★ Introduction & Story:

Recap: The Israelites have struggled with obedience to God as an entire people group. God sent the prophets to remind the people to turn back to following Him. They refused. God eventually disciplined them by removing them from their homes (exiled). We have talked about certain people who lived during that time and how God still loved His people and protected them.

Nehemiah was a Jewish man living far from Jerusalem. He had been born in Babylon while his family was there in exile. He was free to go back to Jerusalem, but he was working for the King of Persia. He was the king's cupbearer which meant that he would serve the king things to drink only after he had inspected them and perhaps tasted them to make sure that no one had tried to poison the king.

One day, Nehemiah's brother came to visit him for Judah. He brought him sad news: the walls and gates of Jerusalem, the city of his ancestors, were broken and falling down. Nehemiah was very sad because of this news and prayed to God to ask what to do.

When the King of Persia saw Nehemiah's sadness, he asked why he was upset. Nehemiah told the King about the ruined city, and God helped him ask for permission to go back and rebuild the walls. The King not only said yes but also gave Nehemiah letters and supplies to help him on his journey.

When Nehemiah arrived in Jerusalem, he secretly inspected the damaged walls, asking God to give him a plan. He then gathered the leaders and people and told them God's plan to rebuild the walls. The people were inspired and said, "Let us start rebuilding!".

However, some people from neighboring lands became angry and tried to stop the work. They made fun of Nehemiah and his people and even tried to trick him by planning to meet him at a place where they could kill him. Nehemiah would not meet with them because he wanted to continue to build the wall. Four times they requested that he come to them and each time he told them that he would not stop his important work to come to them.

Nehemiah and the people continued to work, but they also kept their weapons handy to protect themselves from the enemies. Half of the workers stood guard while the other half continued to build the wall.

Even though the work was hard, Nehemiah encouraged the people to trust God and remember that He would help them. They worked together, with some people building and others standing guard. Amazingly, the wall and gates were completely rebuilt and finished in just 52 days!

The enemies, seeing that the wall was finished, realized that it was God who had helped the Jews. The people celebrated the rebuilding, knowing that it was God's power and guidance that made it possible.

★ Connection to God's Overall Story/Plan: God had promised that His people would return to Israel after 70 years of punishment/exile. Nehemiah helped rebuild the city. God was using him to fulfill that promise. This is important because God always did what He said He would do ... and remember, He promised to send a Savior to save all people from their sins.

Follow Up:

Retell: Have kids share what they recall from the story. Fill in any major holes they missed.

Questions:

- 1. Why were the neighboring people upset about the wall being rebuilt? (The wall would protect the city, and the rulers of the other areas would not be powerful over the Jews any longer.)
- 2. When Nehemiah refused to go to Sanballat and Tobiah, do you think he knew that they wanted to harm him? (Possibly. The Lord may have warned him. But he was so single-minded about building the wall that he did not want to leave the work.)
- 3. How do you think it was possible for the people to rebuild that wall in just 52 days?

* Examine

- Ask, "What do we learn about God from this story? What does He do?"
 - He uses us to help carry out His plan Nehemiah helped prepare the area for people to return home.

- Ask, "What do we learn about humans from this story? What are humans doing?"
 - We are used by God. We can hear from God. We can follow God and help carry out His plan.
- Application: Ask, "What is Jesus asking us to do through this story? Why did God include this in the Bible?"
 - Jesus is asking us to be faithful and listen to Him and do what He asks of us.

When the king saw Nehemiah, he asked him, "Why are you so sad?" Nehemiah said, "I am sad because the wall around my city is broken down."


The king said, "You may go and help the people fix the wall. You can rebuild it. Come back when it is finished." Nehemiah was very happy.



NEHEMIAH'S STORY

Old Testament Lesson #152

Nehemiah (NE-he-MI-a) was a Jewish man who had been elevated to the position of cupbearer to King Artaxerxes (ar-ta-ZERK-seez) of Persia. Nehemiah received a report about the state of Jerusalem, and the news was not good. The walls were broken, the gates burned and the people "in great trouble and disgrace." Nehemiah was very sad and prayed that God would forgive the sins of his people (Nehemiah included himself) and that Nehemiah would be able to help them.

The king observed Nehemiah's sadness and asked its source. Nehemiah explained his unhappiness and asked the king's permission to go to Jerusalem to help rebuild the city. The king approved and gave Nehemiah the necessary letters and papers for the trip. In Jerusalem, Nehemiah surveyed the damage, arranged for people to work in groups on parts of the wall and spoke of the goodness of God in the way that King Artaxerxes had provided for him. The people responded, and the wall grew higher and higher.

The neighboring peoples were very angry to see the wall going up. They made fun of the workers and even planned to attack the Jews to stop the construction. Nehemiah responded by praying to God, posting a guard on the job site and allowing the workers to protect themselves with weapons while they worked.

When the walls were finally done, but before the gates were set up, the leaders of those who opposed the Jews tried four times to persuade Nehemiah to come out and meet with them. The fifth time, they sent a letter to get him to come out. In the letter, they falsely accused him of planning to make himself king of Judah and implied that word of this would get to the Persian king. The enemies were trying to frighten the Jews so they would stop the work. Again, Nehemiah prayed. He also posted guards to protect those building the walls. From that day on, half of the men worked on the construction and half stood guard. Even those who worked kept their weapons close at hand.

The walls were finished in 52 days. When the enemies heard this, they were afraid because they realized this work had been done with the help of Judah's God.

POINTS TO CONSIDER:

- A cupbearer was a person in the household who tasted the wine before passing it to the people at the table. It was an important and honored position, one which gave frequent access to the king.
- It was four months between the time Nehemiah received the sad news from Jerusalem and the time he was sad in front of the king. Compare 1:1 to 2:1.
- Nehemiah was a man of prayer and action. He prayed and trusted God, but also worked to see God's purposes accomplished.
