God's grace, peace, and hope be with you through our Savior, Jesus Christ.

Like rain after an endless drought, the gift of gathering in person this year has quenched a deep thirst. The pandemic revealed anew the depth of our thirst for community; Scripture also articulates this profound human need. Advances in technologies like livestreaming are indeed gifts to our church and world. Still, our hearts sing when we can rub shoulders around the communion table, embrace those who grieve, and raise our voices together in resounding song.

The mission of the synod is to support communities who share the thirst-quenching love of God – forming disciples, building beloved community, and working for just and healthy neighborhoods. I am deeply grateful for the many ways that we walk together in our journey of faith.

The synod staff walks closely in partnership with congregations, especially in times of transition, planning, or conflict. Last year, we accompanied congregations in 58 call processes. We offer skills trainings for lay members through the annual Tool Kit, and for church staff through peer groups and communicators gatherings. And, our Faith Practices & Neighborhood Practices program strengthens congregations in faith formation and engaging their neighborhoods.

Synod staff also work closely with our deacons and pastors. We experience great joy when we gather with congregations for ordinations, installations, and Ministry Site Profile reviews, as well as in preaching, presiding, and offering adult forums. We support our interim pastors who provide wise leadership in times of transition and our chaplains who provide critical care in a variety of settings. And, currently, we support 50 seminary students preparing to become pastors and deacons.

Our congregations worship in Spanish, Swahili, ASL, Oromo, Hmong, Lao, Norwegian, and Amharic. As we celebrate our diversity, we also recognize inequities affecting our congregations. Using a "racial equity lens," the synod council launched an in-depth process to evaluate and strengthen partnerships with our "strategic ministries," addressing historical realities of disconnection and resource inequities.

As a synod together, we will gather again April 28-29 for Synod Assembly. All are welcome at the opening worship Friday night; voting members will carry out the business of the synod on Saturday. We are blessed with the Rev. Dr. Otis Moss III as our keynote speaker.

Thanks to the incredible generosity of Lutherans in our synod and in the Lutheran Church of Christ in Nigeria, the ground-breaking for the first ever Lutheran University in Nigeria occurred this December. We celebrate God's provision and look forward to the blessings this university will bring.

During my sabbatical, I have been studying "the church in the U.S. – hopes and challenges." I would like to present some of my learnings as well as facilitate conversations in as many congregations as possible during the coming months. ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING MINUTES May 15, 2022

The annual meeting was held at All Saints sanctuary as in person, only. Official attendance was officially recorded by Julie Mohlis as 39 members, 44 total attendees. With the minimum Quorum number of 30 exceeded, Craig Budolfson called the meeting to order @ 10:55 AM.

- A motion to approve the Agenda was requested by Craig, Steve Suppan 1st, Cindy Olson 2nd, Motion Carried.
- Pastor Jon provided devotion for the meeting.
- Craig requested that last year's meeting minutes be approved; Rolf Olson 1st, Julie Mohlis 2nd; Motion Carried.

Pastor's Annual Presentation:

- As per the Annual Meeting Handout, Pastor Jon outlined progress according to our Church's focus on four key categories: Relevant Impact, Health Souls, Strong Families and Unique Purpose. Highlights included:
 - Relevant Impact: Local community services participation in ICA, TreeHouse Minnetonka, Urban Ventures and Mental Health Connect. Internal improvements have been made to our Church in upgrades of carpet, drinking fountains, and in audio/visual technical equipment.
 - Healthy Souls: Wellness concept informs and inspires much of the new ministry initiatives.
 - Strong Families: Welcomed a speaker to Crossroads Confirmation from the National Alliance on Mental Illness to talk on stress and anxiety imposed by the pandemic.
 - Unique purpose: Wellness initiative provides people opportunities to serve and gain and deeper sense of purpose. Our Childcare and Preschool staff have provided incredible work in navigating the pandemic in satisfying concerns and state compliances.

Treasurer's Annual Report

■ Rolf Olson provided highlights of the proposed FY 2023 budget. For the in three years, we are not reducing the budget from the previous year. We are maintaining the FY2022 budget.

- Coming out of this pandemic provides us an opportunity for growth.
- Because our church finally has sufficient reserves, we are allocating only a small amount to reserves for FY2023.
- Barbara Black was introduced to our congregation as the new financial specialist.
- Rolf opened up the conversation to members for questions:
 - Anne Englert Can we advertise or market scholarships for preschool? Yes, there is budget to offer scholarships. Follow-up can congregation members give directly to Preschool for scholarship funds directly? Yes, best method would be by check with memo line directing funds to scholarships.
 - Anne Englert Didn't know about the \$500k drive by the ELCA (until reading the annual report). Has the goal been reached?
 Yes, Pastor Jon indicated that full funding has been reached.
 - Julie Mohlis indicated that anyone can find out about ELCA activities by going to the ELCA website and signing up for update emails.
- Rolf Olson requested a motion to approve the FY2023 budget; Jane Sholtz 1st, Kim Radel 2nd. Motion Carried.

Council President Craig Budolfson

■ Craig provided brief comments on his year as Council President and asked for a motion to approved three new Council Members: Darren Aune (1-year term), Kent Blachowiak (3year term) and Heather Stafford (3-year term). Rolf Olson 1st, Jo Carlson 2nd, Motion Carried.

With new officers approved for appointment, Craig entertained a motion to adjourn the annual meeting. Rolf Olson 1st, Cindy Olson 2nd, Motion Carried.

Pastor Jon closed with a prayer.

Respectfully Submitted, Kim L Hovey, Secretary All Saints helps people live well and be well. At All Saints, we want to help people live well and be well. We start this by gathering in worship and nurturing our spirits in God's grace and love, by offering message series to ground us in faith and help us navigate life, and by connecting our hearts and souls through inspiring music. We help people live well and be well by offering online tools and resources for personal reflection and development, by helping each other find balance across 6 key areas through various events, gatherings and opportunities throughout the year, and by partnering with Mental Health Connect to provide mental health resources. We help people live well and be well by supporting families through our children's and youth programs, offering playdates to help parents connect and form community, and supporting families in our community through our preschool and child care programs. We help our neighbors live well and be well by supporting additional local partners like ICA and Urban Ventures.

This is one way of summarizing just some of the key ways we're continuing to live into our four-fold vision of making a **relevant impact** in our community, offering opportunities for everyone to pursue greater wellbeing and the ongoing task of cultivating **healthy souls**, investing in **strong families** and inviting one another to reflect on our **unique purpose** to serve our neighbors and care for God's creation.

Why does wellness-centered, spiritual formation matter?

Every church today is seeking new, creative ways to live out God's mission. While operating as we did 20-30 years ago (let alone 5 years ago) isn't as effective anymore, the good news is that this provides an opportunity for every church to reconnect with its core purpose in new, creative ways. I was speaking with an acquaintance that doesn't attend church and he asked if the church I serve was involved in addressing people's emotional wellbeing, which he identified as a major issue. I shared about our focus on wellness as a language for spiritual formation. He commented that he thought this was very relevant to someone like him and that it also must connect with long-term members who have found a sense of peace and wellbeing in

worship and in the life of the church throughout their years. I thought his comments were insightful.

Our original vision for nurturing healthy souls came out of a period of prayer, planning and conversation and I think it does a wonderful job of embodying Lutheran theology, and being understandable both to those who are already churchgoers and the increasing number of people who don't have a church connection.

We want to find new, creative ways to initiate connections with people who are not already here and invite them into a faith journey and community. Starting with the relevant needs and struggles of those in our surrounding community is part of the way we communicate our care. But, this isn't just for others—I believe all of us need to engage in this. Traditional activities like Bible study, that focus on the intellectual development of our faith, represent one aspect of what it means to be a healthy, vital Christian. But, our spiritual health also involves our social, emotional, financial, and physical health and vitality as well. We know that we can be a Christian in isolation. but it's not the full life that God envisioned. We are better together and we're called to care for neighbors in need. You can absolutely be a Christian and struggle with emotional wellbeing, but it's also true that God desires healing and hope for everyone. We should be a faith community that removes stigma and supports each other so we can experience the life and hope of faith as God desires. While we can be a Christian without giving any thought to our financial life or generosity, we are missing out on a significant and impactful part of how our faith and life intersect, and how God is calling us to live and share with others. And, finally, our physical life interacts with our sense of spiritual wellbeing as well. Consider your overall temperament when you have to be in bed all day due to sickness, compared to when you're able to be and up and around, or go for a walk. This is just a quick reiteration of what we mean when we talk about our holistic development as Christians. All of us are works in progress. Over time, all of us feel a call to pursue greater wellbeing from within and are simultaneously called by God and our neighbors to do so for the good of the whole.

Jesus spent a considerable amount of his ministry healing. It's important for us to recover what that means for the Church today.

So, what are we actually doing to enact our vision?

We continue to offer and plan for meaningful worship, fellowship and group opportunities.

When it comes to making a **relevant impact**, this year we've shifted more of our own giving as a congregation to key local partners. This allows us to make a bigger impact among our neighbors and live into more significant relationships. It makes it easier to tell the story of our impact and focus our efforts this way. This year, the council completed a process that led to greater investments in ICA Food Shelf, Urban Ventures and Mental Health Connect, while continuing to offer some support to legacy partners as well. We've also had meaningful conversations around racial equity, including how we honor our indigenous neighbors this past year, and how to care for God's creation.

As we seek to nurture **healthy souls**, we've continued to build out resources and tools on our website. These resources have gotten notice and traffic online from around the country. This last fall, we were able to upgrade our wellness inventory, allowing you to answer questions confidentially and identify next steps in your own wellness journey. Our Spiritual Formation Team has been very engaged in writing regular posts for social media and our newsletter. We're also working closely with Mental Health Connect to share resources and events for members of the congregation and community.

To support **strong families**, we've invested in well-attended neighborhood events like Easter Eggstravaganza, Neighborhood Fall Fest and Trunk or Treat. We're making connections with new families. We continue to offer Kids Connection and Crossroads Confirmation. We've invested in a more welcoming environment conducive to fellowship, including new carpet, and a family-friendly space in the Loaves area. We've used this space to gather parents and their kids for playdates. We also finished modernizing entrances for improved security and electronic

access, which is especially critical and expected for our preschool and child care during the week now. This puts parents in these programs at ease given the ongoing threat of violence happening in schools and other public places around the country.

Through worship, messages and our new Inspired Life series, we're inviting each person to pursue a **unique purpose**. The focus on this Spring's speaker series has been on the connection between the environment and our wellbeing. How are you being called to be a good steward of the creation God has gifted us?

Our mission and vision rely on you to help lead and support our ministry by making a commitment to attend worship in person regularly. Your presence adds energy. In addition, consider finding at least one way to engage in community more deeply—whether that's participating in a ministry, group, special event, or simply staying after worship to connect with others. You're also encouraged to help serve in a role on Sundays, for special events, on a team, or with one of our local partners. Of course, your generous financial investment is also key to our ongoing mission.

Ultimately, All Saints vision is not simply carried out within the walls of the church building. Our impact must be felt in the lives of people in surrounding neighborhoods, with our community partners, and in the workplaces, lives and friendships of members and those who call All Saints their faith community. All Saints remains our mission outpost, but we cannot expect people to come to worship as a first step in every case. Instead, we must bring our values, hopes, compassion and generosity wherever we go and begin by connecting with them where they are.

Thanks to all of our great staff and our members for the ways all of you continue to make All Saints' vision and mission come alive!

Be well, Pastor Jon Our Fiscal year 2023 has been one of hope and enjoyment in being in service to All Saints. I have many people to thank for that! First, thanks to all my fellow council members and ministry staff. There has been an overall spirit of cooperation in looking forward in how we can improve All Saints. I'm especially thankful for Covid-19 not being a major issue to sidetrack us from our vision of our future.

We started out the year with a session with the "Unstuck Group" leader, Mark Meyer. Before Covid, many people were involved and dedicated many hours to formulate our mission, vision and the four elements of our vision: Healthy Souls, Strong Families, Relevant Impact, Unique Purpose Some vision and mission statements can remain words on paper. In the case of All Saints, we have been working to make this vision a reality across these four areas. Any significant change can require time to complete, but we are making good progress.

Your Congregational Council has worked hard to accomplish a couple of important changes. In order to fulfill our vision of making a Relevant Impact, we have worked on revamping our benevolence partnerships and preparing revisions to our bylaws to ensure our structure and strategies are effective and consistent with best practices for churches today. Amy Stratton, Kim Radel and I formed a team to look at our benevolence partner relationships. Part of our vision is to concentrate more locally and have fewer partners so we can have a more relevant impact on the partners. After a great deal of research and discussions in this regard, the council affirmed a new direction that will help us deepen our relationships with a few key local organizations moving forward. This includes ICA, Urban Ventures and Mental Health Connect, even as we continue to give to some of our legacy partners. Next, Amy Stratton and I worked together with the council on revising the Bylaws they were outdated, and in some cases, not applicable any longer. Our goal was to streamline the Bylaws and make them more applicable to All Saints, as it currently exists and more flexible for the future. For anyone interested in more information, the council will host informational sessions prior to the annual meeting to go into greater detail about the recommended bylaw

updates and answer questions about the new budget. The council also decided this past fall to add a new part-time position focused on reaching new families, overseeing our spiritual formation and wellness ministry, and providing additional preaching and worship support. I'm happy that this is making progress as I write this report. These are just some of the highlights of what the council has done this past year.

So, how does our church invest in our mission, vision (including the four elements) and govern efficiently and fairly? That has been our work to include all these goals and guidelines into good effective leadership. By default, our members rotate in and out of your Church Council. One of my goals is to make that process easier for new officers and make governing less burdensome so it can be easier to get volunteers for this work.

So, why is this important? My hope for All Saints is the same that I have for all churches—that we would keep striving to be an inspiring and loving place for neighbors to attend and participate in. Our society faces many problems. We have the opportunity to make a positive impact in our church and our community by sharing solutions that involve respect and love for each other. Through faith, we can do this!

OPERATIONS & FACILITIES Pastor Jon Pederson & Greg Jackson

- Completed repair and painting of exterior siding, addressing a much-needed maintenance and refresh.
- Upgraded west, preschool and child care entrances with electronic door system and rekeyed exterior doors.
- Updated the Loaves area with family-friendly furnishings to better serve families

The remainder of the carpet project was completed, which involved asbestos abatement in the original, core areas of the church. Ongoing maintenance continues, ensuring replacement of HVAC with Energy Star units when needed, as well as repairs and upkeep of roof, parking lot and other key components of the facility. The roof still has some life remaining—occasional leaks are typical for the age and type of roofing we have, and are addressed as needed. Custodian Greg Jackson oversees day to day maintenance and repairs and works with our contractors.

MUSIC Meg Redmond

- We continue to blow out our Christmas and Easter celebrations! We had a talent-packed Lessons & Carols service and a rousing Christmas Eve gathering. We shared the beloved Holden Evening Prayer services on Wednesday evenings in Lent and highlighting the music of Georg Friedrich Handel; our Holy Week journey started with our Saints Chorale on Palm Sunday, the Tom Klemond band on Maundy Thursday, and a uniquely moving Choral Cantata / Tenebrae service on Good Friday. We "trumpeted" in Easter morning in a packed house with our Saints Brass and the Saints Chorale. It is always so uplifting to hear so many voices singing Easter hymns!
- We are pleased to see more participation in the contemporary services each month led by the Tom Klemond band, ALPHA, Coffeehouse, and the 5th Sunday Band. All Saints is so lucky to have such a great pool of talent in these styles!

Upcomina

I am looking into a return of "Brass Sunday" – where we highlight a larger group of brass from different churches. For the Carillon Choir, I will be looking to "expand our stable" by finding short-term ringers in order to have larger and smaller groups playing throughout the year.

- Our Trunk-or-treat and Easter Eggstravaganza were the best they have ever been. 130 kids at the trunk-or-treat and more than 200 kids at the Eggstravaganza.
- We will be confirming 10 Crossroads youth this year!
- Registration for Kids Connection doubled compared to last year, with an average of 2-3 more kids joining on a weekly basis.

Crossroads is our youth confirmation program for 6th-9th grade students. They meet almost every Wednesday to learn and prepare for to be confirmed into the church at the end of their program. This year we change the age range of youth from 7th-9th grade to 6th-8th to accommodate the Hopkins school district changes.

Kids Connection is our Sunday School program that provides a fun and interactive time for kids age 3-5th grade to learn Bible stories and lessons.

Community Events

Family Ministry has or plays a role in several events meant to reach and serve people in our community. We have 4 big events accompanied by several smaller ones. The 4 big ones are Trunk-or-treat, Easter Eggstravaganza, Day Camp, and Fall Fest.

PRESCHOOL AND CHILDCARE Katie Avenson & Heather Lane

- All Saints Preschool serves 97 students. All Saints Child Care serves 44 children. On any given weekday, well over 100 little ones are moving about the hallways of these two community-recognized programs.
- All Saints Preschool was voted Best Preschool 2023 within the Minnetonka and Deephaven Communities
- All Saints Preschool and Childcare are working through re-accreditation with the National Association for the Education of the Young Child (NAEYC), a prestigious accreditation organization that requires attention to this process every five years.

Activities and Focus

All Saints Preschool began operation in September 1966, and All Saints Childcare began operation in September 1985. For 56 years and 37 years, respectively, we have maintained high regard in the community. We have waitlists for entry, and alum parents are bringing their children in for the same high-quality educational start that they had. We look forward to this coming year to serve our community.

COMMUNICATIONS STRATEGY

- Improved user experience and ease of access on the website and app. Implemented Groups and messaging in the app to build community, help coordinate volunteers, and facilitate ministry groups.
- Increased social media presence, including weekly posts for Wellness Wednesdays, Kids Connection, and *The Road* podcast.
- Increased digital advertising for special events and holiday services.

I'm excited about the communications groundwork that we've set up over my first nine months here. I look forward to helping ministry teams and small groups transition to using our app for consolidated communication that is welcoming to visitors and new members. I look forward to continuing to standardize and brand our communications both within the church and in the community.

- Our community events such as trunk-or-treat, Easter Eggstravaganza, and Fall Fest were some of the best turnouts we've had to date.
- A new playdate group has been formed for young families.
- We have updated many things for families during the service such as new worship bags and our parent-child space. Both of these have positively affected many families that attend Sunday Worship.

The Strong Families team is all about providing the best experience for not only the families at All Saints, but the families we haven't met yet. Some of that is done through programs that already exist at All Saints. However, it is also about resources and events that can make families stronger. We also aim to provide various opportunities for families to connect and build relationships with other families.

TREASURER'S REPORT

- Fiscal year ended June 30, 2022 ended with a deficit of \$36,000. This was \$26,000 better than the budgeted deficit of \$62,000.
- For the nine-month period ended March 31, 2023, the deficit is \$18,700. This is \$3,700 better than the budgeted deficit of \$22,400 for this period of time.
- The balance sheet remains strong with sufficient cash reserves to cover near term deficits.

The child care and preschool operations have been self-sustaining. They are able to cover their expenses with the income they each have received.

The 2024 budget represents the continued investment in sustaining those who regularly attend All Saints Lutheran Church as well as our efforts to draw new people into our worship services and activities. The budget also allows for the continued maintenance of the building and property.

ALL SAINTS FOUNDATION 2022 ANNUAL REPORT

The All Saints Foundation was established in 1986 by the Church Council of All Saints Lutheran Church as a separate charitable non-profit corporation. Its purpose is to provide an investment vehicle for church members and others to express their gratitude to God for the blessings they have received and for any other personal reason which may prompt them to consider the Church in their charitable giving program. The All Saints Church Council make up the membership of the All Saints Foundation, and this body elects the members of the Board of Directors.

The **Mission** of the All Saints Foundation is to:

- Provide education and awareness of personal stewardship of assets so members will consider giving gifts and/or bequests of their assets to All Saints Church to be endowed forever.
- Provide the opportunity and assistance when requested for those who wish to make gifts or bequests to the All Saints Foundation of cash, securities, life insurance, and real estate.
- Administer and invest the endowed funds so they will safely earn income.
- Determine how funds will be dispersed so it will extend the work and mission of our Lord in the All Saints congregation, our community, and the wider world.

Thank you for your support throughout this year. In 2022, gifts given to the All Saints Foundation to carry out its mission totaled \$375. The All Saints Foundation Net Worth at year end was \$190,988.

The Board approved a gifting balance of \$3,600 in January 2021. However, no grants were approved during the 2021 calendar year. In February 2022, the Board decision was to continue this gifting balance and revisit as needed. The Board has the authority to amend the gifting budget at any time. The Board approved and disbursed one grant in 2022: \$500 was granted to the Racial Justice Group at All Saints Lutheran for the well-attended Sacred Sites tour in October 2022.

In 2022 the Board participated in the following activities:

- The Board began a review and revision of the grant application
- The Board hosted a brunch on All Saints Sunday

There continue to be open positions on the Board of Directors. Michelle Stark has agreed to a fourth term on the Board and is awaiting approval by the Church Council. Rick Johnson, a Board member since the inception of the Foundation, has decided not to continue as a Board member past the end of this term.
