Psalm 2:1-12

The Reign of God's King

- **I. Introduction:** This Psalm is a royal song describing the coronation of God's King, who will sit on His throne, and the blessedness of everyone who trusts in Him.
- II. The Reign of God's King (Psa 2:1-12).
 - A. Mankind's Insurrection (vv. 1-3).
 - 1. David looks on in amazement at the rebellion of the world, which has come against God to fight with Him and free itself from His moral restraints.
 - B. God's Indignation (vv. 4-6).
 - 1. God sits on His throne and laughs at man's futile attempts to defeat Him, but He installs His messiah in Jerusalem to rule over the Earth.
 - C. Messiah's Installation (vv. 7-9).
 - 1. The Lord's anointed One says that God will give Him an inheritance from every nation, which He will rule over with absolute authority.
 - D. Humanity's Invitation (vv. 10-12).
 - 1. David invites the whole Earth to put their trust in God's anointed One so that they will not perish but will find refuge in Him.
- **III. Conclusion:** David calls the nations to submit themselves to God's Messiah so that they may experience blessedness rather than face His judgment.

Study Questions: The Reign of God's King

- 1. Why is there so much trouble in the world? What did Jesus say about trouble? (Matt 16:33) Does the news make you nervous? Why should Christians not be worried?
- 2. Who wrote Psalm 2? (Acts 4:25) Why do some think it was initially combined with Psalm 1? (Acts 13:33) Why was it sung during the coronation of Israel's kings? (2 Sam 7:8-16)
- 3. What does the psalmist say the nations are doing? (Psa 2:1-3) Why is it a vain thing? (v. 1) Why do they gather against God and His Messiah? (v. 2) What do they attempt to do? (v. 3)
- 4. What is God's response to the turmoil of the nations? (Psa 2:4-6) Why does God laugh? (v. 4) How does His laughter turn into anger? (v. 5) What does God ultimately do? (v. 6)
- 5. Who is the third speaker in this Psalm? (Psa 2:7-9) What does He say that God has decreed? (v. 7) What does God give to His Son? (v. 8) What is the scope of His power? (v. 8)
- 6. What does the author call people to do? (Psa 2:10-12) How does the psalmist warn the kings of the Earth? (v. 10) Are you paying attention to God? Would you allow Him to correct you?
- 7. Why does the psalmist call people to serve God? (Psa 2:10-12) How are we to submit and serve His Messiah? (v. 11) What does it mean to rejoice with trembling? (v. 11)
- 8. What does it mean to kiss the Son? (Psa 2:10-12) How would servants kiss a king as a sign of submission? What happens to those who refuse to pay homage to him? (v. 12)

Prayer

- 1. Ask God to help calm your fears with the comfort of His sovereign authority.
- 2. Pray that you might offer terms of peace to those who are enemies of King Jesus.
