Service of Holy Communion

(ELW Setting 1)

Jeremiah's promise of the execution of "justice and righteousness in the land" finds ironic fulfillment in the execution of Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews. It appears utterly contradictory that a king should be crucified with a criminal. This victory appears for all the world as humiliating defeat. Yet through the gate of death Jesus opens the door to paradise.

God speaks to us in scripture reading, preaching, and song.

Children's Message

First Reading: Jeremiah 23:1-6

Kings in the ancient Middle East were often referred to as the shepherds of their nation and their people. This is one of many passages in which God reaffirms the promise to David, that his descendants would continue as kings of the Jews forever, a promise which is echoed in seeming ridicule in today's Gospel.

Woe to the shepherds who destroy and scatter the sheep of my pasture! says the LORD. ² Therefore thus says the LORD, the God of Israel, concerning the shepherds who shepherd my people: It is you who have scattered my flock and have driven them away, and you have not attended to them. So I will attend to you for your evil doings, says the LORD. ³ Then I myself will gather the remnant of my flock out of all the lands where I have driven them, and I will bring them back to their fold, and they shall be fruitful and multiply. ⁴ I will raise up shepherds over them who will shepherd them, and they shall no longer fear or be dismayed, nor shall any be missing, says the LORD. ⁵ The days are surely coming, says the LORD, when I will raise up for David a righteous Branch, and he shall reign as king and deal wisely and shall execute justice and righteousness in the land. ⁶ In his days Judah will be saved, and Israel will live in safety. And this is the name by which he will be called: "The LORD is our righteousness."

Psalm: Luke 1:68-79 (Leader/Assembly: Saturday, spoken; Sunday, sung)

This is the song sung at the birth of John the Baptist by his father. John is to be the forerunner of the figure who is described in language which echoes that at the end of the first reading.

⁶⁸ Blessed are you, Lord, the God of Israel, you have come to your people and set them free.

You have raised up for us a mighty Savior, born of the house of your servant David.

- Through your holy prophets, you promised of old to save us | from our enemies, from the hands of | all who hate us,
- ⁷² to show mercy | to our forebears, and to remember your | holy covenant.
- 73 This was the oath you swore to our | father Abraham:

74 to set us free from the hands of our enemies,

free to worship you without fear,

⁷⁵ holy and righteous before you, all the days of our life.

And you, child, shall be called the prophet of the Most High, for you will go before the Lord to pre- pare the way,

to give God's people knowledge of salvation by the forgiveness of their sins.

78 In the tender compassion of our God

the dawn from on high shall | break upon us,

79 to shine on those who dwell in darkness and in the shad- ow of death, and to guide our feet into the way of peace.

Second Reading: Colossians 1:11-20

This paean to the cosmic power of Christ sets him above all earthly rulers.

May you be made strong with all the strength that comes from his glorious power, so that you may have all endurance and patience, joyfully ¹² giving thanks to the Father, who has enabled you to share in the inheritance of the saints in the light. ¹³ He has rescued us from the power of darkness and transferred us into the kingdom of his beloved Son, ¹⁴ in whom we have redemption, the forgiveness of sins.

¹⁵ He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation, ¹⁶ for in him all things in heaven and on earth were created, things visible and invisible, whether thrones or dominions or rulers or powers—all things have been created through him and for him. ¹⁷ He himself is before all things, and in him all things hold together. ¹⁸ He is the head of the body, the church; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in everything. ¹⁹ For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, ²⁰ and through him God was pleased to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, by making peace through the blood of his cross.

Gospel Acclamation (please stand to welcome the Gospel or remain seated as you are comfortable)



Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of e-ter-nal life.



Gospel: Luke 23:33-43

Crucifixion was kept by the Romans for the offenders who, for some reason, needed to be most obviously dishonored. And because hanging on a tree was a sign of being cursed by God (Deuteronomy 21:22–23) it was scandalous to the Jews as well. And yet on the cross, Jesus shows the sort of king he is.

The Holy Gospel according to Luke the 23rd chapter. Glory to you, O Lord.

When they came to the place that is called The Skull, they crucified Jesus there with the criminals, one on his right and one on his left. ³⁴ [[Then Jesus said, "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing."]] And they cast lots to divide his clothing. ³⁵ And the people stood by watching, but the leaders scoffed at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is the Messiah of God, his chosen one!" ³⁶ The soldiers also mocked him, coming up and offering him sour wine ³⁷ and saying, "If you are the King of the Jews, save yourself!" ³⁸ There was also an inscription over him, "This is the King of the Jews." ³⁹ One of the criminals who were hanged there kept deriding him and saying, "Are you not the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" ⁴⁰ But the other rebuked him, saying, "Do you not fear God, since you are under the same sentence of condemnation? ⁴¹ And we indeed have been condemned justly, for we are getting what we deserve for our deeds, but this man has done nothing wrong." ⁴² Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come in your kingdom." ⁴³ He replied, "Truly I tell you, today you will be with me in paradise."

Nicene Creed



Offering Prayer



To you, O God, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory in your holy church, now and forever.



Lord's Prayer


Gathered into one by the Holy Spirit, let us pray as Jesus taught us.
