Week 11: Preach the Word

[1] I charge you in the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and by his appearing and his kingdom: [2] preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, and exhort, with complete patience and teaching.

[3] For the time is coming when people will not endure sound teaching, but having itching ears they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own passions, [4] and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander off into myths. [5] But as for you, always be soberminded, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, fulfill your ministry.

[6] For I am already being poured out as a drink offering, and the time of my departure has come. [7] I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. [8] Henceforth there is laid up for me the crown of righteousness, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will award to me on that day, and not only to me but also to all who have loved his appearing.

The Big Idea

We are called to proclaim and be willing to hear God's Word knowing that we are ultimately accountable to God, not man.

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- This represents, perhaps, the climactic charge in a letter full of exhortations:
 - Fan aflame the gift of God that is in you (1:7)
 - Don't be ashamed, but join in suffering (1:8)
 - Retain the standard of sound words (1:12)
 - Guard the good deposit (1:14)
 - Entrust these things to reliable men (2:2)
 - Suffer hardship like a good soldier of Christ Jesus (2:3)

- This represents, perhaps, the climactic charge in a letter full of exhortations:
 - Think over what I say (2:7)
 - Charge them not to quarrel (2:14)
 - Handle God's word accurately (2:15)
 - Pursue righteousness (2:22)
 - Understand the last days & how they will be characterized (3:1-8)
 - Continue in what you have learned (3:14-15)

- This represents, perhaps, the climactic charge in a letter full of exhortations
- Now Paul exhorts Timothy to PREACH THE WORD, but he issues this charge in a very solemn manner.

What is a "solemn" charge?

What makes the command in 4:1-2 a "solemn" charge?

- In the presence of God
- In the presence of Christ
- In light of the Judgment of Christ
- In light of Christ's Appearance
- In light of Christ's Kingdom

- Timothy is to take this charge with a sober awareness of the *eternal realities* that bear witness to his life and ministry.
- Everything that Timothy does, every word he speaks, every sermon he preaches, every response to other people, every motivation he has is done under the all-seeing, all-knowing view of Almighty One.
- His Heavenly Father and His Redeeming Lord Christ are the ultimate audience for Timothy's life and ministry

Paul's Own Example

For our appeal does not spring from error or impurity or any attempt to deceive, but just as we have been approved by God to be entrusted with the gospel, so we speak, not to please man, but to please God who tests our hearts.

(1 Thessalonians 2:3-4 ESV)

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John 5:22-24

The Father judges no one, but has given all judgment to the Son, that all may honor the Son, just as they honor the Father. Whoever does not honor the Son does not honor the Father who sent him. Truly, truly, I say to you, whoever hears my word and believes him who sent me has eternal life. He does not come into judgment, but has passed from death to life.

Acts 10:36-43

As for the word that he sent to Israel, preaching good news of peace through Jesus Christ (he is Lord of all)... And he commanded us to preach to the people and to testify that he is the one appointed by God to be judge of the living and the dead. To him all the prophets bear witness that everyone who believes in him receives forgiveness of sins through his name."

Why does Paul remind Timothy that Jesus is the Judge? Why does that matter to Christians?

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Romans 14:10-12

Why do you pass judgment on your brother? Or you, why do you despise your brother? For we will all stand before the judgment seat of God; for it is written, "As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bow to me, and every tongue shall confess to God." So then each of us will give an account of himself to God.

2 Corinthians 5:9-10

So whether we are at home or away, we make it our aim to please him. For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each one may receive what is due for what he has done in the body, whether good or evil.

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Why does this charge take on greater significance "in light of Christ's appearing & kingdom?"

The Nature of the Message

- Christ's Kingdom and the kingdoms of this world are often times opposed or at-odds with each other.
- The world tells us that we are biological creatures who are simply one stage in the evolutionary chain. The Bible tells us that we are spiritual beings made in the image of God, the Creator.

The Nature of the Message

- The world tells us that we are designed to get all the gusto and glory we can out of this short life. The Bible tells us that we are designed to glorify God and find our satisfaction in him.
- The world tells us to hate those who hate us. The Bible tells us to love our enemies.

The Nature of the Message

- The world tells us, blessed are the rich and famous. The Bible tells us, blessed are the poor in spirit, the meek, the pure in heart.
- The world tells us that there is no absolute truth, no infinite reference point. The Bible tells us there is truth, and the Triune God is the infinite reference point.

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Rx: Preach the Word

- Timothy's job is to faithfully teach, proclaim, explain, defend, preach, and literally here: herald God's word. A herald was someone who "carries or proclaims important news."
- It's an appropriate analogy as we consider the call to be ambassadors and witnesses for Christ & His Kingdom.

What are some of the challenges of being an ambassador of Christ's Kingdom?

Challenges

- We have a message that is counter-cultural, offensive to the sinful nature, & of supreme importance.
- We may feel intimidated, inadequate, or even indifferent about this call to be ambassadors.

2 Timothy 2:24-26

And the Lord's servant must not be quarrelsome but kind to everyone, able to teach, patiently enduring evil, correcting his opponents with gentleness. God may perhaps grant them repentance leading to a knowledge of the truth, and they may come to their senses and escape from the snare of the devil, after being captured by him to do his will.

Galatians 6:1-2

Brothers, if anyone is caught in any transgression, you who are spiritual should restore him in a spirit of gentleness. Keep watch on yourself, lest you too be tempted. Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ.

2 Timothy 4:3-5

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What are some specific biblical truths that people will "not endure?"

Inconvenient Truths

- We don't want to hear that we are sinners. We would rather hear that we are basically good people.
- We don't want to hear that God is holy. We would rather hear that God is just like us.
- We don't want to hear that hell exists. We would rather hear that everyone is entitled to their own version of heaven.
- We don't want to hear about absolute truth. We would rather hear that we can decide our own truth.

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Timothy's Task

- Be sober-minded don't get caught up in the intoxication of truth-oppressing ideals of the day
- Endure suffering be willing to swim upstream and speak truth in the face of opposition
- **Evangelize** in a truth-oppressing culture, they need the gospel as the key to unlock the heart towards truth
- Fulfill your ministry faithfulness before God matters more than popularity, or visible results.

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Paul's Departure

- This word was used often to speak of the departure of a ship.
- We can envision a ship at the shore and the anchor being hoisted up, the ropes being untied from the dock, and then embarking out into the open sea.
- The imagery demonstrates
 Paul's hope that the end of his
 earthly life, was merely the
 beginning of a new adventure.



How do these final words from Paul exemplify someone who is worthy of imitation?

Paul's Example

- His Christian life has been one of worship, where he has "poured out" his life in service of Christ (4:6)
- He has approached ministry with great effort & intention (e.g. like a fight or a race) (4:7)
- His hope extends beyond his current circumstances
 & bound to the world to come (4:8)
- He is motivated by a certain kind of reward one that only God can give (4:8)
