Have you ever stopped and thought about the kind of family in which Jesus grew up?

It was a family devoted to God. That makes sense, doesn't it? God chose Mary and Joseph because they were the kind of people who would take Jesus to Jerusalem every year for Passover. They would take Jesus to the Synagogue weekly, if not daily. They were the kind of parents who went out of their way to honor God.

It made a difference! Jesus grew up in a family that was devoted to God, and it made a difference for him. Jesus was human, and he needed the nurture that his human family offered.

Jesus is his growing in a family that went beyond the call of duty to honor God. He did his growing in a family that helped him to develop strong ties to His Heavenly Father. Life in that kind of family made Jesus strong. It prepared him for life. It prepared him for death. It prepared him for whatever he might face. It prepared him for the beginning of his ministry. Do you remember how his ministry began? Jesus began his ministry with the temptation in the wilderness! There Satan tried to get the best of Jesus.

- Satan tried to get Jesus to make bread from stone.
- He tried to get Jesus to take the easy way and to worship Satan.
- He tried to get Jesus to jump-start his ministry with a spectacular stunt.


But Jesus parried every temptation. He countered every temptation with scripture.

The History of the Congregational Care Talks

In 1980 a rarity happened in the ministry, whether appointed or called. At the age of 29, I was appointed to Wesley Living Ministries as the Pastoral/Spiritual Care provider. This was a dream come true and for me a “Plum” appointment. In 1971, I felt a specialty calling to older adult ministry while serving at my first charge at Arlington U.M.C. Arlington, Kentucky. The day had arrived. Over a period of 42 years serving at Wesley-unusual in and of itself- I aged into the very ministry I deeply loved sharing.

With retirement approaching, my hope was that I could return to St. Luke’s-and that too reached “Plum” status. I have appreciated and enjoyed the many ways of caring the church staff and church family have invited me to share alongside all in being the hands, heart, and mind of Christ

In addition, as you have all read in The Epistle and participated in, I have also been offering an additional ministry under the name of Congregational Care Talks. It occurred to me that I have not shared with many of you the history of the Care Talks. Consequently, this article is written to acquaint you with this ministry 40 plus years in the making.

These Care Talks numbering 5 are a collection of educational opportunities packaged in a Pastoral Care Initiative titled “Life’s Ride”. The plans of care in each have their roots from Insights gained “out in the field” in my years at Wesley. The pick-ups originate

from two sources. The first is what I have learned alongside Wesley neighbors regarding the practice of pastoral care. The second source is courtesy of Wesley neighbors who in sharing their Life Ride (Soul Baring) expressed something about their life ride that definitely impacts all of us.

So there you have the story behind the Care Talks that will contribute to a much more fulfilling and smoother life ride. I don’t think anybody would object to that! The benefits are a richer pilgrim walk, a healthier body, mind and spirit, fellowship sweet, and God’s peace beyond compare.

If you are interested in knowing more about this Life Ride Initiative or to volunteer as a team member to grow the ministry, I would be thrilled to share with you.

What’s Next?

Our Care Talk in February will focus on The Art of Getting Along. In the Sunday School Hour, the lesson will center on Dispelling Bees. The message for the Worship service is on Body Building Christ Style.

Star Words

Beginning with Epiphany Sunday, everyone at St. Luke's is invited to receive a Star Word card. The card contains a single word which may serve as a guide for your journey in the year ahead. Star Words is a growing prayer practice used in many churches based on the story of the magi following a star, which ultimately led them to Jesus. This creative prayer practice in the new year can also help us move closer to Jesus.

Star Words are not necessarily assignments for ways that God wants you to grow or improve. This may indeed be what you take from your Star Word, but it can also be a way to reflect on God's presence and the ways that God is moving through, around, or in connection to that word and its meaning.

So you may ask, "What can I do with my Star Word?" Here are some ideas:

- Find a scripture that anchors it
- Look up the definition and its synonyms
- Find books, podcasts, and articles that dive into your word and explore a deeper meaning
- Create a playlist of songs that reflect your word
- Start a journal (written, drawn, really any expression) of how your word is showing up in your life

However you choose to interact with your Star Word in 2026, may it remind you of God's presence as it guides you to Jesus.

If you haven't received a Star Word, they will be available through January, and if you'd like to make a choice of another word to add to the one you received, you may do that as well. Contact Pastor Amy Martin for further conversation about Star Words.

Service opportunities related to The Congregational Care Talks:

- Helping to Organize an Educational Prayer ministry and distributing it across the entire church family to participate in sure to foster personal and community well being.
- Volunteering to help build a Family Ministry where we study the variety of church families within our communion, design ministries to focus on the common needs of all structures, put in place a ministry to address the particular needs of each, and a ministry team who would be in place to assist those in transitioning from one kind to another.
- Assisting in a ministry titled “We Can Do This” aimed at reminding us as a church family that we are well equipped to fulfill our discipleship duties. In a Bible Study, we first study the “How’s” and then discuss strategies to share it with the church family.

- Helping with Fruits of the Spirit Fashion Show.
- Volunteering in supporting the Campus School sports teams who practice and compete in our Family life Center from helping with the concession stand to cheerleading.

We made approximately 100 snack and hygiene bags for the residents supported by Golden Cross ministries. Some had food items while others had hygiene and personal care items. Manna Snack bag update - 2026

The 2025 year started out with money and snack contributions from the church's Christmas emphasis. A gift card from Target allowed us to purchase all the empty snack bags that we needed for our snacks. Cash contributions kept us solvent and able to function for the remainder of the year. We still received some extra Vienna sausages from the food bank along with fruit cups and crackers.

We distributed 18 to 20 Manna bags at the hospitality door with Sara's help until Highland Towers shut down in the early part of 2025. Around the later part of the Spring "business" picked back up with word of mouth bringing us new "customers". By mid-summer we were back to 20 bags a week for walk up "bag seekers".

Think of it this way, one can of Vienna sausages equates to one Manna bag. The donations last Christmas bought us 576 cans of Vienna sausages. With Vienna sausage cans contributed last Christmas, plus Vienna sausage cans collected from the food bank, and other supplies the number is over 800 Manna bags passed out by Sarah and others working the desk in 2025.

The Manna Snack bag program received 159 cans of Vienna Sausage and 104 Fruit cups for the 2026 food ministry on January 4 from the results of the Love in Action effort.

What's in a Manna bag? Answer: Water, crackers, Vienna sausages, a fruit cup, a mustard pack, spoon and napkins and care.

A special thanks to Stan Craig, Larry Kaler, Harry Colter, Sarah Jordan, Larry Banks, Carolyn Galloway and volunteers like Maggie Scoggins" together they make the program run smoothly.
