit down at the place of honor, in case someone more distinguished than you has been invited by your host, <sup>9</sup> and the host who invited both of you may come and say to you, 'Give this person your place,' and then in disgrace you would start to take the lowest place. <sup>10</sup> But when you are invited, go and sit down at the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he may say to you, 'Friend, move up higher'; then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at the table with you. <sup>11</sup> For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted." <sup>12</sup> He said also to the one who had invited him, "When you give a luncheon or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers and sisters or your relatives or rich neighbors, in case they may invite you in return, and you would be repaid. 13 But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. <sup>14</sup> And you will be blessed because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."






#### **Offering Prayer**




Gathered into one by the Holy Spirit, let us pray as Jesus taught us.
