First

Read Psalm 32:1–11 aloud as a group.

Psalm 32 flows out of David’s experience of deep repentance and God’s overwhelming forgiveness. After trying to cover his sin, David finally confesses—and is met with God’s mercy. This psalm gives us a powerful picture of what happens when we stop hiding and start trusting.

Psalm 32:1–2 – The Blessing of Being Forgiven

1. What does the word “blessed” mean in this context?
2. What do the three words David uses for sin—**transgression**, **sin**, and **iniquity**—reveal about the nature of our rebellion against God?
3. Why is it significant that forgiveness is something **God gives**, not something we earn?
4. What do these verses say about the character of God toward sinners?

Psalm 32:3–5 – The Burden of Hiding Sin

1. How did unconfessed sin affect David physically, emotionally, and spiritually?
2. Can you relate to David’s description of what it feels like to carry guilt?
3. What changed the moment David confessed his sin (v.5)?
4. Why is it so hard for us to be honest with God when we fall?

Psalm 32:6–7 – God Our Refuge

1. Why is it important to respond to God “while He may be found” (v.6)?
2. What does it mean that God becomes our “hiding place” after we stop hiding our sin?
3. What role does trust play in finding peace after failure?
