



“Mercy in Action” - Discussion Guide

This message focused on the spiritual gift of mercy, emphasizing how it is both rare and highly needed in today's world. Pastor Todd, along with Scott and Patrice Smith, explored how mercy involves extending compassion and empathy to those who are suffering, regardless of whether they deserve it. The message highlights that mercy is not just a feeling but requires action - turning empathy into tangible help with cheerful enthusiasm. Through examples from Jesus's ministry and the Kairos prison ministry, the sermon demonstrates that those with the gift of mercy don't reserve it only for the 'deserving' but extend it freely, just as God extended mercy to us through Christ. The message concluded with a call for all believers to be merciful people, whether they have the specific spiritual gift or not, because we have all been recipients of God's incredible mercy.
