
Children's Message

First Reading: Lamentations 1:1-6

Because Luke often presents Jesus as carrying on the ministry of the Old Testament prophets, our first readings during these weeks are from several of those figures, now from Jeremiah. The Book of Lamentations expresses Jeremiah's grief over Jerusalem, sacked and conquered by the Babylonians.

How lonely sits the city that once was full of people! How like a widow she has become, she that was great among the nations! She that was a princess among the provinces has become subject to forced labor. She weeps bitterly in the night, with tears on her cheeks; among all her lovers, she has no one to comfort her; all her friends have dealt treacherously with her; they have become her enemies. Judah has gone into exile with suffering and hard servitude; she lives now among the nations; she finds no resting place; her pursuers have all overtaken her in the midst of her distress. The roads to Zion mourn, for no one comes to the festivals; all her gates are desolate; her priests groan; her young girls grieve, and her lot is bitter. Her foes have become the masters; her enemies prosper because the Lord has made her suffer for the multitude of her transgressions; her children have gone away, captives before the foe. From daughter Zion has departed all her majesty. Her princes have become like stags that find no pasture; they fled without strength before the pursuer.

Psalm: Lamentations 3:19-26 (Leader/Assembly: Saturday, spoken; Sunday, sung) This song, from later in the book, reflects Jeremiah's trust in God's steadfast love, even in the midst of the ruined city.

¹⁹ The thought of my affliction | and my homelessness is worm- wood and gall!

20 My soul continually thinks of it and is bowed down within me.

²¹ But this I | call to mind, and therefore | I have hope:

22 The steadfast love of the LORD | never ceases, God's mercies never come to an end;

²³ they are new | every morning;

great is your faithfulness.

24 "You are all that I have," says my soul,

"therefore I will hope in you, O Lord."

You are good to those who wait for you,

to all that | search for you.

26 It is good that one | should wait quietly for the salvation | of the LORD.

Second Reading: 2 Timothy 1:1-14


Today we continue reading through the letters addressed to Timothy. It seems that Timothy, appointed to be the leader of the community, was worried that he was too young and inexperienced for his office. The author urges him to be diligent and courageous in opposing false teachers.

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, for the sake of the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus, ² To Timothy, my beloved child: Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord. ³ I am grateful to God whom I worship with a clear conscience, as my ancestors did—when I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day. ⁴ Recalling your tears, I long to see vou so that I may be filled with joy. ⁵ I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, lives in you. ⁶ For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands, ⁷ for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline.


⁸ Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in suffering for the gospel, in the power of God, ⁹ who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works but according to his own purpose and grace, and this grace was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began, ¹⁰ but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Savior Jesus Christ, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. ¹¹ For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, ¹² and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day the deposit I have entrusted to him. ¹³ Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. ¹⁴ Guard the good deposit entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.

Gospel: Luke 17:5-10

Jesus has just commanded his disciples both to confront believers who sin, but also to forgive them. The disciples apparently make the request which opens today's reading because their faith is insufficient to allow them to confront or forgive.

The Holy Gospel according to Luke the 17th chapter. Glory to you, O Lord.

⁵ The apostles said to the Lord, "Increase our faith!" ⁶ The Lord replied, "If you had faith the size of a mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, 'Be uprooted and planted in the sea,' and it would obey you. ⁷ "Who among you would say to your slave who has just come in from plowing or tending sheep in the field, 'Come here at once and take your place at the table'? ⁸ Would you not rather say to him, 'Prepare supper for me; put on your apron and serve me while I eat and drink; later you may eat and drink'? ⁹ Do you thank the slave for doing what was commanded? ¹⁰ So you also, when you have done all that you were ordered to do, say, 'We are worthless slaves; we have done only what we ought to have done!""



Offering Prayer



Lord's Prayer


Gathered into one by the Holy Spirit, let us pray as Jesus taught us.
