





GO and serve: Mission Teams return from Frakes, Kentucky

Our adult and youth mission teams have returned from Frakes, Kentucky, and if you haven't chatted with a team member about their experience, you definitely should! Both teams have stories of worksite challenges, God's

grace, harrowing Kentucky road drives, going beyond what they thought they could do, and, of course, silly moments resulting in giggles.

The teams included 17 youth, three youth leaders, and 18 adults for a grand total of 38 disciples—that included several families represented by multiple disciples. TUMY was split into two worksites while the adults worked at four different sites, including serving on the campus of Henderson Settlement.

Trinity's crews included many first-timers as well as seasoned vets—though all had their own reasons for attending. "I went to experience fel-

lowship with others and to help people in the community," said disciple Tammy Friedrich, who worked in the thrift shop ministry. "Just being in the community helping others was a joyous experience."

At Henderson, teams pay to cover material costs of any construction projects they'll take on. Thanks to the Trinity Mission Trips Fund (learn more about our July Mission Focus on page 7), the teams were financially prepared to complete interior painting at two homes; snap-together flooring at four homes; and a total exterior cleaning and painting of a fifth home. And during a hot week which included time lost to rainstorms, that's just what they did!

> Both on the worksites and back at Henderson Settlement, teams enjoyed camaraderie as disciples who may previously have only shared a smile or nod on Sunday mornings became fast friends. Adults and youth connected as together they worshiped, enjoyed meals, crossed paths on worksites, or completed puzzles together.

If you've never taken part in a mission trip, Pastor Rob recommends every disciple serve to deepen their faith. "The mission trip to Henderson Settlement was life-giving, not only to the attendees but to those we served. Each person experienced God uniquely through service and

experiences that will continue to shape us at home."

From Pastor Melissa: Few Words

Do you ever feel a little bit "worded out?" When I was a kid, I absolutely loved to read. The more books the better. The longer the book, the better. A good book could capture my attention and hold it for hours...or even days at a time.

I was the kid who would get in trouble because when it was past bedtime, I would hide under my covers with a flashlight because I didn't want to put down the book that I was reading.

Now, as an adult, I still love books. I love buying books. I love reading the synopsis of books and getting excited about them and putting them on my Amazon wish list. I love collecting books. But I am lucky if my attention span can get me past the first chapter of most of the amazing books that I pick up.

I have a fantastic library of deep spiritual wisdom...most of which is probably going to go unread because my capacity for absorbing a large number of words is...well...lacking. This is why I have come to truly delight in little kernels or nuggets of wisdom that I can "chew on" in small pieces.

For example, a Norbertine monk from New Mexico wrote a book in which he boiled each of the 150 Psalms down to a single haiku. I can do haikus. My haiku Psalm for today is Psalm 27:

Like the break of day in the middle of the night the Face of the Lord

I have also come to love breath prayers: an ancient form of prayer where we link our breathing to short phrases that can be repeated over and over again. On the inhale, we speak a name or an image that we hold for God; and on the exhale, in as few words as possible, we speak our need, our longing, or our praise.

For example:

Inhale: Spirit of Peace, Exhale: Calm my fears. Then for a period of time, with every inhale and every exhale, we repeat this short petition over and over again until the prayer becomes a part of our being.

Fresh off a joint Youth and Adult mission trip, Trinity's July Mission Focus will benefit our future mission trips. Donations received this month play a valuable part in how, where, and when Trinity disciples live out our vision to GO and serve others.

While the youth fundraise extensively during the months prior to their yearly trips, when breaking down the cost of travel, lodging, and any Fun Day activities for our youth, the cost can keep some students from participating.

Enter the Trinity Mission Trips Fund. Donations collected in July will help ensure that no student misses out on learning the value of serving others or enjoying a well-earned day off during mission trips.

Currently Trinity is on track to take adult mission trips every four years. The Trinity Mission Trips Fund has an impact on what our disciples can do for others while serving. For example, when traveling to Henderson Settlement, the team leaders met in advance to select the team's projects for the trip based upon the skills of those serving.

However, while the labor is covered, projects come with a price tag to cover the cost of materials. Dona-



tions to the Trinity Mission Trips Fund allow disciples to only pay for their housing, meals, and transportation while the church covers the project costs.

Ask anyone who just returned from our Frakes, Kentucky, trip, about their experience and you'll hear

first-hand why these trips are so important... not just to those in need who we are helping but to our disciples as well. It's time to disconnect from the

daily schedule, to create new relationships with other Trinity disciples who you might not otherwise meet, and to focus your attention on your faith life.
