SERMON RECAP

In this message, we're reminded of the sobering reality that following Christ can come at a great cost. The parable of the tenants in Matthew 21 serves as a stark illustration of how the world often rejects God's messengers. We're challenged to consider: are we prepared to stand firm in our faith, even in the face of persecution? The recent tragic events are not merely coincidental, but rather a continuation of the spiritual battle that has raged throughout history. As believers, we're called to endure, to speak truth boldly, and to trust that God can use even the darkest moments for His glory. This message urges us to examine our own lives and ask: Are we living with such conviction that our faith is evident to all? Are we ready to be remembered for our courage and unwavering commitment to Christ?

5. How can we as Christians respond to persecution or opposition in a way that reflects Christ's love while still standing firm in truth?
6. The pastor emphasizes the importance of living for Christ and viewing death as gain. How can we cultivate this mindset in our daily lives?
7. What does it mean to "mourn differently" as Christians? How can we practically demonstrate hope in the face of tragedy?
