Today I am giving a mini book report on a few of the good books I have read. The Small and the Mighty, Sharon McMahon, Lifting as We Climb, Evette Dionne, The Woman They Could Not Silence, Kate Moore, Kent State, Deborah Wiles, Ethel Rosenberg, Anne Sebba and The Woman with a Purple Heart, Diane Hanks are all books about real events and real people in history. Reading these, introduced me to people (lots of women) who made a difference and impacted my life. Many of these people were unknown to me and to much of the world. A couple of the books helped me better understand some events I had always heard about but have never really known the story. Each one was very readable and opened my eyes (sometimes my heart) to greater appreciation. The Tortilla Curtain, T.C. Boyle, a novel was a bit harder to read. It drew me in

How We Learn to be Brave, Mariann Edger Budde, and The Truths We Hold, Kamala Harris, tell personal histories of these women. They were filled with hope and encouragement. I came to both of these books because of our current political climate, and they felt like refreshment to me.

Weightless, Evette Dionne is all about body image and living in a world in which strangers feel free to touch, critique, and infringe on another person's body especially if they are bigger, female or have some "otherness" about them. There is some expressive language and frank sexual content in this book, but I found it very enlightening.

The Painful Truth about Hunger in America: Why We Must Unlearn Everything We Think We Know, Mariana Chilton. This book is not so easy to read. It has a lot of stats and interview stories which is sometimes hard to keep straight, but it also takes me deep into systemic challenges that the poor and needy face daily. Again, my heart is broken by what I am learning here. I see my complicity in these systems.
