LCMS Pacific Southwest District Applauds FLCTC Prayer Box Ministry

There's one particular Southwest District congregation that maintains outreach to the surrounding area through its "Community Prayer Box."

Yes, it's a real mailbox by the sidewalk in front of First Lutheran Church of Temple City where real people place their real prayer requests, expecting God's very real help. Longtime member Jo Tschopp is the caretaker and advocate for the congregation's enduring prayer box ministry.



First Lutheran began this ministry in 2021. Jo is a regular volunteer for First Lutheran's activities and she currently chairs the congregation's Mission Development Team. Jo sends the requests via email, with an appropriate text from scripture, to members and others who are on the Prayer Chain and have committed to pray.

The prayer requests arise from concerns, simple or difficult. The concerns embrace personal, family, or community issues. Some are written by older members of the community while others are from the youth. God hears and knows and His listening weighs in where it counts as the notes in the mailbox provide a simple, yet personal, ministry to the neighborhood.

Other congregations opt for prayer requests in various ways but Jo and the good people of First Lutheran know that their old-fashioned mailbox also works! The whole church thanks God for the faithful service of those who support the prayer requests of neighbors near and far.

World Series-Winning Dodgers have Many Christians on Their Team

Blake Treinen – the pitcher who got the Dodgers out of a jam in the sixth and eighth innings to help win the last game of World Series – praised God after their victory.

"God is absolutely good. I gotta give a shout out to my Lord and Savior Jesus Christ," he said after the game on Crosswalk. "It's the favor of the Lord on my body. I've been praying just to be ready and able for this team when they need me." They needed him in the 6th and 8th innings when the Yankees had men on base. Ultimately, the Dodgers prevailed 7-6 to clinch their 8th World Series in five games. "God's rewarded me. I've been very blessed," Treinen said. Treinen is one of several Dodgers who also count themselves as members of Christ's team.

"We've been having a great network of people (at the Dodgers) to keep us strong, keep the faith, and it's been really good," said Freddie Freeman, who introduced mass production to the home run industry.

Future Hall of Fame pitcher Clayton Kershaw pushed the Dodgers to bring back Christian Faith and Family Day, which was, in his words, expedited. "We are grateful for the opportunity to talk about Jesus and determined to make it bigger and better than it was before COVID," he said.

A surprise Christian on the Dodgers is Shohei Ohtani, the legendary pitcher/hitter being compared to Babe Ruth. Although he hasn't spoken much about his faith, it is reported he is a practicing Christian. This is surprising because most Japanese are atheists, Buddhists or ancestor worshippers. Christians make up only 1% of the population in Japan.

Relief pitcher Michael Kopech said, "My relationship with Christ is the most important thing in my life. God has His hand in everything. There's a sense of peace within knowing that as big as (Major League Baseball) may feel, it's not even close to the biggest priority. It takes a whole load off myself to realize that there's Someone else in control."

Utility player Tommy Edman has his priorities straight: "Obviously, as a baseball player, your goal is to win the World Series. But I think for me, my goal is to be able to use the platform that I have to impact as many people as I can. It's important for me as a Christian to be able to spread the word of God as much as I can."


