

Children's Message

First Reading: Acts 2:1-21

For first century Jews, Pentecost (Shavuot) was, like Passover, one of the three annual festivals for which everyone who could went to Jerusalem. Given the rhythms of agricultural life, it was the one most possible for most people to take part in. Just as Passover commemorated the escape from Egypt, Shavuot commemorated the giving of the law on Sinai (50 days later). Wind and flame accompanied the presence of God on that mountain.

¹ When the day of Pentecost had come, [the apostles] were all together in one place.² And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. ³ Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. ⁴ All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. ⁵ Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. ⁶ And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? ⁸ And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? ⁹ Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, ¹⁰ Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, ¹¹ Cretans and Arabs—in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." ¹² All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" ¹³ But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine." ¹⁴ But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. ¹⁵ Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. ¹⁶ No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel: ¹⁷ 'In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams.¹⁸ Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy.

¹⁹ And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist. ²⁰ The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day. ²¹ Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.'"

The Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Psalm 104:24-34, 35b (Leader/Assembly: Saturday spoken; Sunday, sung) These verses, whose vision of the universality of God's message is appropriate for Pentecost, also include the line which inspires the Nicene Creed's declaration that the Spirit is not only Lord, but Life-Giver. "Leviathan" is a sea monster, probably inspired by reports from the Nile of the hippopotamus.

In wisdom you have made them all; the earth is full [|] of your creatures.

- ²⁵ Yonder is the sea, great and wide, with its swarms too man-¹y to number, living things both ¹ small and great.
- ²⁶ There go the ships ¹ to and fro, and Leviathan, which you made for the | sport of it. ²⁷ All of them ¹ look to you to give them their food ¹ in due season. ²⁸ You give it to them; they | gather it; you open your hand, and they are filled with good things. When you hide your face, ¹ they are terrified; when you take away their breath, they die and return | to their dust. ³⁰ You send forth your Spirit, and they ¹ are created; and so you renew the face of the earth. ³¹ May the glory of the LORD en-¹ dure forever; O LORD, rejoice in all your works. ³² You look at the earth | and it trembles; you touch the mountains [|] and they smoke. ³³ I will sing to the LORD as long [|] as I live; I will praise my God while I^{\dagger} have my being. ³⁴ May these words of ¹ mine please God. I will rejoice in the LORD. ^{35b} Bless the LORD, ¹O my soul. Hal-[|]lelujah!


Second Reading: Romans 8:14-17

The work of the Spirit is important to Paul, who declares over and over in his correspondence that the Spirit gives different gifts (including that of tongues, to some) to each Christian, for the sake of the whole community. This passage completes Paul's argument that trusting in the law brings condemnation and slavery, while trusting in the Spirit brings freedom."

¹⁴ For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. ¹⁵ For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. When we cry, "Abba! Father!" ¹⁶ it is that very Spirit bearing witness with our spirit that we are children of God, ¹⁷ and if children, then heirs, heirs of God and joint heirs with Christ—if, in fact, we suffer with him so that we may also be glorified with him.

Gospel Acclamation (please stand to welcome the Gospel or remain seated as you are comfortable)



Gospel: John 14:8-17; 25-27

As part of his final address to his followers, Jesus promises a "Paraclete." This marks the Holy Spirit as an "advocate," a defense attorney, but one who is also a trustworthy witness, and a companion (the word literally means, "one called to stand beside"). It is remarkable that John says that on the cross Jesus "gave up his spirit" (John 19:30) and that in his first resurrection appearance to the disciples, he breathed the Spirit on them (John 20:22).

The Holy Gospel according to John the 14th chapter. Glory to you, O Lord.

⁸ Philip said to [Jesus,] "Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied." ⁹ Jesus said to him, "Have I been with you all this time, Philip, and you still do not know me? Whoever has seen me has seen the Father. How can you say, 'Show us the Father'? ¹⁰ Do you not believe that I am in the Father and the Father is in me?

The words that I say to you I do not speak on my own; but the Father who dwells in me does his works. ¹¹ Believe me that I am in the Father and the Father is in me; but if you do not, then believe me because of the works themselves. ¹² Very truly, I tell you, the one who believes in me will also do the works that I do and, in fact, will do greater works than these, because I am going to the Father. ¹³ I will do whatever you ask in my name, so that the Father may be glorified in the Son. ¹⁴ If in my name you ask me for anything, I will do it. ¹⁵ "If you love me, you will keep my commandments. ¹⁶ And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you forever. ¹⁷ This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him. You know him, because he abides with you, and he will be in you. ²⁵ "I have said these things to you while I am still with you. ²⁶ But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you. ²⁷ Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid."

Nicene Creed

We believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

Great Thanksgiving


The Lord be with you. And also with you.

Lord's Prayer Gathered into one by the Holy Spirit, let us pray as Jesus taught us.


