What the Church spent the four weeks of Advent preparing for, it now celebrates during the Twelve Days of Christmas. This twelve-day observance concludes with the Epiphany of Our Lord on January 6.

Known as "The Kalends of Christmas," this formal announcement of the Savior's birth was written in 1586 and has been read in Christian churches at Christmas ever

Proclamation of the Birth of Christ

Today, the twenty-fifth day of December,

many ages after God created the heavens and the earth,

when man and woman were formed in his image;

long after the great flood, when God set the rainbow in the sky

as a sign of the covenant;

twenty-one centuries from the birth of Abraham,

fifteen centuries from the exodus of the people of Israel out of Egypt,

one thousand years from the enthronement of David as king,

in the six hundred and ninety-eighth Olympiad,

in the seven hundred and fifty-second year from the founding of the city of Rome,

in the forty-second year of the reign of Caesar Augustus,

in the sixth age of the earth,*

at a time when the whole world was at peace,

it pleased God to send his only begotten Son and eternal Word to the world to become man and to teach us God's love, to suffer, die, and rise from the dead for our salvation.

Today is the birth of our Lord Jesus Christ, God made flesh.

To God Incarnate, to the Infant who humbled himself and took our form, becoming a child of man to make children of God; to the One who later walked among us to teach us the way of salvation and who loved us so much as to give his life for it: to him be glory, honor, and adoration forever and ever.

O come, let us adore him!

^{*} The early Christians considered the world to have seven ages: 1) From Adam to the Flood; 2) From the Flood to Abraham; 3) From Abraham to David; 4) From David to the Babylonian Captivity; 5) From the Captivity to the Advent of Christ; 6) The Coming of Our Lord Jesus Christ; 7) The New Heavens and the New Earth



Hebrews 1:1-9

reveals God to us and represents us before God.

Jesus Christ

¹In the past God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets at many times and in various ways, ²but in these last days he has spoken to us by his Son, whom he appointed heir of all things, and through whom also he made the universe. ³The Son is the radiance of God's glory and the exact representation of his being, sustaining all things by his powerful word. After he had provided purification for sins, he sat down at the right hand of the Majesty in heaven. ⁴So he became as much superior to the angels as the name he has inherited is superior to theirs.

⁵For to which of the angels did God ever say,

"You are my Son; today I have become your Father"?

"I will be his Father, and he will be my Son"?

Gospel John 1:1–14

¹In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ²He was with God in the beginning. ³Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made. ⁴In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind. ⁵The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.

⁶There was a man sent from God whose name was John. ⁷He came as a witness to testify concerning that light, so that through him all might believe. ⁸He himself was not the light; he came only as a witness to the light.



denied that Jesus
is God and man in
one person.

On Christmas Day we use the portion of this Creed that confesses the truth about Jesus Christ.

Athanasian Creed Credo

We believe and confess that our Lord Jesus Christ, God's Son, is both God and man.

He is God, eternally begotten from the nature of the Father, and he is man, born in time from the nature of his mother, fully God, fully man, with a rational soul and human flesh, equal to the Father as to his deity, less than the Father as to his humanity.

And though he is both God and man, Christ is not two persons but one: one, not by changing the deity into flesh, but by taking the humanity into God; one, indeed, not by a mixture of the natures, but by unity in one person.

For just as the rational soul and flesh are one human being, so God and man are one Christ.

He suffered for our salvation, descended into hell, rose the third day from the dead.

He ascended into heaven, is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty, and from there will come to judge the living and the dead. At his coming all people will rise with their own bodies. This is the true Christian faith.

Bring your healing to those who are sick or diseased in body or mind and comfort those who are mourning the death of someone they love. We especially pray for brothers and sisters who are setting aside their celebration today to care for the sick and stand at the side of the dying.

Sustain those who endure the troubles of life.

As you sent your Son to bring peace to all people on earth, so we pray for all people, those known and those unknown to us.

We pray through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.


Lift up your hearts.

Words of Institution


