King David wrote in Psalm 42:1


As the deer pants for the water brooks,

Pastor's Devotional

Is there no balm in Gilead?
Is there no physician there?
Why then is there no healing

for the wound of my people?

he prophet Jeremiah was called to deliver a difficult message during one of the most difficult periods of Israelite history. For the people living in the land of Judah, Jeremiah's voice would be the last one they heard before disaster struck. The Babylonians would come, raze the city of Jerusalem, destroy the temple, and carry off hundreds of thousands of Israelites as exiles.

The message of the prophet is one of doom and gloom, of the impending judgement that God is going to release on the people of Judah for their long history of disobedience. Jeremiah's message may sound like those of his prophetic predecessors but unlike the prophets who came before him, there is little hope to avert judgement in Jeremiah's words. So inevitable is judgement that Jeremiah cannot remain emotionally detached from his message. He will not only deliver the word of judgement, he will also experience the hardship of judgement as well. And unlike the people who hear his words, Jeremiah believes the message that he speaks so much so that dispersed throughout his prophecies are laments, cries to God because of what he knows will happen to his people and his country.

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It is with this as the backdrop, a people who have been warned time and time again of what their fate if they don't seek God, a group of spiritual leaders who will deny the reality of the sins of a people and the chaotic consequences of what will happen if they don't change, that Jeremiah delivers one of the most emotional cries that we will find in the book of Jeremiah. The cries are a response to the spiritual sickness of the nation of Judah. The cries come in the form of three questions each of which when understood correctly are an indictment of the stubbornness and the determination of the people to continue to sin that will ultimately result in their destruction.

The first question that Jeremiah asks is the most well-known of the three, "is there no balm in Gilead?" Gilead was a mountainous region east of the Jordan river famous in the ancient world for producing a medicinal ointment. As early as the book of Genesis we hear about this balm when Jacob sends it as a gift to Egypt to curry favor with the Pharaoh and his court (Genesis 43:11) The balm was then trafficked throughout the ancient Near East. And there was never a shortage of balm in Gilead. And that's Jeremiah point.

Just like there is never a shortage a balm imported from

Gilead to heal the physical wounds of the people, Jeremiah's point is there is never a shortage of grace and mercy from God to heal the spiritual and emotional wounds of the people. In Jeremiah's mind, sin had created a gaping wound in the hearts of the people, and they were sin sick as a result. Sin



in the mind of the biblical authors is a disease that when left untreated can kill. Its symptoms are guilt, shame, alienation, and condemnation. Guilt is the awareness of our personal failures; it manifests itself through our



conscience and when we are sufficiently burdened by the weight of our guilt it can lead to anxiety and sleepless nights. While guilt is the sense of

failure that we have in our own eyes, shame is the awareness that our failures are known by other people. Both guilt and shame work to produce alienation and condemnation; alienation is that withdrawal or separation from the affections of the other people and from the love of God. Condemnation is the thoughts that we have that there is nothing good or loveable about us.

These symptoms of our sin sickness collectively led to a spread of the disease because the more guilt and shame people feel, the more they feel a sense of alienation and condemnation, which in their attempts to ease their pain, leads to turning to the very sin that led to the guilt and the shame in the first place. Sin as a disease will, like cancer, continue to grow and spread if something is not done about it. And it is beyond the ability of the people who are infected with the disease to heal and to help themselves.

Those who are infected, cannot do anything to help themselves. There is no surgery that sin sick people can do to bring about their own recovery and, to even attempt, would result in further harm to themselves.

For Jeremiah, the only cure for sinful people's wounds and disease is to apply God's healing balm to the wounds of their heart, and we are never so sick that God cannot heal us. There is not a sin that people have done, there is not an evil act that people have committed, there is no guilt and shame, that God cannot heal. However sin sick we may be, God can heal us.

Duane Mansveld and Miriam Beau are Streetworkers with PAX- Communauté de la Rue, a ministry that exists to help the homeless and marginalized of Montreal connect to God, to others, and to the world, and a ministry of l'Association d'Église Baptiste Évangélique du Québec, and Missions Door.

Duane was born and raised in Pembroke, Ontario, and has known the streets since age 15. At the age of 18, Duane accepted Christ as Lord and Savior. In 1993, Duane began three years of street missionary training in Montreal, and it was there that he met his wife Miriam. Miriam's parents came to Quebec as missionaries from Europe in the 1950s, and Miriam accepted the Lord at the age of 6. She was introduced to the streets by friends who lived there. During that time, God showed Miriam His heart for the street youth, their needs, and their incredible potential. It was then that the Lord gave Miriam the call to minister to street youth full time.

Duane and Miriam were married in June of 1996. They have been blessed with one son, Jeremie.

AUGUST MISSIONARY OF THE MONTH

Vincent & Maryam Morgan

Mission Board: Missions Door



Incent and Maryam Morgan's ministry concentrates mainly on Russian and Jewish evangelism, church planting, and assisting churches in Jewish evangelism in New York City and Israel. With and through Missions Door, the ministry has been working with Russian-speaking refugees and immigrants from the former Soviet Union,

many of whom are Jewish. So far, the ministry has planted two Russian-speaking congregations and continues to lead the second one. In addition, since 2005, the Morgans began work with several ministries in Israel bringing their passion to interests such as assisting leadership, teaching Bible studies and encouraging the local leaders. Most recently several Muslims and Hindus have begun to seek out the Morgans for information concerning Jesus, the Bible, God, and more, in the metropolitan New York area.

It should be noted that Vincent Morgan himself is an accomplished writer. He published two important books, "Psalm 119, A Handbook for Life" and "Isaiah 53: The Centrality of the Lamb." He continues to collaborate with

authors on Bible commentaries as an editor and proofreader, allowing the ministry to continue to bring the Bible to life around the world.
