
Kenneth Frese will lead us in the scripture readings that inspired each song we'll hear and sing.

What are the Lectionaries?

They are a list of Scripture passages used for the weekly readings in worship services, helping to guide sermons and Bible studies throughout the church year. Some members of our church family also use them for daily personal Bible study. The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod has established a three-year lectionary cycle (Years A, B, and C) and each year emphasizes a different Gospel book: Year A focuses on Matthew, Year B on Mark, and Year C on Luke. We are currently in Year C. The purpose of the Lectionaries is to offer a wide range of biblical teaching over the three-year cycle, allowing for the exploration of a greater number of passages.

As of this writing, the musical program will proceed as follows: **Pastor Frank Matthews** is planning on singing two well-known Christian masterworks—one from 1825 and the other from 1955. Pastor has an extensive background in worship music and studied vocal performance at Knoxville College.

Ray Hutchinson will present two songs that he wrote himself: "The Artist" and "Answered Prayer." Ray's true joy is writing music and lyrics that evoke a deep emotional response and give glory to God. He was a student at First Lutheran School, Temple City from 1969 to 1974 and sang in the junior choir. Later he studied at Pasadena City College and sang with the PCC Chamber Singers in New York's Carnegie Hall and in England's Coventry Cathedral. He has sung the US National Anthem twice at Dodger Stadium and has served for many years as director of music in Christian parishes.

Lisa Wall-Urgero will share two of her favorite praise songs. She attended First Lutheran School from 1976 to 1982 and sang in the junior choir. She later earned a Bachelor of Arts in Music Performance from California Lutheran University and has since built a career as a session singer, backing vocalist, pianist, music educator and church director of music. She has appeared in performances with such groups as the LA Opera Chorus and on Hallmark's Home and Family television presentations.

The **Foothill Academy of Vocal Arts Choir** will present three well-known traditional hymns in settings by modern composers. FAVA is a non-profit organization that serves the community by promoting the art of choral singing for children, teens and adults. Its director is Dianne Harmel, on faculty at Azusa Pacific University for 20+ years as an Adjunct Professor of Applied Voice, with a voice studio at her home. She is a former music director at Our Savior Lutheran Church in Arcadia.

Among its songs and spirituals, the **Faith Lutheran Inglewood Gospel Choir** will present "Amazing Grace" and "Oh Happy Day" and invite everyone to join in for spirit-enlightening group singing. This choir blesses and inspires worship at Faith Lutheran Church in Inglewood and is under the direction of Rahn Coleman. He is a producer, arranger, conductor, pianist, musical director/supervisor, and performance coach and has twice won the NAACP's Annual Theatre Award for "Best Music Director."

Then it'll be time for dinner! After the songfest, everyone who has RSVP'd (see below) will be treated to a delicious, home-cooked meal by our own **Vicki Trepanier and her team** in the theme of First Lutheran's founding year: **1945!** Enjoy the fine food, swing music, charming decorations and church family nostalgia.

Why Pastors Should Sing

We at First Lutheran Church, Temple City are now blessed with Pastor Frank Mathews and his professional singing background and enthusiasm. The following article digs deep into why this ministry is so impactful in a Christian church.

Singing has always been a powerful and integral part of worship. From hymns and psalms to chorales and cantatas, Christians have used music to praise God, teach biblical truths and unite the gathered saints. The role of the pastor in leading music in the Divine Service should not be overlooked. In my youth, there were pastors who sang and inspired me to be active in church music. In fact, even a "tone deaf" pastor greatly influenced my musical participation. A pastor's encouragement matters.

Does singing matter?

Singing is a form of prayer. When we lift our voices in song, we are offering up our praise, thanks and petitions to God. Pastors regularly lead their congregations in prayer, and singing provides an additional dimension to those prayers. Whether it be through a hymn, the chanting of a psalm or a refrain, music can often touch the heart and soul more deeply than spoken words. When a group of people breathe together and share in song, it fosters a community among God's people that can be hard to define but is easily understood once experienced.

A pastor's teaching can also be enhanced through singing. LCMS churches highly value the ability of the liturgy and hymn to speak God's Word. By actively participating in the music ministry of the church, pastors reinforce these teachings and deepen the congregation's understanding of the faith. When pastors lead by example, they demonstrate the value of music in worship and instruction.

There are many benefits to be gained from pastors incorporating singing into their ministry. Whether for prayer, communication, self-expression or teaching, singing can help pastors connect with their congregations in meaningful ways. As Martin Luther said, "Next to the Word of God, the noble art of music is the greatest treasure in the world." An even greater treasure is yet to come: life eternal with the Father, Son and Holy Spirit in the unending song of praise with the heavenly host.

Last month, Missionary Emily Terhune asked us to pray for God's protection over the Trauma Healing workshop she would present to assist in reconciling two villages experiencing conflict with each other for the last 15 years. She requested prayer that God would bring healing through His word. Following is her update on the workshop.

Trauma Healing Workshop

"During the workshop, an older man from a rival village got up and shared that he was ready to receive God's word, and that he had previously killed a lot of people, and that he was really sorry. He repented and apologized in front of the whole group. A woman got up, crying, and embraced him, saying she forgave him - He had killed a family member of hers. I was amazed by what I was seeing!

But it's still hard. The official peace ceremony is scheduled for early next year, but there were apparently people plotting to kill this older man in "payback" for coming to their village for the workshop. Nothing happened to him, but please pray for true peace."

"As for our family, please pray that we could continue to find moments of rest in between work, homeschool, etc.! Thank you."


Our congregation supports missionaries Matt and Emily Terhune's work in Papua New Guinea with Wycliffe Bible Translators through our tithe.
